
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ADVANCE STATEMENT ON EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS, NOVEMBER, 1955.

(These data are subject to revision)

Industrial employment declined slightly at Nov. 1, when the preliminary index on 1949 as 100, was 118.2 as compared with 118.5 a month earlier. Industrial disputes continued to have an important effect upon the situation. The latest industrial composite index was nevertheless 5.1 p.c. higher than at Nov. 1, 1954, also exceeding the figure for that date in any earlier year. The payroll index rose by 0.9 p.c. from Oct. 1, and, at 171.9, established a new meximum, 9.4 p.c. higher than at Nov. 1, 1954.

Employment was rather more active than at the beginning of October in Prince Edward Island, Quebec and Ontario, elsewhere showing curtailment. The most pronounced falling off (2.2 p.c.) was in Alberta. Except in Saskatchewan, where no general change was indicated, the provincial index numbers were higher than at the same date 12 months earlier.

The general movement as compared with Oct. 1, 1955, was unfavourable in manufacturing, (in which labour-management disputes were a weighty factor), and in construction, transportation, storage and communication, public utility operation, and in the service industries surveyed. There was no general change in mining. Employment increased in forestry, trade and finance, insurance and real estate. In spite of a loss of 0.6 p.c. in the staffs reported in manufacturing, factory payrolls advanced by 0.4 p.c., bringing the index to 166.8, a new high.

The average weekly wages and salaries rose from \$61.49 at Oct. 1 to \$62.18 in the week of Nov. 1, as compared with \$59.78 at Nov. 1, 1954. The latest per capita figure was the highest in the record. Except in Prince Edward Island, the Nov. 1 general averages in all provinces exceeded those recorded a month earlier, and in all areas were above their levels at Nov. 1, 1954.
