

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

CHANGES IN PRACTICE IN DATING MONTHLY STATISTICS OF INDUSTRIAL EMPLOYMENT, PAYROLLS AND AVERAGE WEEKLY EARNINGS

Statistics published in the January 1959 and subsequent issues of Employment and Payrolls have been identified by labelling the figures for the last pay periods in each month as statistics for that particular month. The new system conforms with usual Bureau practices. In the past, the approach followed was to identify statistics based on data for the last pay periods in each month with the first day of the following month. For example, the March statistics in this issue would have been labelled as April 1 data under the system used until the end of 1958.

Annual Averages

Annual averages printed in the 1959 issues of Employment and Pavrolls are based on statistics for the latter parts of January to December in each year. Annual averages printed in issues for 1958 and earlier years were based on statistics for reported pay periods preceding January 1 to December 1. The newly-calculated averages in most cases differ little from those published in the past. Averages for 1952 and earlier years have not been revised. The 1958 issue of the annual Review of Employment and Payrolls will be the first number of that publication in which averages calculated on the new basis will appear.

Summary

The industrial composite index number of employment for March was 113.7, up 0.6 p.c. from the figure for February. Increases were recorded for most industries, but these were partly offset by a sharp seasonal decline in forestry. The rise in the composite has been matched during the last decade only in 1950 and 1951. From 1952 to 1958, employment variations from February to March ranged from a decline of 0.9 p.c. in 1954 to an increase of 0.3 p.c. in 1956.

The seasonally-adjusted composite employment index rose to 118.5 in March, an increase of 0.6 p.c. from the figure for February. More-than-seasonal increases in construction and in transportation, storage and communication were the main factors in the advance.

The course of movements in industrial employment during the recent recession can now be charted. In industry after industry, the trend turned downward through a period starting late in 1956 and ending early in 1958. Downturns in durable goods manufacturing and in construction came during the winter of 1956-57. Non-durables, mining and transportation, storage and communication reached peaks in the summer or fall of 1957, and then began to decline. During the winter of 1957-58, forestry employment was considerably lower than in that of 1956-57. The trend in public utilities turned down in the spring of 1958. On the other hand, the trend in trade did not turn down during the recession, although ceasing to rise after the middle of 1957; and employment in service and in finance, insurance and real estate continued to rise through the period.

At the beginning of 1958, before the last of the downturns had occurred, the trend in non-durables turned upwards. Upturns occurred late in 1958 in all the other industries in which downward trends had developed earlier, except perhaps in forestry. The situation in the latter part of 1958 was complicated by industrial disputes, which were the main cause of the declines in the adjusted composite index from May to October. Similarly, the return of workers after settlement of these disputes was the most important factor in the rise in the index from November 1958 to January 1959.

During the first quarter of 1959, employment tended to move upwards in most industries. Cancellation of aircraft contracts late in February led to substantial declines in the aircraft and associated industries, and industrial disputes also affected the general employment index to some extent. The seasonally-adjusted composite index number for March 1959 was 118.5, well up from the lowest of the 1958 figures, but 4.6 p.c. below the record high of 124.2 recorded for July 1957.

The March reports for a large number of establishments covered pay periods including the Easter Holidays, and many workers were on unpaid holiday for one or more days in the period. In consequence, the industrial composite figure of average weekly earnings for March was down from the February figure. The decline amounted to 48 cents, and the March figure was \$72.63. The March payroll index was 193.0, about the same as the February figure.

NOTE: Statistics are based on returns received from employers usually employing 15 or more persons. These returns include data for the last pay period(s) of reporting establishments in each month. The latest figures throughout this publication are subject to revision.

Industrial employment rose from February to March in all provinces except New Brunswick and Quebec, where the reductions reflect seasonal declines in forestry The increases of most weight in the total picture were those of 2.5 p.c. in British Columbia and 0.8 p.c. in Ontario. Seasonal influences tend to bring increases in both provinces between February and March. Average weekly wages and salaries declined in all provinces except Nova Scotia, mainly because some workers were on unpaid holiday for one or more days in the Easter period.

Employment in the latter part of March was higher than in the corresponding period in February in all but 8 of the urban areas for which industrial composite data are published. The areas in which declines occurred included St. John's, Moncton, Saint John, Chicoutimi-Jonquiere, Shawinigan Falls, Drummondville, Timmins, and Sarnia. Declines were small in most of these areas. Industrial disputes were the main factor in the reduction of 16 p.c. in Sarnia.

Employment

Manufacturing. - The employment index for manufacturing advanced from 107.5 in February to 108.3 in March. Most of the rise was in the durables sector of manufacturing, with seasonal influences the main factor in the increase.

Special irregular influences were responsible for most of the striking variations in the seasonally-adjusted index for <u>durable goods manufacturing</u> that occurred during the last twelve months. The decline between July and October in 1958 was mainly a result of industrial disputes in iron and steel and non-ferrous metals. The index rose from October 1958 to January 1959 as workers in these industries returned following termination of the disputes. The drop from January to February reflects cancellation of aircraft contracts.

Although irregular influences have been the main cause of change, other factors have also been at work. The employment situation in wood products and also non-metallic minerals has persistently strengthened since the beginning of 1958, although strikes have had some effect on the movement of employment in wood products in recent months. Employment figures for electrical apparatus levelled off towards the end of 1958 after declining continually through the preceding two-year period. Gains in iron and steel and non-ferrous metals continued through February and March. In transportation equipment, the employment picture in shipbuilding improved through the first quarter, and there were moderate increases in aircraft in March following the major drop in February. Employment in the automobile industry was moderately higher in the first quarter of 1959 than in the corresponding period in 1958, although well below figures for the previous five years. The situation in railroad and rolling stock equipment has remained unsteady.

Non-Manufacturing Industries. - Employment in forestry declined seasonally by 24 p.c. from February to March. Activity in this industry was at the lowest levels for the post-war period during the 1957-58 and 1958-59 seasons. Index numbers for most months in the past winter were slightly lower than for the corresponding months in 1957-58. Industrial disputes were in part responsible for the year-to-year reductions for February and March.

Construction employment advanced more than seasonally from February to March both in building and general engineering and in the highways, bridges and streets component of the industry division. The trend in employment in the latter industry has been upward for some years. The first quarter figures were at record levels for the time of year, up 11.5 p.c. from the figures for the corresponding period in 1958. On the other hand, employment in building and general engineering establishments

covered in the monthly survey, although moving upward during the first quarter of 1959, was 3.0 p.c. lower than in the corresponding quarter of 1958 and 16.8 p.c. lower than in the first quarter of 1957.

Railway employment which normally declines seasonally during the first quarter, showed little change during the early months of 1959. Marked declines had occurred from early in 1957 until late in 1958. There was a moderate increase in railway employment from February to March following a corresponding decline from January to February. This increase, and a rise in radio broadcasting following termination of industrial disputes, contributed to the rise in the seasonally-adjusted composite figure.

Mining employment declined somewhat less-than-seasonally, from February to March because activity in a number of metal mines increased moderately. In oil and natural gas, the employment drop was greater than in some previous years, partly owing to reductions in the staffs of establishments engaged in drilling operations while spring travel restrictions were in force.

Employment changes in trade, service and finance, insurance and real estate followed normal seasonal patterns from February to March.

Employment for Men and Women. - The index number of employment for women for March was 120.3, as indicated in Table 10C of this issue. The March 1959 figure was down only slightly from the pre-recession figure of 120.6 for March 1957. On the other hand, the March 1959 index number for men was 111.8, down 4.6 p.c. from the figure for March 1957, which was 117.2. Employment for women has been better maintained than employment for men because activity was not reduced during the recession in a number of industries in which women form a large proportion of the work force. These industries include trade, service, and finance, insurance and real estate. In manufacturing, the index of employment for women for March 1959 was 2.4 p.c. lower than that for March 1957, while the reduction in the index for men over the same period was 6.7 p.c. The smaller decline for women reflects their concentration in non-durable goods industries, in which employment was better maintained than in durables.

Average Weekly Wages and Salaries

The industrial composite figure of average weekly wages and salaries for March was \$72.63, down 48 cents from the February level. In some industries, considerable numbers of workers were on unpaid holiday for one or more days in the Easter period, and this factor was the main reason for the decline. Its importance varied from industry to industry and from area to area. The construction industry was especially affected and weekly earnings in this industry dropped by \$3.00.

Earnings were up during the March survey period in a few of the manufacturing industries because employees worked at premium rates during the holiday period or just before it. These industries included meat products, non-ferrous metals smelting and refining, petroleum refining and acids, alkalis and salts. Wage rate increases came into effect in the agricultural implements industry and in heavy electrical machinery.



NOTES

General. - The monthly surveys of employment and weekly payrolls relate to all branches of the following industrial divisions: forestry, mining, manufacturing, transportation, storage and communication, construction, public utilities, trade, finance, insurance and real estate, and to certain groups of the service industry, mainly hotels, restaurants, laundries and dry cleaning plants. recreational and business services. The surveys do not cover firms usually employing less than 15 persons, of which the number is very large in relation to their employment totals. Establishments reducing their staffs below this minimum are not necessarily removed from the mailing list. Data are requested from all classes of employees, irrespective of their functions in the business; statistics for the owners are excluded. Employers operating in two or more lines of business, or in different provinces or cities, are asked to furnish separate monthly returns for their establishments in the different units.

1. Coverage. - Virtual limitation of the surveys to firms with staffs of 15 and over results in a large and relatively even coverage of total employment in the included industries in most of the provinces and in the metropolitan areas. The industrial representation, though large, is more uneven, the proportion of employees covered depending upon the organization of particular industries in larger or smaller units of operation. Complete information respecting the area and industry distributions of the working population is available only when the Decennial Censuses are taken, at place of residence. In 1951, data were not segregated for paid workers actually at work. Estimates of coverage that can be made are therefore conservative because they relate employees of reporting firms to all paid workers with jobs, including those absent from work without pay who would not be included in the monthly statistics of employment and payrolls. Estimates of coverage according to industrial divisions for Canada and the provinces are given in the first columns of Tables 4 and 5.

In these estimates, the Census figures for automobile repair have been moved from manufacturing to trade, since a large proportion of such work is carried on in retail establishments which do not furnish separate data for their sales and repair staffs.

In three industries (construction in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, transportation in Manitoba and public utility operation in British Columbia) the provincial proportions exceed 100 p.c., due to classification differences between the Census and the monthly surveys of establishments. This situation in construction in two provinces is probably due to short-term employment afforded by reporting highway construction establishments to workers whose main occupation is farming, in which they would be enumerated by the Census. Inclusion of some railway employees reported monthly in Manitoba who were elsewhere enumerated in the

Census results in a proportion of over 100 p.c. in the transportation, storage and communication group in that province. The high figure in public utility operation in British Columbia is likely a result of inclusion of employees in that industry who would be shown in either construction or transportation by the Census.

The following table contains provincial estimates of coverage of total wage-earners and salaried employees in all industries, including those in agriculture, government, education, health and other classes excluded from the monthly surveys, as well as paid workers in the industries that are included. The general estimate for Canada was 62 p.c.

It is important to note that the statistics of employees covered, as published in the monthly and annual reports, do not represent estimates of total numbers of paid workers in specified areas or industries, but show only the distributions of men and women on the staffs of the co-operating employers in the indicated periods, including their full-time, part-time and casual employees.

2. The Questionnaire used in the monthly surveys asks employers to state the number of wage-earners and salaried employees drawing pay in the last pay periods in the months, with their payroll disbursements in the same periods. The request for statistics for the last pay period in the month only is designed to prevent duplication in the employment count where individuals may appear on the payrolls of more than one employer in a period of several weeks. The workers reported are not necessarily employed for a period of a week, by any one establishment or by more than one. Workers on strike during the reported pay periods are not included in the statistics unless they draw pay from their employer; for example, take paid holidays during the dispute. Workers laid off without pay during the pay period as an indirect effect of industrial disputes are not counted as employed.

Employees and earnings are grouped according to the duration of their pay periods—monthly, semi-monthly, fortnightly, weekly, etc. Gross payrolls are requested, before deductions are made for taxes, unemployment insurance contributions, etc. Overtime payments, cost-of-living allowances, commissions, incentive and production bonuses are included, as are payments for absences with pay in the reported pay periods. The statistics do not include employers' contributions to unemployment insurance, workmen's compensation and other welfare plans, nor do they include amounts paid for pensions, retirement gratuities, bonuses paid at irregular or infrequent intervals, and various other supplementary labour costs.

- 3. The Processing. Statistics of wages and salaries reported for any period exceeding a week are reduced for tabulation purposes to one week's proportion of the totals, the numerators of the fractions used for this purpose being 5, 6 or 7 days, depending upon the number of days per week on which the establishment operated in the pay period; the denominators of the fractions are the numbers of working days in the different pay periods. For employees paid at annual or monthly rates, whose earnings are not affected by variations in the number of working days in the month, fixed proportions are used to reduce the earnings to a weekly basis, irrespective of the length of the calendar month. The sums resulting from these various calculations are then aggregated to give the total amounts which would be paid for services rendered in one week by the employees of the cooperating firms.
- 4. The Tabulation. Data tabulated each month show the numbers of women and of workers of both sexes drawing pay from the establishments furnishing returns and their weekly payrolls, with similar information for employees of the same firms a month earlier, and in the base period (1949). The statistics first published for each month are preliminary; re-tabulation of the data on the succeeding month's tabulation permits incorporation of revisions in the material originally tabulated and inclusion of returns received too late for the preliminary tabulation.
- 5. The Index Numbers.—The index numbers of employment and payrolls represent the percentage relationships between employees of establishments currently furnishing data and their aggregate weekly earnings, and the corresponding 1949 averages of these employers. The 1949 figures of employment and payrolls for firms which have since gone out of business are continued in the basic averages; firms or branches opening for business since 1949 are tabulated with zero base figures. The basic averages of establishments which operated in 1949 but have since been added

to the mailing list, are incorporated in the base figures from the date when their co-operation was first obtained. The index numbers of average weekly wages and salaries relate the average earnings of persons employed by the reporting firms at a given date to the average earnings of their employees in 1949.

6. The Weekly Wages and Salaries. - The statistics of average weekly earnings result from the division of the aggregate weekly wages and salaries disbursed in the last pay periods in the month by the co-operating establishments, by the number of their full time and part-time employees in the same periods. The figures represent gross earnings, before deductions are made for unemployment insurance contributions, taxes, etc. In addition to basic wages and salaries, the earnings include overtime payments, shift premiums, commissions, cost-of-living, incentive and production bonuses, and other bonuses paid at frequent intervals. They also include amounts paid employees absent on leave with pay during the reported pay periods, i.e., during vacations, statutory holidays, sick leave, etc.

The earnings do not include the value of free board and lodging and other perquisites, employers' contributions to welfare funds such as workmen's compensation, pension, and unemployment insurance funds and supplementary unemployment benefits. Also excluded are the cost to employers of certain other employee benefits, such as bonuses paid at irregular or infrequent intervals, (e.g., annual bonuses), and retirement gratuities.

The revised figures of earnings in the monthly reports incorporate retroactive pay for one month, corrections in the material originally tabulated, and data received too late for inclusion in the first tabulation; for the most part, such adjustments are not carried back for more than one month.

- 7. Hourly Earnings.—Statistics of average hours and average hourly and weekly earnings of wage-earners for whom co-operating employers keep record of hours worked are contained in the monthly reports "Man-Hours and Hourly Earnings".
- 8. Metropolitan Area Statistics.—Urban statistics in the present report include data for establishments situated in the metropolitan areas as defined by the 1956 Census Bulletin 1-6, "Population—Incorporated Cities, Towns and Villages", except that the St. Catharines Metropolitan Area includes Welland as well as Merritton, Port Dalhousie and Thorold, and parts of Grantham and Thorold Townships.

FOOTNOTES

Most of the footnotes are lists of names of industries that appear in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual which are grouped under special titles in employment and payroll publications. In some industries, the group breakdown shown in the tables is less extensive than in the Standard Industrial Classification; figures for the omitted categories however, are contained in the group totals.

- (a) Gold mining includes alluvial gold mining; auriferous quartz mining.
- (b) Other metal mining includes copper-gold-silver mining; iron mining; nickel-copper mining; silver-cobalt mining; silver-lead-zinc mining; miscelianeous metal mining.
- (c) Non-metal mining includes non-metal mining; quarrying, clay and sand pits.
- (d) Other beverages includes carbonated beverages; wines.
- (f) Other leather products includes leather gloves and mittens; leather tanneries; miscellaneous leather products.
- (g) Saw and planing mills includes plywood and veneer mills; sash, door and planing mills; sawmills.
- (h) Other wood products includes boxes and baskets (wood); morticians' goods; miscellaneous wood products.
- (i) Other paper products includes paper boxes and bags; roofing papers; miscellaneous paper products.
- (j) Machinery manufacturing includes household, office and store machinery; machine tools; machinery, n.e.c.
- (k) Non-metallic mineral products includes abrasive products; as bestos products; cement, hydraulic; clay products; glass and glass products; lime and gypsum products; stone products; concrete products; miscellaneous non-metallic mineral products.
- Other chemical products includes explosives, ammunition and pyrotechnics; fertilizers; paints and varnishes; soaps, washing and cleaning compounds; toilet preparations; vegetable oil mills; primary plastics; miscellaneous chemical and allied products.
- (m) Building includes buildings and structures; special trade contractors. General engineering includes other construction, other than highways, bridges and streets.
- (n) Water transportation includes water transportation; services incidental to water transportation.
- (0) Electric and motor transportation includes bus and coach transportation-interurban; urban and suburban transportation systems; taxicab; truck transportation; services incidental to transportation; other transportation.
- (p) Urban and interurban transportation includes bus and coach transportation-interurban; urban and suburban transportation systems.
- (q) Other public utilities includes gas manufacture and distribution; water and sanitary services; other public utilities.
- (r) Industrial Machinery includes machine tools; machinery, n.e.c.
- (s) The Northwest Territories with the exception of Baffin Island are included in Alberta. Baffin Island is included in Quebec. The Yukon Territories is included in British Columbia.
- (t) Synthetic textiles and silk includes synthetic filament yarn and staple fibre; spun yarn and fabric.
- (u) Durable goods manufacturing includes wood, iron and steel, transportation equipment, non-ferrous metal, electrical apparatus and supplies and non-metallic minerals. The non-durable group includes the remaining manufacturing industries.
- (v) Service includes hotels, restaurants, laundries, dry cleaning plants, business, recreational services and miscellaneous services. Government, community and health services are not covered.
- (w) Estimates of coverage are based on comparisons of data for 1951 with Population Census Statistics. For details, see notes on page i.
