## NOTE

A complete description of the method of collection and the statistics included in this series is given, together with other background detail, in part $C$ of this report.

## INTRODUCTION

This issue of "Federal Government Employment" reflects changes effected by the 1967-68 Estimates. The changes, which are varied, will be noted with the necessary detall under the relevant headings.

Civilian employment within the Public Service totalled 373.4 thousand at the end of April 1967. This was 3.8 thousand ( 1.0 p.c.) above the March total and 17.5 thousand ( 4.9 p.c.) more than in April 1966. At the same time payrolis increased to $\$ 190.3$ miliion, $\$ 6.4$ million ( 3.5 p.c.) more than in March 1967, and $\$ 24.0$ milion ( $14.4 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. ) greater than in Apri1 1966.

Aggregate payrolls for the first three months of 1967 amounted to $\$ 736.8$ million, compared to 8143.8 million for the same period in 1966.

The number of employees in this group increased during April 1967 to 147.2 thousand, 2.9 thousand ( 2.0 p.c.) more than the March figure of 144.3 thousand employees.

Gross payroll for the month amounted to $\$ 79.7$ miliion, $\$ 1.2$ million ( $1.6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$.) above the March payroll of $\$ 78.4$ million. Comparable figures for April 1966 were 137.4 thousand employees with earnings of $\$ 66.4$ million.

The Canadian Dairy Commission, established early this year is included in this publication for the flrst time, under Agency Corporations.

All crown corporations, with one or two minor exceptions, recorded increased employment. The two showing the greatest increases were the Canadian National Railways and the Canadian Corporation for the 1967 World Exhibition. The employment distribution by province indicated increases in all provinces except Newfoundland and New Brunswick, with the largest increase reported by Quebec.

Aggregate payroll January 1 to April 30, 1967 amounted to $\$ 309.1$ million, $\$ 45.7 \mathrm{million}$ (17.4 p.c.) over the first four months of 1966.

This issue reflects the administrative structure as indicated by the 1967-68 Estimates. Immediately following these comments is a table listing the structural changes and indicating the department, and the old and new branch or division.

At the end of April 1967, employees in Departments and Departmental Corporations numbered 226.2 thousand with a total payroll of $\$ 110.6 \mathrm{million}$. This represented an increase over the previous month, of $0.38 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. in personnel and $4.8 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. in payrolls. Comparable figures for April 1966 were 218.5 thousand employees and a payroll of $\$ 99.9 \mathrm{million}$.

The cumulative payrolls for the period January 1 to April 30, 1967 totalled $\$ 427.7$ million, 12.4 p.c. greater than for the same period in 1966.

An analysis by function indicates considerable variation from March, Some of these changes are of a seasonal nature, others are organizational. The following comments are made in relation to the more significant items:

1. The function "General Government-Research, Planning and Statistics" indicates an increase of casual employees over the number on strength at the end of March. These were Dominion Bureau of Statistics enumerators who usually complete their projects prior to the last working day of the month. The monthly projects during the month of April were not completed prior to the month-end.
2. A new function "General Government-Other" appears in this issue to reflect employment staEistics with respect to the Public Service Staff Relations Board. The Pay Research Bureau i.3 now attached to the Public Service Staff Relations Board. Employment statistics with ftspect to this organization have previously been included under the heading "Civil Service Examission'.
3. Public Works: Two groups of salaried employees, previously included under 'Transportation and Comminications - (a) Highways, Roads and Bridges, and (b) "Waterways" are now includee... under "General Government-Executive and Administrative". Detail required for a finer analysis is not available.
4. Health and Welfare: (a) "Health Insurance and Resources" now a separate branch, is included under "Health-General". It was previously a section of the branch Health Services and included under "Health - Hospital Care". Salarled employees only are affected by the change. (b) The function "Medical, Dental and Allied Services" is no longer in use, the salaried employees previously shown under that Group are now included under "Health - General". (c) The number of casual employees under "Other Social Welfare" has been increased by approximately 325 during April, to perform the additional work created by the Guaranteed Income Supplement Program.
5. Indian Affairs and Northern Development: An increase in the number of salaried employees is reflected under "Recreational and Cultural Services-Parks, Beaches and Other Recreational Axeas" due to the up-dating of the Central Personnel Record System.
6. Labour: Personnel, all salaried, of the Administration of International Labour Affairs* Division, previously included under "Social Welfare - Labour", are now included under "Other= International Cooperation and Assistance".
7. Fisheries: The International Fisheries Service* is a new branch and is included under "Other-International Cooperation and Assistance". It includes salaried employees only.
\#The functions from which these Branches were transferred were unaffected by the changes because the numbers in each Branch were few, and the function Groups are relatively large. However, the Laclusion of the two organizations under the function group "International Cooperation and Assistance" i引 noticesble as this is one of the smaller Groups.

The table below lists changes which are incorporated in the publication for the first time. They do not mecessarily represent increases or decreases of staff in the overall govermment body, neither do all changes entail a change in function. All changes were effective April $1,1967$.

An analysis of hirings and separations among salaried employees for the firgt three months of lg67 ahow few Wriations worthy of comment.

In general, the major re-organization began the previous year had been effected, and the employment pattern was more or less teady. Exceptions were the:
(1) Civil Service Comission which shows staff increases. At the time the department was in the midst of a reorgandzation and a change of identity. The Public Service Employment Act, which introduced the Public Service Comission, was proclaimed in February, 1966. Changes in this department can be expected to continue into the next quarterly Hirings and Separations Sumary when the Public Service Staff Relations Board was established.
(2) Fisherles Research Board where a staff decrease in indicated. The drop in employment results from a change of category and could be considered as a paper transfer. Seasonal employees, hired each year for a definite period not exceeding one year, were previously classified by Fisheries Research Board as "salaried". Beginning April i, 1967 these employees were clasalfied as "Casuals". Therefore, the March "separations" are actually transfers and these members will be reported in future ss "Casual" employees and, as such, are not included in this Sumary.
(3) Justice, where hirings appear high. This is a resuit of the governmenta decision to transfer the Legal Divisions of other departments to Justice. Action to achleve this transfer began in the quarter under review.
(4) Veterans Affairs where separations remain high, although slightly below the last quarter of 1966 . This reflects the gradual separation of Sunnybrook Hospital employees as Federal employees, to be absorbed into the nem organization under the Province of Ontario and Toronto University.

## Notes and Definitions:

This cable is published four times a year, in the January, April, July and october issues of this publication.

Owing to the fact that relatively small changes in the staff of small departments can result in erratic fiuctuations in the hiring and separation rates, such rates are not shown for "departments" with less than loo employees (indicated by $k$ ). The average hired and separated, as well as the average employment, are shown for the use of any perbon wishing to calculate such rates. However, aggregates for these depattments are given in "Total-Departments with less than 100 employees", as well as in "Total-A11 Departments".

The following definitions apply to this table:

1. "Hiring" means the appointment of a person to a salaried position (as defined on page 52 of this issue. Movements within a "department" are not considered as hirings unless they represent a change of category, i.e. from "prevailing rate" or "casual" to the salaried group.
2. "Separation" means the termination of service of an employee in the reporting "department" by leaving the Goverment Service or by transferring to another "deparment". Movements within a "department" are not considered as separations unless they represent a change of category, 1.e., co "prevailing rate" or "casual" from the salaried group.
3. "Department", for this table only, is altered to include deparmental branches or servicea having a separately administered personnel office.

## SECTION 1 - INTRODUCTION

## History

These statistics are derived through a monthly survey of Government of Canada employment and have been published since April 1952. The monthly report has had three different titles. From April 1952 to August 1953 it was known as "Government of Canada Employment and Payrolls". In the period September 1953 to March 1954 the title was "Federal Government Employment and Payrolls" and since April 1954 the name has been "Federal Government Employment". The monthly series replaces one formerly issued annually under several different titles, the first of which was "Statistics of the Civil Service of Canada". This report was issued amnually for the fiscal years ended March 31, 1925 to 1931. Combined reports with the above title were issued for the fiscal years ended 1932 to 1934; 1935 and 1936; and 1937 to 1939. The title was changed to "Summary Statistics of the Civil Service of Canada" and such reports were issued in a combined form for the fiscal years ended 1940 to 1942 and for each of the fiscal years ended 1943 to 1948. The title became "Summary Statistics, Federal Civil Service Employment and Payrolls" for the year ended March 31, 1949. For the years ended March 31, 1950, 1951 and 1952 three reports were issued entitled "Federal Civil Service Employment and Payrolls".

## Presentation

This monthly report is composed of three parts. INTRODUCTION (Table 1) sumarizes data on all persons employed by the Federal Government and its agencies. PART A (Table 2) presents employment data of agency and proprietary corporations and other agencies by province. A list of these appears on page 42. PART B consists of Tables 3 to 11 which present statistics relating to the departments and departmental corporations listed in the Financial Administration Act plus "Legislation", that is, employees of the Senate, House of Commons and Library of Parliament. Data on these are detailed in the table of contents on page 3. A table on numbers and rates of hirings and separations for salaried employees is included quarterly.

## Comparability with Former Survey

The statistical series produced on an annual basis for the years 1925 to 1952 was intended to include the number of permanent and temporary employees in the general administrative government services (this broadly speaking, included those coming under the Civil Service Act). In addition, the payrolls of certain classes of employees referred to as "non-enumerated" classes were shown in the publication. The survey did not include a count of these "non-enurnerated" classes. Since there was a distinct variation in the interpretation by departments of what constituted these groups, there were substantial differences between departments in the types of employees and payrolls included in the annual series.

The present series which comenced in April 1952 includes employees not formerly counted in the publications as well as a number of government services not previously included, and consequently the statistics should not be compared with the former annual series.

With the proclamation of the Public Service Employment Act in February 1967 the Public Service Commission was created and the Civil Service Commission no longer existed. Under the new Act its terms of reference were broadened to give it jurisdiction over the operational category which includes prevailing rate classes.

## Extent of Coverage

Includes: Departments (including deputy ministers and ministers' Staffs) and departmental corporations. Proprietary and Agency Corporations and other agencies
Members of Boards, Comissions and other government organizations, who serve on a full time basis with salaries fixed accordingly.
Royal Canadian Mounted Police (uniformed and civilian members).

## Comparability between Numbers and Earnings

The user of these statistics is advised to avoid making direct comparisons between the numbers of employees reported and the payrolls reported, the reason for this being that numbers relate to the last day of the month wherever possible and otherwise to the final pay period of the month. Since in certain categories, especially casual employment, considerable fluctuations in numbers employed frequently occur during a month, it will be seen that a comparison between the payrolls of all persons employed during the month and the number on strength at the end of the month would, in many cases, not be valid.

## Weta of these Statistics

Users of the statistics fall into four main categories. These axe:

1. Those who wish to use summary data and identify government as an employer. In this category are included those persons who wish to relate the significance of government as an employer to business in general.
2. Persons interested in an alysis of the administrative structure of the Federal Government. These, in the main, include government departments themselves. The administrative analyses of data as presented in tables 8 and 9 of the publication permit a comparison between the number of staff employed as reported in the publication and the number of positions established for each administrative branch of the government as published in the annual Estimates of Canada. This is, of course, mainly an administrative use which is of value to the Treasury Board and to the Public Service Commission as well as the various government departments. A further administrative use of the data is to determine the significance of the labour input factor through an analysis of wage costs as a proportion of total expenditures by vote or other administrative unit.
3. Persons wishing to make a comparison between the Federal Government and other levels of government or between the Federal Government now and in past years do so through the use of the function analy5 is which is described fur ther commencing on page 45.
4. The final group of users are those who are interested in government as an employer in each of the principal industries. For this purpose the data must be analysed on a Standard Industrial classification basis. This analysis, to date, has not been undertaken but it is intended that it should be in the near future. The application of this analysis to the Federal Government and following afterwards to the provincial and municipal governments will permit the assessment of the degree to which governments and their corporations have become significant employers in each industry.

Besides federal government officers, users include persons and firms undertaking labour research on behalf of industry, provincial and municipal governments, university research officers, business tirms and private citizens. In addition, a substantial number of enquiries originate in the House of fiommons and the press.

A description of the sources of data and the means by which the information is submitted and prepared for use is contained in the following outline.

## SECTION 2 - DESCRIPTION OF THE TABLES

INTRODUCTION - TOTAL FEDERAL GOVERNMENT EMPLOYMENT AND PAYROLLS (TABLE 1)
Table 1 assembles employees belonging within the following categories:
(A) Agency and proprietary corporations and other agencies:
(1) agency corporations
(2) proprietary corporations
(3) other agencies
(B) Departments and departmental corporations:
(1) departments, branches and services
(2) departmental corporations

The first three record as gross payrolls all monies paid to the employees covered while the later two combine overtime payrolls and retroactive payments reported with regular payrolls to obtain gross payrolls.

## PART A - AGENCY AND PROPRIETARY CORPORATIONS AND OTHER AGENCIES (TABLE 2)

Statistics for these organizations are collected in two ways: (l) directly from the corporation or agency; (2) through the Employment Section of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The statistics reported do not permit a presentation by class, i.e. salaried, casuals and others, etc., hence composite figures are published. In most cases, employees reported represent the staff strength during the final pay period of the month. Gross payrolls are reported and they accordingly include overtime and other types of special payments in addition to regular salaries and wages. The Glossary on page 51 of this report contains definitions of these two types of corporations. The "Other Agencies" though not listed or defined in the Financial Administration Act are nevertheless organizations of the Crown.

PART B - DEPARTMENTS AND DEPARTMENTAL CORPORATIONS (TABLES 3 TO 11)

## Salaried Employees

Salaried employees used in this report mean all persons paid on the basis of a stated annual salary rate, with the exception of the group known as "ships' officers". The latter group are excluded because of their special treatment under the Financial Administration Act. For a more complete definition of "salaried employees" see the Glossary.

The basic data is recorded in two ways:
(1) By employee:

Individual position records are maintained for the majority of salaried positions in the departments and departmental corporations of the Government of Canada (the remainder will be treated in the next paragraph). The position record cards contain data on the occupants of these positions. The records are amended monthly on the basis of documents received authorizing changes concerning positions and/or their occupants - thus affording a count of persons employed on the last day of the month. Because of an unavoidable time lag in the routing of position and personnel changes through normal channels, it is not always possible to include all changes in the appropriate month. The count of employees for a given month, therefore, will not always represent the exact staff strength at the end of that month. Regular payrolls, being based on the annual salary rates of employees on strength at the month's end, will not necessarily equal the actual amounts paid in salaries during the month. These factors do not seriously affect the validity of the statistics.
(2) Wy group of employees:

W individual position records are maintained for the remainder of salaried employees in departhents and departmental corporations. Statistics on these employees are collected by means of reports giving: the staff strength at the end of the month, regular payrolls for the month, including amounts paid to those off-strength at the end of the month, retroactive payments and overtime payments. All salaried "locally-engaged" employees in foreign countries are also reported on forms. See the Glossary for definition.

## Non-salaried Employees

Statistics on non-salaried employees (prevailing rate, casuals and others) including ships' officers and crews in departments and departmental corporations are collected, in all cases, by means of reports. These summary reports based on payroll and other records indicate the staff strength, regular payrolls, retroactive payments and overtime payments. Casual "locally-engaged" employees are also reported by this means. The ships' officers, which are in fact salaried employees, are included in the non-salaried group owing to their special treatment under the Financial Administration Act.

## Departmental Corporations

The Departmental Crown Corporations fall under Schedule $B$ of the Financial Administration Act, soe the Clossary for definitions. The following lists the Departmental Corporations included in the tables on Departments and Dopartmental Corporations.

Mirings and Separations of Salaried Employees
Data on hirings and separations of salaried employees was first published in the Federal Government Employment report for December 1959 and covered the quarter October 1 to December 31, 1959. This table, included in the monthly report once each quarter, records hiring and separation averages and rates by department. "Department", as defined for use in hiring and separation statistics only, means a department, a departmental branch or departmental service which has a separately administered personnel office. For this reason, organizations such as the Fisheries Research Board which is included under a departmental heading (Fisheries) in the main tables are accorded separate dupurantal status in the table on staff turnover.
fuch "department" is considered for purposes of turnover statistics as a separate employing agoney. Consequently, movements of personnel between "departments" are treated in the same way as movements into and out of the government service. The aggregate hirings and separations are summed ury in "Total - all Departments". It should be noted, therefore, that hiring and separation data for the entire Government of Canada as an employer cannot be secured from this table. The difference between this and the "Total - all Departments" would equal the number of inter-departmental movements which are, in fact, relatively few.

It should also be noted that the totals shown in this table differ from hiring and separation data puhlished by the Public Service Conmission of Canada. The latter organization treats all staff amployed under the authority of the Public Service Employment Act as a complete unit and consequently is concerned only with movements into and out of "Act" employment. The Commission therefore is not concerned with inter-departmental movements of employees but on the other hand is concerned with novements of staff to and from "Act" employment even when such movements occur within a department.

The glossary of terms on page 51 should be referred to for definitions of certain terms used in the table on hirings and separations. These terms are:

1. Average employment (p. 52, item 22)
2. Monthly average (as pertains to hirings and separations) (p. 52, item 23)
3. Monthly rate per 1,000 employees (as pertains to hirings and separations) (p. 52, item 24).

Owing to the fact that relatively small changes in the staff of small departments can result in arratic lluctuations in the hiring and separation rates, such rates are not shown for "departments" with less than 100 employees. The average hired and separated, as well as the average employment, are shown for the use of any person wishing to calculate such rates.

## CLASSIFICATION BY FUNCTION

The shetistics of departments and departmental corporations are classified in tables 6 and 7 by function. The purpose of providing a classification by function is to supply a means of studying the operations of governments without the complications resulting from differences in administrative establishments which occur from time to time in each government and between governments.

This anmbsis is useful in thoe ways. First it permits a dotailed study of amployment the Government of Canada aceording to the main purposes or functions. Since chese functions are not subject to the periodic changes which alter the administrative structure of the government, it is possible to develop a statistical series which, with minor exceptions, is consistent over an extended period of time. Second, since differences in administrative establishments are eliminated, it is possible to make meaningful comparisons between federal government expenditures on employment and similar expenditures by other levels of government. Third, an analysis of the relationship between expenditures on employment and total expenditures can be made with regard to each function. The use of percentages will facilitate comparisons especially between levels of govermments.

The classification by function reflects the purpose served by the expenditure, and employment statistics presented on this basis have been classified in accordance with concepts evolved by the Govermments Division of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics for the presentation of financial statistics. The following listing shows how the administrative detail has been applied to the various functions and will serve to indicate clearly the meaning of each function.

## Ci.OSSARY OF PRINCIPAL TERMS USED

1. Department: Departments are the named divisions of the Government of Canada as defined in the Financial Administration Act.
2. "Department": As used in the quarterly table on hirings and separation, is broadened to include branches or services having a separately administered personnel office. The reason for this is because movements to and from these "departments" constitute hirings and separations.
3. Crown corporation: A corporation which is ultimately accountable, through a Minister to Parliament for the conduct of its affairs, and includes the corporations named in the Financial Administration Act in Schedule $B$ as departmental corporations, in Schedule $C$ as agency corporations and in Schedule D as proprietary corporations.
4. Departmental corporation: A crown corporation which is a servant or agent of Her Majesty in right of Canada and is responsible for administrative, supervisory, or regulatory services of a governmental nature.
5. Agency corporation: A Crown corporation which is an agent of Her Majesty in right of Canada and is responsible for the management of trading or service operations on a quasi-comercial basis, or for the management of procurement, construction or disposal activities on behalf of Her Majesty in right of Canada.
6. Proprietary corporation: A Crown corporation which (1) is responsible for the management of lending or financial operations, or for the management of commercial and industrial operations involving the production of, or dealing in, goods and the supplying of services to the public, and (2) is ordmarily required to conduct its operations without appropriations from the Federal Treasury.
7. Other agencies: These are organizations which are not listed in the Financial Administration Act as departments or departmental agency or proprietary Crown corporations but are, nevertheless, organizations of the Federal Government. Because of their nature, they have been classed with agency and proprietary Crown corporations.
8. Salaried employee: An employee who is paid on the basis of an annual salary rate and occupies a salaried position authorized by the Treasury Board or the Privy Council. These employees and positions may be of a continuing, term, seasonal, sessional, or part time nature. The positions are specified together with appropriate funds, in the Estimates of Canada and supplementary authorizing documents and are located in departments and departmental corporations subject to the regulation of the Treasury Board. Ships' officers are not classified as salaried owing to their special treatment under the Financial Administration Act.
9. Prevailing rate employee: A person employed in the Public Service of Canada whose remuneration is based on the rate of pay prevailing in the area where he is employed for the class of work he does. His rate of pay may also be based on rates prevailing in any area in Canada for work comparable to that which he does. The rates may be hourly, dally, weekly or monthly. These employees are subject to the Prevailing Rate Employees General Regulations (Financial Administration Act). They are occupants of positions authorized by the Treasury Board. The positions, together with appropriate funds, are listed in the Estimates of Canada and supplementary authorizing documents.
10. Ships' officer: A person employed in the Public Service for duty on a ship that is the property of, or chartered by, or on behalf of, Her Majesty as a master, mate or marine engineer who is duly certified under the Canadian Shipping Act or in a position designated by the Treasury Board as that of a ship's officer. Excluded are members of the Armed Forces and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. An annual rate of pay is determined by the Treasury Board after consultation with the Department of Labour. These employees are subject to the Ships' Officers Regulations (Financial Administration Act). They are occupants of positions established by the Treasury Board, these positions, together with appropriate funds, are listed in the Estimates of Canada and supplementary authorizing documents.
11. Ships' crew employee: A person employed in the Public Service for duty on a ship that is the property of, or chartered by, or on behalf of, Her Majesty as an unlicensed crew member. Excluded are members of the Armed Forces and Royal Canadian Mounted Police. These employees are paid on the basis of a monthly salary rate determined by the Treasury Board after consultation with the nepartment of Labour. They are subject to the Ships' Crew Regulations (Financial Administration Act). These employees are occupants of positions established by the Treasury Board, these positions, together with approprlate funds, are listed in the Estimates of Canada and supplementary authorizing documents.
12. Casual and other employees: All employees in Departments and Departmental corporations of the Government of Canada who are not defined as Salaried, Prevailing Rate, Ships' Officer or Ships' Crew employees.
13. Locally-Engaged employees: These are residents of foreign countries, employed by the Government of Canada to perform duties in the country in which they live. Their salary or wage is stated in the currency of the country where they are employed. Salaried locally-engaged employees occupy positions: (1) as Assistants; (2) in classes having the suffix U.K. i.e., Clerk 2(UK), Stenographer l(UK), etc. While most are salaried, some are employed on a casual basis. The term "locally-engaged" excludes Canadian employees posted abroad.
14. Regular payroll - The basic wage and salary payments to employees during a specified period of time, excluding types mentioned below, but before deductions for income tax, etc. Includes payroll for all those employed during the month whether they were on strength at the end of the month or not. If there were semi-monthly, fortnightly or weekly payments in a month, the total amount-paid for the month constitutes the "Regular payroll".
15. Payrolls: For agency and proprietary corporations and other agencies this term means gross payments, including overtime, retroactive pay and other special payments in addition to regular payrolls. For departments and departmental corporations, these are limited to regular payrolls plus overtime and retroactive pay.
16. Retroactive payments: Payments covering adjustments applicable to prior months resulting from salary increases. Data are included in the month during which the payments are made even though the adjustments may cover several months.
17. Overtime payments: Payments for work done beyond the normal working hours. Data are included in the month during which the payments are made even though the payments may cover overtime worked during previous months.
18. Administrative classification: This is an analysis of the departments and departmental corporations to provide statistical detail on their principal units i.e. branches, boards, commissions, etc. These principal units cover most of those identified in the annual Estimates of Canada.
19. Classification by function: The classification by function reflects the purpose served by the various Services of the Government. Its purpose is to afford comparability of data over a number of years and with other levels of governments without the complicating factor of periodical structural changes of departments and the differences of structures of other levels of governments. For further details, see page 45.
20. Hiring: The initial appointment of a person to the reporting "department" whether as a new employee in the Government Service or by transfer from another "department". Movements within a department are not considered as hirings. For purposes of hirings and separations only, the term "department" as used above is broadened to include branches or services having a separately administered personnel office.
21. Separation: The termination of service of an employee in the reporting "department" by leaving the Government Service or by transfer to another "department". Movements within a "department" are not considered as separations. For purposes of hirings and separations only, the term "department" as used above is broadened to include branches or services having a separately administered personnel office.
22. Average employment: As used in the table on hirings and separations represents the mean monthly average number of employees in each "department" during the quarter.
23. Monthly average (as it pertains to hirings and separations): represents the arithmetic mean 1.e. one third of the actual hirings and separations for the quarter.
24. Monthly rate per 1,000 employees (as it pertains to hirings and separations); the rate is computed by the following formula:
