ADVANCE STATEMENT OF EMPLOYMENT AND WEERLY EARNINGS PROPERTY OF THE

APRIL. 1963

The industrial composite index of employment (1949=100) for April at 119.1 was up 1.2 p.c. from March as most establishments increased staffs to meet seasonal rises in production. As usual for the time of year, a large proportion of the increase occurred in construction and in transportation, storage and communication. In construction, the rise marked the beginning of summer activity while in the latter division the advance reflected the opening of the navigation season. The industrial composite indexes of employment rose for all provinces except New Brunswick and Alberta.

Seasonally-adjusted, the Canada industrial composite index of employment for April was virtually unchanged at 123.7. Changes were generally small among the major industrial divisions. A decline in forestry reflected larger-than-usual decreases for that division in Ontario. Both components of manufacturing strengthened although the rise in non-durables was dampened by a major industrial dispute in the rubber industry.

The seasonally-adjusted composites for the provinces generally showed little movement. Exceptions were declines in the indexes for Nova Scotia and Alberta. In each case, smaller-than-usual increases in construction was a major factor in the decrease.

The industrial composite of average weekly wages and salaries at \$83.60 was up 64 cents from March 1963 and \$3.39 from the same month last year. The payroll index for April was 233.8. This figure was 2.0 p.c. above the previous month and 6.4 p.c. above April 1962.
