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



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AVERAGE HOURLY EARNINGS IN SPECIFIED INDUSTRIES

MAN-HOURS AND HOURLY EARNINGS, SEPTEMBER, 1954.

Canada

Manufacturing.- The hourly earnings of hourly rated wage-earners in manufacturing at Sept. 1 averaged 139.6 cents, 1.3 cents lower than at Aug. 1, showing their third consecutive decline. Important factors in the recent reductions were (1) changes due to seasonal and other causes in the industrial, occupational and sex distributions of wage-earners, with expansion of employment among unskilled workers and in industries employing many women at the lower rates of pay, and curtailment in groups in which rates are above the general average, and (2) lessened incentive and production bonuses during the vacation period. In spite of the fall in the average in the last few months, the latest figure was the highest in the record for the time of year, 3.9 cents above its level 12 months ago.

The average hours reported in manufacturing generally were fractionally higher than in the week of Aug. 1, at 40.9, as compared with 41.0 in the corresponding week in 1953. The weekly wages, at \$57.10, were 25 cents less than in the preceding survey, but \$1.46 higher than at Sept. 1 of last year.

In the durable goods manufacturing group, there were substantial declines in the week of Sept. 1 in the aggregate hours, the earnings and the number of wage-earners reported. Lay-offs in automobile manufacturing due to model change-over and in agricultural implement factories, attributed to lack of orders, were the major changes. On the other hand, the aggregate hours worked in electrical apparatus factories were 4 p.c. longer than in the week of Aug. 1. There were also increases in the non-ferrous metal products group. The average hourly earnings in durable manufactured goods plants were 0.6 cents lower than a month previously, but 3.6 cents higher than 12 months ago.

Substantial increases in aggregate hours and earnings and in the number of wage-earners were reported in the non-durable goods industries between Aug. 1 and Sept. 1. The advances, which were mainly seasonal, occurred in industries such as canning, leather goods, textiles and clothing, where large numbers of women are employed. The hourly earnings declined in the light manufacturing industries by 1.4 cents in the month, but were 5.5 cents above their level at Sept. 1 of last year. The average hours were longer by 0.4 hours than in the preceding survey, while there was an insignificant decline of 5 cents in the average weekly wages.

Non-Manufacturing Industries.- Statistics in mining as a whole showed little change during the month. In coal mining, hours and earnings in Nova Scotia were lower, while Alberta firms reported heightened employment and longer hours. Oil and gas wells were less active than at Aug. 1, with a decline of 3.6 hours in the average time worked. In Quebec, there were upward revisions in wage rates in metal ore extraction.

In building construction, the aggregate and average hours and earnings were lower, partly because of the completion of engineering contracts in isolated localities where hours are above the general average. Highway construction was more active, notably in Quebec. The average hourly earnings fell with the employment of more unskilled labour.

Provinces





Average hourly earnings in manufacturing were higher at Sept. 1 than at Aug. 1 in Newfoundland, New Brunswick, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The other provinces showed declines varying from 0.4 cents in Nova Scotia to 1.8 cents in Ontario and British Columbia. The average weekly wages were higher in Newfoundland, Quebec and Alberta, and the average hours worked, in Newfoundland, Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba.

In Newfoundland, the higher earnings were partly due to greater overtime in the pulp and paper industry. Several factors contributed to the small reduction in Nova Scotia, notably changes in industrial distribution, a return to more usual working hours in the textile industry, and lessened employment in the relatively highly-paid transportation equipment industry. Increased employment and working time in pulp and paper mills in New Brunswick were mainly responsible for

a rise of 0.7 cents in hourly earnings in manufacturing generally in that area. The drop of 0.5 hours in the average working week resulted in part from shorter working hours in the food and beverage group, in clothing and in transportation equipment manufacturing.

The higher average working week in manufacturing in Quebec resulted from longer hours in the clothing, leather goods, printing and publishing, transportation equipment and some other industries. Changes in industrial distribution were mainly responsible for a drop of 1.1 cents in average hourly earnings. The most marked changes in aggregate hours were an 11.5 p.c. increase reported by clothing manufacturers, and a 7.3 p.c. drop in transportation equipment plants. Ontario reported the largest decline in average hourly earnings in any month in recent years, amounting to 1.8 cents. At 146.7 cents, the latest figure, however, was 2.4 p.c. above its level at Sept. 1, 1953. Increased aggregate hours in the clothing, textile, leather goods and canning industries, with large numbers and proportions of women, and lay-offs and reduced hours in the heavy industries, notably agricultural implement and automobile manufacturing, accounted for much of the decline in the average.

Lower earnings due to less overtime in printing and publishing, and lower aggregate hours in meat packing and transportation equipment works were partly responsible for a small reduction in hourly earnings in manufacturing, generally in Manitoba. Higher hourly earnings in the group in Saskatchewan reflected increased earnings in the petroleum and iron and steel product industries.

In Alberta, curtailment in employment for lower-paid seasonal help in canning factories, and heightened activity in iron and steel product plants and some other industries employing large numbers of men were largely responsible for a 1.5 cent rise in hourly earnings in manufacturing at Sept. 1.

Aggregate hours reported in fruit and vegetable canning factories in British Columbia increased by over 30 p.c. in the week under review, as compared with a month earlier. This influx of lower-paid seasonal workers, combined with somewhat shorter hours in plants producing durable manufactured goods, employing large numbers of men, lowered the general average in manufacturing by 1.8 cents.

Metropolitan Areas

The average hours worked in factories in Ottawa-Hull, Edmonton and Vancouver were insignificantly shorter in the week of Sept. 1 than in that of Aug. 1; there was no general change in Hamilton during the month. The averages in the other cities for which statistics are published in Table 3 were somewhat longer, the increases varying from 0.1 hours in Toronto and 0.2 hours in Windsor and Winnipeg, to 1.2 hours in London and 1.5 hours in St. Catharines. In the last-named, there was a substantial seasonal rise in the hours worked in canning factories. Many industries in London reported a longer working week.

The aggregate hours worked were less in Ottawa, Hamilton, Windsor and Vancouver. The losses amounted to 0.8 p.c. in Vancouver, 0.9 p.c. in Ottawa, 1.1 p.c. in Hamilton and 18 p.c. in Windsor. Lay-offs for model change-over in the automotive industries caused the sharp drop in Windsor. The other 8 cities listed reported higher aggregates of hours; the smallest increase was in Edmonton (0.3 p.c.), and the largest (4.6 p.c.) in Quebec, where shipbuilding and leather products were among the several industries working more hours than in the week of Aug. 1.

The average hourly earnings were higher in Quebec, Ottawa-Hull, London and Edmonton. The largest increase, that of a cent in London, was in part a result of overtime in the transportation equipment industry, in part due to higher earnings in the clothing industry, while a return to more normal operations following a strike in electrical apparatus manufacturing also contributed. In the other cities listed, the declines varied from 0.7 cents in Winnipeg to 3.4 cents in St. Catharines. The declines in hourly earnings reflected mainly changes in industrial and sex distributions. In Montreal, seasonally increased employment of women in the clothing industry, together with the release of men in several branches of the transportation equipment group, lowered the average earnings in manufacturing as a whole by 1.7 cents. However, higher hours per wage-earner resulted in an insignificant gain in the average weekly wages. The drop in St. Catharines largely resulted from an important rise in the number of casual workers in canning, with lessened activity in several of the durable goods industries where rates of pay exceed the general average. A reduction in employment and in overtime in shipbuilding was responsible in large part for a 1.9 cent decline in hourly earnings in Vancouver factories.

Note:- An explanation of the method used in computing the statistics of real wages as shown in Columns 2 and 4 appeared in the 1952 Annual Review of Man-Hours and Hourly Earnings.

Although calculations of real wages may reflect the experience of groups of workers fairly well, it should be noted that their dependability, particularly as they apply to individual wage-earners, rests upon certain important qualifications. Substantial variations within the group, such as marked changes in the proportions of men and women, or important shifts of employment between higher or lower paid areas, industries and occupations which may affect the wage averages, will in turn influence the real earnings series. Further, should important changes in spending habits occur in the interval, the estimates of change in real earnings are likely to be less reliable. The latter qualification is of particular importance over long periods of time.

It should also be kept in mind that measures of change in real earnings calculated from averages of gross earnings may differ from changes in the purchasing power of "take-home" pay, due to such factors as changes in personal income tax, and pay deductions for such things as social insurance and pension plans. Thus index numbers of real wages should not be interpreted as measuring fluctuations in the level of consumption of wage-earners or wage-earners' families; they are intended to show only the trend in purchasing power of wages over the items covered by the price index, and in addition to the factors already mentioned, do not take into account other family income or changes in the savings position of families.

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EXPLANATORY NOTES.

General.- The monthly statistics of average hours, average hourly earnings and average weekly wages, like those of employment, payrolls and average weekly wages and salaries, are based on data from establishments usually employing 15 persons and over. Statistics for the latest month are subject to revision.

Coverage.- Firms are asked to furnish information for the male and female wage-earners for whom they keep records of hours worked, so that the statistics relate, in the main, to hourly-rated wage-earners, or production workers, employed full time and part time. Casual workers are also included. Data for salaried personnel are purposely excluded. In many cases, information is not available for certain classes of wage-earners, whose earnings, like those of most salaried employees, are not directly dependent on the number of hours worked; examples of wage-earners frequently excluded are route-drivers, piece-workers in many but not all establishments, truck men, etc. Numerous employers do not keep record of man-hours for any classes of employees. The number of workers for whom information is given in the present report is therefore smaller than the total number of workers (wage-earners and salaried employees) for whom statistics of employment, payrolls, average earnings, sex distribution, etc., are given in the monthly bulletins on employment and payrolls. These contain a fuller explanation of the monthly data on employment, payrolls and man-hours.

In manufacturing, largely represented in the statistics of this report, the data relate to over 74 p.c. of all employees on the staffs of the firms co-operating in the monthly surveys of employment and payrolls; in 1951, the wage-earners for whom information on man-hours was obtained formed over 81 p.c. of the total number of wage-earners reported by practically all manufacturing establishments to the Annual Census of Manufactures, including hourly-rated and other wage-earners. In mining and construction, data on man-hours and hourly earnings are provided for approximately 78 p.c. and 72 p.c. of the total employees of firms co-operating in the monthly surveys of employment and payrolls in those industries, respectively; in 1948, the monthly statistics were based on approximately 89 p.c. and 54 p.c. of the total number of wage-earners reported to the Census of Mining and Census of Construction, respectively.

Man-Hours.- The statistics of man-hours include hours worked by full-time and part-time wage-earners, including overtime hours actually worked; premium or penalty hours credited for purposes of computing overtime payment are not included. Hours credited to wage-earners absent on leave with pay in the reported pay periods are included in the statistics as though the hours had been worked. The averages are obtained by dividing the aggregate hours reported for the week by the number of full-time and part-time wage-earners working such hours.

Wages.- The questionnaire calls for a statement of gross wages earned by the full-time and part-time wage-earners whose hours are reported, before deductions are made for taxes, unemployment insurance contributions, etc. Payments for overtime work, incentive or production, and cost-of-living bonuses paid at regular intervals, and amounts credited to wage-earners on leave with pay in the reported pay periods are included. The value of board and lodging, which in some cases is part of the renumeration of workers, is not included. Retroactive pay not earned during the reported pay period, and bonuses paid at infrequent intervals are also excluded.

Pay Periods.- Statistics of man-hours and wages reported for periods exceeding one week in duration are reduced by the appropriate proportions to calculate the number of hours and the wages in one week in the stated pay period. Such data are combined with weekly figures furnished by employers whose records are maintained on a weekly basis, so that, in all cases, the tabulated statistics represent the situation in one week in each month.

Footnotes.

The following footnotes explain the content of various industrial classes listed in the detailed tables in this bulletin. In some industries, the group breakdown is less extensive than in the Standard Industrial Classification; in these cases, figures for certain categories not shown are contained in the group totals.

- (a) Alluvial gold and auriferous quartz mining.
- (b) Copper-gold-silver; iron; nickel-copper; silver-cobalt; silver-lead-zinc and miscellaneous metal mining.
- (c) Non-metal mining and quarrying; clay and sand pits.
- (d) Miscellaneous wood products.
- (e) Paper boxes and bags; roofing papers; miscellaneous paper products.
- (f) Household, office and store machinery; machine tools; machinery, n.e.s.
- (g) Abrasives; asbestos; hydraulic cement; clay; glass; lime and gypsum; stone; concrete and miscellaneous non-metallic mineral products.
- (h) Buildings and structures; other construction; special trade contractors.
- (i) Interurban bus and coach and urban and suburban transportation systems; taxi-cab and truck transportation; services incidental to transportation; other transportation.
