

ADVANCE STATEMENT ON EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY PAYROLLS,

(These data are subject to revision)

The industrial composite index of employment rose from 112.9 (1949=100) at Apr. 1 to 114.5 at May 1. Seasonal factors appear to have been responsible for almost the whole of this increase. Average weekly wages and salaries increased from \$70.19 at Apr. 1 to \$70.32 at May 1. At the later date, the industrial composite index of payrells reached 188.1, and therefore exceeded the index for the corresponding date a year earlier (187.9). Payroll indexes for the earlier months of 1958 were lower than those for the corresponding months in 1957.

Industrially, substantial increases in employment were recorded for construction, public utility operation and transportation, storage and communication. On the whole, these increases reflected seasonal influences, but employment in highways, bridges and streets construction and in water transportation rose more than seasonally. There was a moderate rise in the number of workers in manufacturing establishments. Employment in forestry declined seasonally. There was also a drop in mining employment, but this was more than seasonal. The indexes for trade, services and finance, insurance and real estate showed little change from Apr. 1 to May 1.

Industrial employment was higher at May 1 than at Apr. 1 in all provinces except New Brunswick. The decline in New Brunswick reflected seasonal decreases in employment in the water transportation and railways industries in the province.
