ADVANCE STATEMENT ON EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS, SPECIAL YEAR-END ISSUE, 1958*

Industrial employment declined by 2.9 p.c. from the pay period preceding Dec. 1, 1958 to that preceding Jan. 1. 1959. The industrial composite index of employment for the later period was 115.8 (1949-100). The reduction was slightly less than seasonal, and smaller than in the corresponding periods in the two preceding years. Employment declines occurred in all provinces, but those in the Atlantic Provinces, Ontario, Manitoba and Alberta were less than seasonal. Return of workers following the ending of industrial disputes in non-ferrous metals mining and smelting in Ontario moderated the declines in employment indexes for that province and for Canada.

Average weekly wages and salaries dropped from \$71.60 during the pay period preceding Dec. 1, 1958 to \$69.06 in that preceding Jan. 1, 1959. Average earnings normally dip during the survey period in December, which includes the holiday week. The industrial composite payroll index for the period preceding Jan. 1 was 186.9, down over the month, but up from the index (182.2) for the corresponding period a year earlier.

The present issue, which contains data for the last pay periods in December. 1958 has been termed a 'Special Year-End Issue' because a December issue (containing data for the last pay periods in November) has already been released. A more detailed explanation of the dating change appears in current issues of Employment and Payrolls.
