ADVANCE STATEMENT ON EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS, MAY 1, 1957.

(These data are subject to revision)

Industrial employment increased at the beginning of May, and the index, at 119.1 on the 1949 average as 100, established a new high for the time of year. The Apr. 1 figure was 118.0, and that at May 1, 1956, 115.2. The index of weekly payrolls rose by 0.8 p.c. in the month to 187.6, as compared with 172.3 in the corresponding week last year. Average weekly wages and salaries stood at \$67.43, down by 13 cents from Apr. 1, but a good deal above the figure of \$63.93 recorded 12 months earlier.

Moderately heightened employment as compared with the last survey was reported in all provinces except New Brunswick, where seasonal slackness in transportation and forestry reduced the May 1 industrial composite index by 3.2 p.c. in the month. The most noteworthy additions to the working forces were in Ontario and British Columbia, amounting to 3.0 p.c. and 1.2 p.c., respectively.

The general movement of industrial employment was downward at May 1 in logging and mining, but was favourable in other industries for which data are collected. The improvement in construction, transporation, storage and communication and trade was most noteworthy.

Employment in manufacturing advanced by 0.3 p.c. in the month, bringing the lastest index to 115.8, a maximum for the time of year. Payrolls rose by 0.2 p.c. from Apr. 1. At 184.7, the May 1 index was 6.0 p.c. over the figure recorded 12 months earlier. The preliminary average of weekly wages and salaries of factory workers at May 1 was \$69.76, a new high for the season, as compared with the preceding figure of \$69.87, and \$66.70 at May 1, 1956.
