# ADVANCE STATEMENT OF EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS, DECEMBER, 1959 <br> (These data are subject to revision) 

The industrial composite index number of employment for December was 118.2, down 3 pec. from the figure of 121.8 recorded for November. Seasonal factors led to declines in all industry divisions except trade. The effect of seasonal influences on employment in durable goods manufacturing was partly offset by non-seasonal increases in the automobile industries. In November, large numbers of automobile workers had been laid off owing to shortages of steel. Improvements in the supply situation following settlement of strikes in the United States led co the recall of these workers in December.

Employment indexes for all provinces and for all industry divisions except transportation, storage and communication were higher in December 1959 than in December 1958. The year-to-year rise in the industrial composite index amounted to 2.1 p.c.

The composite figure of average weekly wages and salaries for December was \$72.55. As usual, average weekly earnings were lower in the last pay period in December than in the corresponding period in November. The month-to-month decline this year amounted to $\$ 1.68$. Many workers were laid off or on unpaid leave towards the end of December, although most received pay for Christmas Day. The composite payroll index for December was 200.7 , down 5.2 pec. from the November figure.
