

ADVANCE STATEMENT OF EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS

AUGUST, 1962

The industrial composite index of employment (1949=100) at 126.8 for August was up 0.8 p.c. from July. The rise reflected increases in forestry manufacturing, construction and service. There was a small decrease in mining while the remaining industrial divisions were virtually unchanged. About three quarters of the overall gain occurred in manufacturing where both major components advanced. A significant increase in the food and beverage group due to the beginning of the canning season was a factor in the rise in non-durables. In durables, employment rose in transportation equipment following the July shutdowns in the automobile industries for model changeover and inventory taking.

Seasonally adjusted, the industrial composite showed a small decline. The reduction reflected minor decreases in the adjusted indexes of a majority of the industrial divisions. Forestry and service showed an increase; public utility operation and finance, insurance and real estate were virtually unchanged.

The seasonally-adjusted indexes for both major components of manufacturing declined although the reduction in non-durables was slight. The decline in the seasonally-adjusted durables index reflected a drop in non-metallic mineral products and a smaller-than-seasonal rise in transportation equipment. In the former industry group, a major industrial dispute in the glass products industry was a factor. Transportation equipment rose less than seasonally as some firms in the motor vehicles group had not resumed production by the end of the August survey week. In non-durables, gains that were larger than average in the food and beverage and paper products industries were outweighed by larger-than-seasonal decreases in clothing and chemical products. Industrial disputes caused the fall in the latter.

The industrial composite of average weekly wages and salaries for August, at \$30.35 was 5 cents lower than July. The latest figure was \$2.53 above the same month last year. There were no significant changes among the major industrial divisions. A decline of 40 cents in manufacturing was attributable to a drop of over \$2.00 in food and beverages, owing to a significant increase in the number of seasonal workers, particularly women.

The payroll index for August was 240.3. This was 0.7 p.c. above July 1962 and 5.3 above August 1961.
