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### SPECIAL NOTICES

#### STATISTICS FOR THE ATLANTIC AND PRAIRIE REGIONS

Tables covering employment indexes and average weekly wage and salary figures for the Atlantic and Prairie Regions have been re-introduced into Employment and Payrolls starting with the January 1961 issue (see tables 4A and 4B). Publication of regional data makes possible release of industry detail which cannot be provided for individual provinces within regions, and will facilitate regional analysis. The Atlantic Region includes Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and the Prairie Region covers Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta. Publication of statistics for individual provinces will be continued.

#### SEASONALLY - ADJUSTED EMPLOYMENT INDEXES

The series of seasonally-adjusted employment indexes for Canada published in Table 2 have been revised, and extended to include data for each industry division covered in the monthly survey. Because Table 2 includes unadjusted as well as seasonally-adjusted data, the table containing the unadjusted figures alone (Table 8 in 1960 issues of Employment and Payrolls) will be discontinued shortly.

EMPLOYMENT, PAYROLLS AND AVERAGE WEEKLY EARNINGS,  
MARCH, 1961

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Summary

The industrial composite index number of employment for March was 110.9 (1949=100), virtually unchanged from the figure for February. A large decline in forestry, partly occasioned by seasonal factors, was almost balanced by seasonal increases in other industries, particularly trade, manufacturing and transportation, storage and communication. The seasonally-adjusted composite index declined from 116.3 in February to 116.0 in March, a reduction of 0.3 p.c.

The industrial composite figure of average weekly wages and salaries for March was \$77.66, down 14 cents from February. A decline of \$2 in construction was the main factor in the decrease. The composite payroll index declined from 202.5 in February to 201.9 in March.

Employment

Manufacturing.— Between February and March 1961 the change in manufacturing employment was small. The index for March was 104.9, up slightly from 104.6 in February. This increase was less than seasonal, and the adjusted index declined by 0.2 p.c. between the two months. Declines were recorded in the seasonally-adjusted indexes for both the durable and the non-durable sectors of manufacturing.

The unadjusted index for durable goods manufacturing rose from 106.3 in February to 106.9 in March. Employment increased seasonally in most industries. There was a gain in electrical apparatus, although seasonal influences tend to reduce employment in this industry between the two months. The situation also strengthened in primary iron and steel. However, there was a 0.4 p.c. decline in the seasonally-adjusted index for durables as a whole, partly because employment in non-metallic mineral products rose less than seasonally, but mainly owing to a contra-seasonal reduction in transportation equipment. Within the transportation equipment group, industrial disputes in Nova Scotia shipyards and layoffs in plants manufacturing motor vehicles and aircraft occasioned most of the decrease. Reports from the aircraft industry received over the previous seven months had indicated strengthening of employment conditions during that period. Employment in motor vehicle parts and accessories and railroad and rolling stock equipment showed increases over February levels, but these gains were less than seasonal.

The employment situation in non-durable goods manufacturing showed little change from February to March. Minor increases occurred in all groups except rubber and tobacco. The increase in employment in food and beverages was less than seasonal. Most of the component industries showed small increases, but a decline was indicated in fish canning although normally considerable expansion takes place between February and March. The decline occurred in Maritime plants, which experienced a scarcity of fish for processing in the survey week.

Non-Manufacturing Industries.— Between February and March, there were small employment increases in all non-manufacturing industries except forestry and mining.

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NOTE: Statistics are based on returns received from employers usually employing 15 or more persons. These returns include data for the last pay period(s) of reporting establishments in each month. The latest figures throughout this publication are subject to revision.

The decline in mining was rather more than seasonal, because some coal mines in Nova Scotia became idle. Large declines occurred in forestry, particularly in Quebec, Ontario and Newfoundland. Seasonal influences, including completion of hauling operations in some areas, were the main factor in the drop. However, the seasonally-adjusted index declined by 12.8 p.c., and this decrease was the main reason for the reduction in the seasonally-adjusted industrial composite index. Although unusually poor weather conditions may have contributed to the decline in the adjusted index for forestry, the reduction tends to confirm that the employment situation in the industry deteriorated during the 1960-61 season. The March index number was 42.5, the lowest figure for the month in the post-war period.

In construction, employment increased from February to March, but the gains were less than seasonal, particularly in building and general engineering. A more-than-seasonal increase in employment occurred in railway transportation between February and March, although a downward trend has been in evidence in this industry for some years. Employment in retail trade as usual increased from February to March; the small increase in the seasonally-adjusted figure may reflect the early Easter.

Employment for Men and Women.- In each of the early months of 1961, employment for both men and women was at a lower level than in the corresponding month in 1960. However, employment reductions for women have been smaller than those for men. In consequence the percentage of women in the work force has tended to rise, reaching 24.4 p.c. in March 1961, the highest proportion recorded in the past decade. The figure for March 1960 was 23.8 p.c.

Industries in which women form a large proportion of the work force tend to be more stable, both cyclically and seasonally, than those in which women are greatly outnumbered by men. In consequence, index numbers of employment for women show smaller fluctuations than those for men. The index number of employment for men for March 1961 was 108.4 (as shown in Table 10C), down 3.6 p.c. from that for March 1960. The index for women showed a smaller decline, decreasing from 120.2 in March 1960 to 119.5 in March 1961, a reduction of 0.6 p.c. The decline in this index reflected a 2.0 p.c. drop in the number of women employed in manufacturing over the year. Employment in trade, service and finance, insurance and real estate was higher in March 1961 than in March 1960. The large proportion of females employed in these industries moderated the decline in the composite index of employment for women.

#### Average Weekly Wages and Salaries


The industrial composite figure of average weekly wages and salaries for March was \$77.66, down 14 cents from the February level. Some workers were not paid for the Food Friday holiday, and this was a factor in the small decline. The construction industry was especially affected, and weekly earnings in this industry dropped by \$2.00. In 1959, when both Good Friday and Easter Monday fell in the last week of March, weekly earnings in construction were \$3.27 lower than in the previous month. The month-to-month decline in earnings in retail trade was associated with an increase in employment over the period, some firms taking on additional casual employees for the Easter trade. There was an increase of \$3.69 in earnings in the tobacco products industry which was related to the decline of 16.6 p.c. in the number of employees resulting from completion of initial processing of the 1960 tobacco crop. The increase of \$3.10 in the earnings of employees in the telephone communication industry was mainly caused by employees working overtime following the snow storm in the Montreal area.



## NOTES

**General.**—The monthly surveys of employment and weekly payrolls relate to all branches of the following industrial divisions: forestry, mining, manufacturing, transportation, storage and communication, construction, public utilities, trade, finance, insurance and real estate, and to certain groups of the service industry, mainly hotels, restaurants, laundries and dry cleaning plants, recreational and business services. The surveys do not cover firms usually employing less than 15 persons, of which the number is very large in relation to their employment totals. Establishments reducing their staffs below this minimum are not necessarily removed from the mailing list. Data are requested for all classes of employees, irrespective of their functions in the business; statistics for the owners are excluded. Employers operating in two or more lines of business, or in different provinces or cities, are asked to furnish separate monthly returns for their establishments in the different units.

**1. Coverage.**—Virtual limitation of the surveys to firms with staffs of 15 and over results in a large and relatively even coverage of total employment in the included industries in most of the provinces and in the urban areas. The industrial representation, though large, is more uneven, the proportion of employees covered depending upon the organization of particular industries in larger or smaller units of operation. Complete information respecting the area and industry distributions of the working population is available only when the Decennial Censuses are taken, at place of residence. In 1951, data were not segregated for paid workers actually at work. Estimates of coverage that can be made are therefore conservative because they relate employees of reporting firms to all paid workers with jobs, including those absent from work without pay who would not be included in the monthly statistics of employment and payrolls. Estimates of coverage according to industrial divisions for Canada and the provinces are given in the first columns of Tables 3 and 4.

In these estimates, the Census figures for automobile repair have been moved from manufacturing to trade, since a large proportion of such work is carried on in retail establishments which do not furnish separate data for their sales and repair staffs.

In three industries (construction in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, transportation in Manitoba and public utility operation in British Columbia) the provincial proportions exceed 100 p.c., due to classification differences between the Census and the monthly surveys of establishments. This situation in construction in two provinces is probably due to short-term employment afforded by reporting highway construction establishments to workers whose main occupation is farming, in which they would be enumerated by the Census. Inclusion of

some railway employees reported monthly in Manitoba, who were elsewhere enumerated in the Census, results in a proportion of over 100 p.c. in the transportation, storage and communication group in that province. The high figure in public utility operation in British Columbia is likely a result of inclusion of employees in that industry who would be shown in either construction or transportation by the Census.

The following table contains provincial estimates of coverage of total wage-earners and salaried employees in all industries, including those in agriculture, government, education, health and other classes excluded from the monthly surveys, as well as paid workers in the industries that are included. The general estimate for Canada was 62 p.c.

It is important to note that the statistics of employees covered, as published in the monthly and annual reports, do not represent estimates of total numbers of paid workers in specified areas or industries, but show only the distributions of men and women on the staffs of the co-operating employers in the indicated periods, including their full-time, part-time and casual employees.

**2. The Questionnaire** used in the monthly surveys asks employers to state the number of wage-earners and salaried employees drawing pay in the last pay periods in the months, with their payroll disbursements in the same periods. The request for statistics for the last pay period in the month only is designed to prevent duplication in the employment count where individuals may appear on the payrolls of more than one employer in a period of several weeks. The workers reported are not necessarily employed for a period of a week, by any one establishment or by more than one. Workers on strike during the reported pay periods are not included in the statistics unless they draw pay from their employer; for example, take paid holidays during the dispute. Workers laid off without pay during the pay period as an indirect effect of industrial disputes are not counted as employed.

Employees and earnings are grouped according to the duration of their pay periods—monthly, semi-monthly, fortnightly, weekly, etc. Gross payrolls are requested before deductions are made for taxes, unemployment insurance contributions, etc. Overtime payments, cost-of-living allowances, commissions, incentive and production bonuses are included, as are payments for absences with pay in the reported pay periods. The statistics do not include employers' contributions to unemployment insurance, workmen's compensation and other welfare plans, nor do they include amounts paid for pensions, retirement gratuities, bonuses paid at irregular or infrequent intervals, and various other supplementary labour costs.

**3. The Processing.**—Statistics of wages and salaries reported for any period exceeding a week are reduced for tabulation purposes to one week's proportion of the totals, the numerators of the fractions used for this purpose being 5, 6 or 7 days, depending upon the number of days per week on which the establishment operated in the pay period; the denominators of the fractions are the numbers of working days in the different pay periods. For employees paid at annual or monthly rates, whose earnings are not affected by variations in the number of working days in the month, fixed proportions are used to reduce the earnings to a weekly basis, irrespective of the length of the calendar month. The sums resulting from these various calculations are then aggregated to give the total amounts which would be paid for services rendered in one week by the employees of the co-operating firms.

**4. The Tabulation.**—Data tabulated each month show the numbers of women and of workers of both sexes drawing pay from the establishments furnishing returns and their weekly payrolls, with similar information for employees of the same firms a month earlier, and in the base period (1949). The statistics first published for each month are preliminary; re-tabulation of the data on the succeeding month's tabulation permits incorporation of revisions in the material originally tabulated and inclusion of returns received too late for the preliminary tabulation.

**5. The Index Numbers.**—The index numbers of employment and payrolls represent the percentage relationships between employees of establishments currently furnishing data and their aggregate weekly earnings, and the corresponding 1949 averages of these employees. The 1949 figures of employment and payrolls for firms which have since gone out of business are continued in the basic averages; firms or branches opening for business since 1949 are tabulated with zero base figures. The basic averages of establishments which operated in 1949 but have since been added

to the mailing list, are incorporated in the base figures from the date when their co-operation was first obtained. The index numbers of average weekly wages and salaries relate the average earnings of persons employed by the reporting firms at a given date to the average earnings of their employees in 1949.

**6. The Weekly Wages and Salaries.**—The statistics of average weekly earnings result from the division of the aggregate weekly wages and salaries disbursed in the last pay periods in the month by the co-operating establishments, by the number of their full time and part-time employees in the same periods. The figures represent gross earnings, before deductions are made for unemployment insurance contributions, taxes, etc. In addition to basic wages and salaries, the earnings include overtime payments, shift premiums, commissions, cost-of-living, incentive and production bonuses, and other bonuses paid at frequent intervals. They also include amounts paid employees absent on leave with pay during the reported pay periods, i.e., during vacations, statutory holidays, sick leave, etc.

The earnings do not include the value of free board and lodging and other perquisites, employers' contributions to welfare funds such as workmen's compensation, pension, and unemployment insurance funds and supplementary unemployment benefits. Also excluded are the cost to employers of certain other employee benefits, such as bonuses paid at irregular or infrequent intervals, (e.g., annual bonuses), and retirement gratuities.

The revised figures of earnings in the monthly reports incorporate retroactive pay for one month, corrections in the material originally tabulated, and data received too late for inclusion in the first tabulation; for the most part, such adjustments are not carried back for more than one month.

**7. Hourly Earnings.**—Statistics of average hours and average hourly and weekly earnings of wage-earners for whom co-operating employers keep record of hours worked are contained in the monthly reports "Man-Hours and Hourly Earnings".

**8. Urban Area Statistics.**—Urban area statistics published in the present report include data for establishments situated in the urban areas as defined in the 1956 Census Bulletin 1-6, "Population—Incorporated Cities, Towns and Villages," except that the St. Catharines statistics include Port Colborne and Welland in addition to the defined urban area. Statistics given in the report for urban areas not defined in the above-named publication include Preston with Galt.

## FOOTNOTES

Most of the footnotes are lists of names of industries that appear in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual which are grouped under special titles in employment and payroll publications. In some industries, the group breakdown shown in the tables is less extensive than in the Standard Industrial Classification; figures for the omitted categories however, are contained in the group totals.

- (a) **Gold mining** includes alluvial gold mining; auriferous quartz mining.
- (b) **Other metal mining** includes copper-gold-silver mining; iron mining; nickel-copper mining; silver-cobalt mining; silver-lead-zinc mining; miscellaneous metal mining.
- (c) **Non-metal mining** includes non-metal mining; quarrying, clay and sand pits.
- (d) **Other beverages** includes carbonated beverages; wines.
- (f) **Other leather products** includes leather gloves and mittens; leather tanneries; miscellaneous leather products.
- (g) **Saw and planing mills** includes plywood and veneer mills; sash, door and planing mills; sawmills.
- (h) **Other wood products** includes boxes and baskets (wood); morticians' goods; miscellaneous wood products.
- (i) **Other paper products** includes paper boxes and bags; roofing papers; miscellaneous paper products.
- (j) **Machinery manufacturing** includes household, office and store machinery; machine tools; machinery, n.e.c.
- (k) **Non-metallic mineral products** includes abrasive products; asbestos products; cement, hydraulic; clay products; glass and glass products; lime and gypsum products; stone products; concrete products; miscellaneous non-metallic mineral products.
- (l) **Other chemical products** includes explosives, ammunition and pyrotechnics; fertilizers; paints and varnishes; soaps, washing and cleaning compounds; toilet preparations; vegetable oil mills; primary plastics; miscellaneous chemical and allied products.
- (m) **Building** includes buildings and structures; special trade contractors. **General engineering** includes other construction, other than highways, bridges and streets.
- (n) **Water transportation** includes water transportation; services incidental to water transportation.
- (o) **Electric and motor transportation** includes bus and coach transportation-interurban; urban and suburban transportation systems; taxicab; truck transportation; services incidental to transportation; other transportation.
- (p) **Urban and interurban transportation** includes bus and coach transportation-interurban; urban and suburban transportation systems.
- (q) **Other public utilities** includes gas manufacture and distribution; water and sanitary services; other public utilities.
- (r) **Industrial Machinery** includes machine tools; machinery, n.e.c.
- (s) The Northwest Territories with the exception of Baffin Island are included in Alberta. Baffin Island is included in Quebec. The Yukon Territories is included in British Columbia.
- (t) **Synthetic textiles and silk** includes synthetic filament yarn and staple fibre; spun yarn and fabric.
- (u) **Durable goods manufacturing** includes wood, iron and steel, transportation equipment, non-ferrous metal, electrical apparatus and supplies and non-metallic minerals. The **non-durable group** includes the remaining manufacturing industries.
- (v) **Service** includes hotels, restaurants, laundries, dry cleaning plants, business, recreational services and miscellaneous services. Government, community and health services are **not** covered.
- (w) Estimates of coverage are based on comparisons of data for 1951 with Population Census Statistics. For details, see notes on page 1.



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
