ADVANCE STATEMENT OF EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS

NOVEMBER, 1962

(These data are subject to revision)

The industrial composite index of employment (1949=100) declined by 1.0 p.c. over the month to 124.2 in November, as many establishments reduced staffs with the oncoming of winter. Decreases were recorded in every industrial division except trade and finance, insurance and real estate. The usual pre-Christmas rise occurred in trade. The increase in finance, insurance and real estate was fractional.

Seasonally adjusted, the industrial composite rose from 121.7 in October to 122.1 in November. Some advances occurred in the adjusted indexes of nearly all industrial divisions, but most of the overall gain took place in manufacturing and construction. The only significant decline was recorded in mining.

The rise in the seasonally-adjusted index for manufacturing reflected improvement in the durables division. In that component, declines in iron and steel, non-ferrous metals and electrical apparatus and supplies were smaller than usual. In addition, there was a contra-seasonal advance in non-metallic mineral products reflecting the termination of a major industrial dispute.

Average weekly wages and salaries at \$81.58 were virtually unchanged from October. The latest figure was \$2.76 above November 1%1. The payroll index declined from 240.1 in October to 238.0 in November. The November index was 5.7 p.c. above the same month last year.
