


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

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N O T I C E

The value of this monthly report depends largely upon the quality and regularity of the returns furnished by respondents. These number many thousands, widely distributed throughout the country. Co-operation generally is excellent, but some reports are held up and others contain significant errors or omissions, causing delays in compilation. In order to make reasonably reliable statistics available to users as soon as possible, preliminary figures are issued monthly before all returns and corrections have been received. Accordingly, the first statistics released for any month are subject to revision in the next report.

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics wishes to express its sincere appreciation of the co-operation and the interest shown over the years by the employers and their officers contributing to these widely-used series.

NOTE: The seasonally-adjusted employment index numbers shown in Table 2 have been revised. Revised figures for 1958 and 1959 have also been prepared, and will be published in the 1962 issue of the Review of Employment and Payrolls.

NOTE: Seasonally-adjusted index numbers of employment for the provinces are now published regularly, commencing with the April 1963 issue.

EMPLOYMENT, PAYROLLS AND AVERAGE WEEKLY EARNINGS,
AUGUST, 1963

Summary

The industrial composite index of employment (1949=100) for the end of August 1963, at 129.9, was up 1.7 p.c. from July. The advance was larger than is usual from July to August and resulted mainly from above-average increases in forestry, manufacturing, construction and trade.

Seasonally adjusted, the industrial composite index rose to 124.3 in August, up 0.6 p.c. from the July figure of 123.5. Most major industrial divisions advanced. The largest percentage increases occurred in forestry and construction. In the former, an above-average rise in the Atlantic Region was the main factor in the increase. A marked advance in highway, bridge and street construction in Quebec accounted for much of the increase in the adjusted index for construction.

The seasonally-adjusted index for manufacturing rose to 115.7 in August, up 0.5 p.c. from the July figure of 115.1. A major part of this increase reflected strengthening in the durables component, where larger-than-seasonal gains occurred in transportation equipment.

The seasonally-adjusted industrial composites for four of the five regions advanced in August. The largest percentage gain occurred in British Columbia where employment rose in canned and cured fish plants following the settlement of a major industrial dispute in fisheries.

The industrial composite of average weekly wages and salaries for August was unchanged at \$83.27. The latest figure was \$2.47 above August 1962. The payroll index of 254.0 was 1.7 above July 1963 and 5.4 p.c. above August 1962.

Employment

Manufacturing

The seasonally-adjusted index for manufacturing rose by 0.5 p.c. from 115.1 to 115.7 between July and August. The increase offset part of the decline between June and July when the index fell by 0.8 p.c. The index tended to weaken over the late spring and summer of 1963. The durables component, seasonally adjusted was slightly lower in August than in April while the non-durables component, seasonally adjusted, fluctuated at about the April level of 112.2 during recent months.

The July-to-August rise in the seasonally-adjusted index for durable goods manufacturing followed a decline of equal size from June to July. The recovery in August reflected larger-than-average increases in transportation equipment and electrical apparatus and supplies. The gains in these industries outweighed slackening in non-ferrous metal and non-metallic mineral products. Small changes in employment in wood and iron and steel products between July and August were seasonal.

In transportation equipment, the July decline in employment which related to the model changeover in motor vehicles, was unusually large and as a result, the July

index of 63.0 was the lowest recorded for that industry in the post-war period. Since some major producers had not resumed full operation by the end of August employment in the industry continued substantially below pre-changeover levels. The employment decline due to the model changeover was smaller than usual in the motor vehicle parts and accessories industry and this offset to some extent the reductions in the motor vehicle industry. In the remaining component industries of transportation equipment, employment expanded in aircrafts and parts and railroad and rolling stock equipment but declined more than seasonally in shipbuilding and repairing.

The slackening noted in the adjusted index for durables after April did not reflect general weakening in the component industries. Wood products weakened steadily during the first half of 1963 but picked up somewhat in July and August. Iron and steel products advanced but at a reduced rate after April. In transportation equipment, most component industries expanded but this was offset by a contraction in shipbuilding and repairing. Non-ferrous metals strengthened through most of 1963. Employment in electrical apparatus and supplies expanded in the first five months of 1963 but showed no clear trend after April. Non-metallic mineral products weakened.

The small rise in the seasonally-adjusted index for non-durable goods manufacturing between July and August reflected an above-average rise in employment in food and beverages as a result of the settlement of a major industrial dispute in fisheries in British Columbia. The gains in food and beverages were partly offset by smaller-than-usual advances in clothing and paper products. In clothing, employment did not rise as much as is usual between July and August due to a major industrial dispute in the knit goods industry.

The seasonally-adjusted index for non-durable goods manufacturing expanded in the first 5 months of 1963. The flattening in the index since that time may be attributed to factors of a temporary nature relating to the food and beverage, tobacco, and clothing industries. In recent months, only the numerically small leather and rubber products industries weakened. On the other hand, large industry groups, such as textiles, clothing, paper products and printing, publishing and allied industries, expanded.

Non-Manufacturing Industries

The seasonally-adjusted indexes for the goods-producing industrial divisions all advanced in August. Over the period April to August, 1963, employment expanded in forestry, showed little change in mining, and declined in construction. The decline in the last-named industry was the only substantial downward movement among the major industrial divisions.

In the service producing industrial divisions, the seasonally-adjusted indexes for trade and finance, insurance and real estate advanced in August. The increases in these divisions outweighed small declines in the remaining service producing industries. Since April, continued expansion in trade, in finance, insurance and real estate and in service has been the main factor offsetting the contraction in construction.


Provinces and Regions

The seasonally-adjusted industrial composites for Quebec, Ontario, the Prairie Region and British Columbia rose from July to August. The largest increases occurred in Ontario and British Columbia. In both provinces, larger-than-usual increases in manufacturing and trade were major factors. In Quebec, the industrial composite showed a small rise, as above-average increases in trade and construction

were offset in part by a smaller-than-seasonal advance in manufacturing and a contra-seasonal decline in mining. The only decrease was recorded in the industrial composite for the Atlantic Region where a contra-seasonal decline in manufacturing was the main factor in the reduction.

Average Weekly Wages and Salaries

The industrial composite of average weekly wages and salaries for August, at \$83.27, was unchanged from July. Per capita earnings in August were up from July in manufacturing, construction, transportation, storage and communication; public utility operation, and service. The increases were generally small, ranging from 8 cents in service to 53 cents in public utility operation. More important upward influences on per capita earnings were large employment increases in the relatively highly paid manufacturing and construction industries. The gains described above were offset in part by reductions in per capita earnings in forestry, mining, trade and finance, insurance and real estate. An added factor was small declines in employment in the mining and transportation, storage and communication divisions, where per capita earnings are above average, and a consequent reduction in their contribution to the general average of earnings.

Six provinces showed higher per capita earnings in August. Average earnings were down in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Ontario and British Columbia.

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NOTES

General.—The monthly surveys of employment and weekly payrolls relate to all branches of the following industrial divisions: forestry, mining, manufacturing, transportation, storage and communication, construction, public utilities, trade, finance, insurance and real estate, and to certain groups of the service industry, mainly hotels, restaurants, laundries and dry cleaning plants, recreational and business services. The surveys do not cover firms usually employing less than 15 persons, of which the number is very large in relation to their employment totals. Establishments reducing their staffs below this minimum are not necessarily removed from the mailing list. Data are requested for all classes of employees, irrespective of their functions in the business; statistics for the owners are excluded. Employers operating in two or more lines of business, or in different provinces or cities, are asked to furnish separate monthly returns for their establishments in the different units.

1. Coverage.—Virtual limitation of the surveys to firms with staffs of 15 and over results in a large and relatively even coverage of total employment in the included industries in most of the provinces and in the urban areas. The industrial representation, though large, is more uneven, the proportion of employees covered depending upon the organization of particular industries in larger or smaller units of operation. Complete information respecting the area and industry distributions of the working population is available only when the Decennial Censuses are taken, at place of residence. In 1951, data were not segregated for paid workers actually at work. Estimates of coverage that can be made are therefore conservative because they relate employees of reporting firms to all paid workers with jobs, including those absent from work without pay who would not be included in the monthly statistics of employment and payrolls. Estimates of coverage according to industrial divisions for Canada and the provinces are given in the first columns of Tables 3 and 4.

In these estimates, the Census figures for automobile repair have been moved from manufacturing to trade, since a large proportion of such work is carried on in retail establishments which do not furnish separate data for their sales and repair staffs.

In three industries (construction in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, transportation in Manitoba and public utility operation in British Columbia) the provincial proportions exceed 100 p.c., due to classification differences between the Census and the monthly surveys of establishments. This situation in construction in two provinces is probably due to short-term employment afforded by reporting highway construction establishments to workers whose main occupation is farming, in which they would be enumerated by the Census. Inclusion of

some railway employees reported monthly in Manitoba, who were elsewhere enumerated in the Census, results in a proportion of over 100 p.c. in the transportation, storage and communication group in that province. The high figure in public utility operation in British Columbia is likely a result of inclusion of employees in that industry who would be shown in either construction or transportation by the Census.

The following table contains provincial estimates of coverage of total wage-earners and salaried employees in all industries, including those in agriculture, government, education, health and other classes excluded from the monthly surveys, as well as paid workers in the industries that are included. The general estimate for Canada was 62 p.c.

It is important to note that the statistics of employees covered, as published in the monthly and annual reports, do not represent estimates of total numbers of paid workers in specified areas or industries, but show only the distributions of men and women on the staffs of the co-operating employers in the indicated periods, including their full-time, part-time and casual employees.

2. The Questionnaire used in the monthly surveys asks employers to state the number of wage-earners and salaried employees drawing pay in the last pay periods in the months, with their payroll disbursements in the same periods. The request for statistics for the last pay period in the month only is designed to prevent duplication in the employment count where individuals may appear on the payrolls of more than one employer in a period of several weeks. The workers reported are not necessarily employed for a period of a week, by any one establishment or by more than one. Workers on strike during the reported pay periods are not included in the statistics unless they draw pay from their employer; for example, take paid holidays during the dispute. Workers laid off without pay during the pay period as an indirect effect of industrial disputes are not counted as employed.

Employees and earnings are grouped according to the duration of their pay periods—monthly, semi-monthly, fortnightly, weekly, etc. Gross payrolls are requested before deductions are made for taxes, unemployment insurance contributions, etc. Overtime payments, cost-of-living allowances, commissions, incentive and production bonuses are included, as are payments for absences with pay in the reported pay periods. The statistics do not include employers' contributions to unemployment insurance, workmen's compensation and other welfare plans, nor do they include amounts paid for pensions, retirement gratuities, bonuses paid at irregular or infrequent intervals, and various other supplementary labour costs.

3. The Processing.—Statistics of wages and salaries reported for any period exceeding a week are reduced for tabulation purposes to one week's proportion of the totals, the numerators of the fractions used for this purpose being 5, 6 or 7 days, depending upon the number of days per week on which the establishment operated in the pay period; the denominators of the fractions are the numbers of working days in the different pay periods. For employees paid at annual or monthly rates, whose earnings are not affected by variations in the number of working days in the month, fixed proportions are used to reduce the earnings to a weekly basis, irrespective of the length of the calendar month. The sums resulting from these various calculations are then aggregated to give the total amounts which would be paid for services rendered in one week by the employees of the co-operating firms.

4. The Tabulation.—Data tabulated each month show the numbers of women and of workers of both sexes drawing pay from the establishments furnishing returns and their weekly payrolls, with similar information for employees of the same firms a month earlier, and in the base period (1949). The statistics first published for each month are preliminary; re-tabulation of the data on the succeeding month's tabulation permits incorporation of revisions in the material originally tabulated and inclusion of returns received too late for the preliminary tabulation.

5. The Index Numbers.—The index numbers of employment and payrolls represent the percentage relationships between employees of establishments currently furnishing data and their aggregate weekly earnings, and the corresponding 1949 averages of these employees. The 1949 figures of employment and payrolls for firms which have since gone out of business are continued in the basic averages; firms or branches opening for business since 1949 are tabulated with zero base figures. The basic averages of establishments which operated in 1949 but have since been added

to the mailing list, are incorporated in the base figures from the date when their co-operation was first obtained. The index numbers of average weekly wages and salaries relate the average earnings of persons employed by the reporting firms at a given date to the average earnings of their employees in 1949.

6. The Weekly Wages and Salaries.—The statistics of average weekly earnings result from the division of the aggregate weekly wages and salaries disbursed in the last pay periods in the month by the co-operating establishments, by the number of their full time and part-time employees in the same periods. The figures represent gross earnings, before deductions are made for unemployment insurance contributions, taxes, etc. In addition to basic wages and salaries, the earnings include overtime payments, shift premiums, commissions, cost-of-living, incentive and production bonuses, and other bonuses paid at frequent intervals. They also include amounts paid employees absent on leave with pay during the reported pay periods, i.e., during vacations, statutory holidays, sick leave, etc.

The earnings do not include the value of free board and lodging and other perquisites, employers' contributions to welfare funds such as workmen's compensation, pension, and unemployment insurance funds and supplementary unemployment benefits. Also excluded are the cost to employers of certain other employee benefits, such as bonuses paid at irregular or infrequent intervals, (e.g., annual bonuses), and retirement gratuities.

The revised figures of earnings in the monthly reports incorporate retroactive pay for one month, corrections in the material originally tabulated, and data received too late for inclusion in the first tabulation; for the most part, such adjustments are not carried back for more than one month.


7. Hourly Earnings.—Statistics of average hours and average hourly and weekly earnings of wage-earners for whom co-operating employers keep record of hours worked are contained in the monthly reports "Man-Hours and Hourly Earnings".


8. Urban Area Statistics.—Urban area statistics published in the present report include data for establishments situated in the urban areas as defined in the 1956 Census Bulletin 1-6, "Population—Incorporated Cities, Towns and Villages," except that the St. Catharines statistics include Port Colborne and Welland in addition to the defined urban area. Statistics given in the report for urban areas not defined in the above-named publication include Preston with Galt.

FOOTNOTES

Most of the footnotes are lists of names of industries that appear in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual which are grouped under special titles in employment and payroll publications. In some industries, the group breakdown shown in the tables is less extensive than in the Standard Industrial Classification; figures for the omitted categories however, are contained in the group totals.

- (a) **Gold mining** includes alluvial gold mining; auriferous quartz mining.
- (b) **Other metal mining** includes copper-gold-silver mining; iron mining; nickel-copper mining; silver-cobalt mining; silver-lead-zinc mining; miscellaneous metal mining.
- (c) **Non-metal mining** includes non-metal mining; quarrying, clay and sand pits.
- (d) **Other beverages** includes carbonated beverages; wines.
- (f) **Other leather products** includes leather gloves and mittens; leather tanneries; miscellaneous leather products.
- (g) **Saw and planing mills** includes plywood and veneer mills; sash, door and planing mills; sawmills.
- (h) **Other wood products** includes boxes and baskets (wood); morticians' goods; miscellaneous wood products.
- (i) **Other paper products** includes paper boxes and bags; roofing papers; miscellaneous paper products.
- (j) **Machinery manufacturing** includes household, office and store machinery; machine tools; machinery, n.e.c.
- (k) **Non-metallic mineral products** includes abrasive products; asbestos products; cement, hydraulic; clay products; glass and glass products; lime and gypsum products; stone products; concrete products; miscellaneous non-metallic mineral products.
- (l) **Other chemical products** includes explosives, ammunition and pyrotechnics; fertilizers; paints and varnishes; soaps, washing and cleaning compounds; toilet preparations; vegetable oil mills; primary plastics; miscellaneous chemical and allied products.
- (m) **Building** includes buildings and structures; special trade contractors. **General engineering** includes other construction, other than highways, bridges and streets.
- (n) **Water transportation** includes water transportation; services incidental to water transportation.
- (o) **Electric and motor transportation** includes bus and coach transportation-interurban; urban and suburban transportation systems; taxicab; truck transportation; services incidental to transportation; other transportation.
- (p) **Urban and interurban transportation** includes bus and coach transportation-interurban; urban and suburban transportation systems.
- (q) **Other public utilities** includes gas manufacture and distribution; water and sanitary services; other public utilities.
- (r) **Industrial Machinery** includes machine tools; machinery, n.e.c.
- (s) **The Northwest Territories** with the exception of Baffin Island are included in Alberta. Baffin Island is included in Quebec. The Yukon Territories is included in British Columbia.
- (t) **Synthetic textiles and silk** includes synthetic filament yarn and staple fibre; spun yarn and fabric.
- (u) **Durable goods manufacturing** includes wood, iron and steel, transportation equipment, non-ferrous metal, electrical apparatus and supplies and non-metallic minerals. The **non-durable group** includes the remaining manufacturing industries.
- (v) **Service** includes hotels, restaurants, laundries, dry cleaning plants, business, recreational services and miscellaneous services. Government, community and health services are **not** covered.
- (w) Estimates of coverage are based on comparisons of data for 1951 with Population Census Statistics. For details, see notes on page 1.





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
