ADVANCE STATEMENT OF EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS
MAY, 1961.

(These data are subject to revision)

Industrial employment increased by 3.8 p.c. from April to May, with the composite index of employment (1949=100) rising to 116.9 in the latter month. This was 1.7 p.c. lower than the May 1960 index. However, the month-to-month increase was larger than seasonal, and the seasonally adjusted composite index rose from 116.0 in April to 116.8 in May. Employment was at a higher level in all industrial divisions, with the increases in forestry, construction and manufacturing accounting for most of the overall gain. The increases were larger than seasonal in all industries except service and transportation, storage and communication.

Average weekly wages and salaries declined by 13 cents, from \$73.12 in April to \$77.99 in May. Temporary reductions in earnings of workers on unpaid leave during the Victoria Day week-end were a factor in the decline. The composite payroll index for May was 214.0 up 3.7 p.c. from the figure for April 1961, and 2 p.c. above that for May 1960.
