## INTRODUCTION

This issue provides information on Feder al Goverment Employment for the three month period (second quarter) ending June 30,1968 . Included herein are the changes in the administrative structure as indicated in the 1968-69 Estimates, tabled in the House of Commons in February. A statement showing these changes is included in Part $B$ of this report.

Total civilian employment, within the Public Service, was 375.4 thousand at June $30,1968$. This was 6.1 thousand or 1.6 per cent over the total at March 31, 1968 but 17.5 thousand or 4.6 per cent lower than the total at June 30,1967 . Payrolls for the second quarter amounted to $\$ 577.3$ milIion a decrease of 0.7 per cent from the first quarter but an increase of 0.1 per cent over the secand quarter 1967.

Cumulative payrolls for the first six months of 1968 amounted to $\$ 1,159$ million an increase of 2.0 per cent over the first six months of 1967.

PART A - AGENCY CORPORATIONS, PROPRIETARY CORPORATIONS AND OTHER AGENCIES AND CORPORATIONG
Staff strength in this group increased during the quarter, to 136.2 thousand employees at the end of June 1968 , 17 per cent greater than for March, but 14.6 per cent below the June 1967 employment.

Gross payrolls for the quarterly period at $\$ 225.9$ million, were slightly less than for the previous quarter and 8.8 per cent below the figure for the same period of 1967. Employment decreases were shown for the Eastern provinces, including Quebec, whereas the payroll decreases were shown for: Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec and Manitoba.

Cumulative payroll for the six months, January to June 1968 , amounted to $\$ 453.7$ million, a decrease of 4.9 per cent from the same period of 1967.

## NML B - DEPARTNUNTS AND DEPARTMENTAL CORPORATIONS

The number of employees within this category as at June 30,1968 , was 239.2 thousand. This was an increase of 1.6 per cent over the total at March 31,1968 and an increase of 2.5 per cent over the total as at June 30,1967 . Regular payrolls for this quarter amounted to $\$ 342$ million, an increase of $\$ 6.2 \mathrm{million}$ or 1.8 per cent over the preceding quarter. Gross payrolls, on the other hand, decreased from the previous quarter. This decrease was due to the inclusion, in the preceding quarter, of the payments of retroactive salary increases. Cumulative payrolls for the first six months of 1968 amounted to $\$ 704.9$ million, as compared to $\$ 646.0$ million for the first six months of 1967 .

The nomenclature of certain functions (Tables 6 and 7) has been changed to conform with that used in other publications of the Governments Division. The functions affected were (a) Telephone, Telegraph and Wireless, changed to Teleconmunication, (b) Public Service and Trading Enterprises, changed to Own Enterprises, (c) Civil Defence, changed to Emergency measures and (d) Bullion and Coinage, changed to Royal Canadian Mint. A new function "National Capital region planning and development", has been included in Tables 6 and 7. Because this new function does not come within the category of an administrative unit it is not included in Tables 8 and 9 . Therefore the totals for Tables 8 and 9 will be less than the totals for Tables 6 and 7 .

The analysis, by function, of the number of employees as at June 30 , indicates several variations when compared to the number as at March 31. Many of these variations are the result of seasonal employment which increases each spring, while others are the result of departmental reorganizations.

The following statements set out the changes in the administrative structure and provide information on the above mentioned variations in employment.

## HIRINGS AND SEPARATIONS

Apri1 - June 1968

## Comments

In March 1968 the Government "froze" employment within the departments. As one would expect, a comparison of hirings and separations for the first and second quarters show the effect of the order.

The Department of the Secretary of State showed the largest average increase (11 p.c.) during the three month period, due to the phasing out of the Centennial Comission. The Centennial Commission was responsible to the secretary of state but, being a crown corporation, was not included in these quarterly summaries. With the approaching end of Centennial year, employees of che Centennial Commission were re-assigned to various departments, prior to the end of 1967. Those remaining on strength at the end of March 1968 were transferred to the Department of the Secretary of State.

The Post Office has increased its members by $300-400$. The increase is a "status" change only, from Semi-staff offices to full operational status. These changes have been occuring for some months and are expected to continue until all semi-staff offices become part of "Operations".

## Notes and Definitions

This table shows for the three month period, by department and sex:
(a) Average employment
(b) Monthly average (pertaining to hirings and separations)
(c) Monthly rate per 1,000 employees (pertaining to hirings and separations)

Owing to the fact chat relatively small changes in the staff of small departments can result in erratic fluctuations in the hiring and separation rates, such rates are not shown for "departments" with less than 100 employees (indicated by*). The average hired and separated, as well as the average employment, are shown for the use of any person wishing to calculate such rates. However, aggregates for these departments are given in "Total-Departments with less than 100 employees", as well as in "Total-A11 Departments".

The following definitions apply to this table:

1. "Hiring" means the appointment of a person to a salaried position (as defined on page 50 ). Movements within a department are not considered as hirings.
2. "Separation" means the termination of service of an employee in the reporting "department" by leaving the Government Service or by transferring to another "department". Movements within a "department" are not considered as separations.
3. "Department", for this table only, is altered to include departmental branches or services having a separately administrated personel office.

## GLOSSARY OF PRINCIPAL TERMS USED

1. Department: Departments are the named divisions of the Government of Canada as defined in Schedule A of the Financial Administration Act.
2. "Department": As used in the quarterly table on hirings and separations, is broadened to include branches or services having a separately administered personnel office.
3. Crown corporation: A corporation which is ultimately accountable, through a Minister to Parliament for the conduct of its affairs, and includes the corporations named in the Financial Administration Act in Schedule B as departmental corporations, in Schedule C as agency corporations and in Schedule $D$ as proprietary corporations.
4. Departmental corporation: A crown corporation which is a servant or agent of Her Majesty in right of Canada and is responsible for administrative, supervisory, or regulatory services of a governmental nature. These are defined in Schedule B of the Financial Administration Act.
5. Agency corporation: A Crown corporation which is an agent of Her Majesty in right of Canada and is responsible for the management of trading or service operations on a quasi-commercial basis, or for the management or procurement, construction or disposal activities on behalf of Her Majesty in right of Canada.
6. Proprietary corporation: A Crown corporation which (1) is responsible for the management of lending or financial operations, or for the management of comercial and industrial operations involving the production of, or dealing in, goods and the supplying of services to the public, and (2) is ordinarily required to conduct its operations without appropriations from the Federal Treasury.
7. Other agencies and corporations: These are organizations which are not listed in the financial Administration Act as departments, agency or proprietary Crown corporations but are, nevertheless, organizations of the Federal Government. Because of their nature, they have been classed with agency and proprietary Crown corporations.
8. Salaried employee: An employee whose remuneration is based on an annual rate and who occupies a salaried position authorized by the Treasury Board or the Privy Council. These employees and positions may be of a continuing, term, seasonal, sessional, or part-time nature. The positions are specified together with appropriate funds, in the Estimates of Canada and supplementary authorizing documents and are located in departments and departmental corporations subject to the regulation of the Treasury Board. Ships' officers are not classified as salaried owing to their special treatment under the Financial Administration Act.
9. Prevalling rate employee: A person employed in the Public Service of Canada whose remuneration is based on the rate of pay prevailing in the area where he is employed for the class of work he does. His rate of pay may also be based on rates prevailing in any area in Canada for work comparable to that which he does. The rates may be hourly, daily, weekly or monthly. These employees are subject to the Prevailing Rate Employees General Regulations (Financial Administration Act). They are occupants of positions authorized by the Treasury Board. The positions, together with appropriate funds, are listed in the Estimates of Canada and supplementary authorizing documents.
10. Ships' officer: A person employed in the Public Service for duty on a ship that is the property of, or chartered by, or on behalf of, Her Majesty as a master, mate or marine engineer who is duly certified under the Canadian Shipping Act or in a position designated by the Treasury Board as that of a ship's officer. Excluded are members of the Armed Forces and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. An annual rate of pay is determined by the Treasury Board after consultation with the Department of Labour. These employees are subject to the Ships' Officers Regulations (Financial Administration Act). They are occupants of positions established by the Treasury Board, these positions, together with appropriate funds, are listed in the Estimates of Canada and supplementary authorizing documents.
11. Ships' crew employee: A person employed in the Public Service for duty on a ship that is the property of, or chartered by, or on behalf of, Her Majesty as an unlicensed crew member. Excluded are members of the Armed Forces and Royal Canadian Mounted Police. These employees are paid on the basis of a monthly salary rate determined by the Treasury Board after consultation with the Department of Labour. They are subject to the Ships' Crew Regulations (Financial Administration $\mathrm{Act})$. These employees are occupants of positions established by the Treasury Board, these positions, together with appropriate funds, are listed in the Estmates of Canada and supplementary authorizing documents.
12. Casual and other employees: All employees in Departments and Departmental corporations of the Government of Canada who are not defined as Salaried, Prevailing Rate, Ships' Officer or Ships' Crew employees.
13. Locally-Engaged employees: These are residents of foreign countries, employed by the Government of Canada to perform duties in the country in which they live. Their salary or wage is stated in the currency of the country where they are employed. Salaried locally-engaged employees occupy positions: (1) as Assistants; (2) in classes having the suffix U.K. i.e., Clerk 2 (UK), Stenographer 1 (UK), etc. While most are salaried, some are employed on a casual basis. The term "locally-engaged" excludes Canadian employees posted abroad.
14. Regular payroll - The basic wage and salary payments to employees during a specified period of time, excluding types mentioned below, but before deductions for income tax, etc.
15. Payrolls: For agency and proprietary corporations and other agencles this term means gross payments, including overtime, retroactive pay and other special payments in addition to regular payrolls. For departments and departmental corporations, these are limited to regular payrolls plus overtime and retroactive pay.
16. Retroactive payments: Payments covering adjustments applicable to prior months resulting from salary increases. Data are included in the month which payment is made.
17. Overtime payments: Payments for work done beyond the normal working hours. Data are included in the month during which the payments are made even though the payments may pertain to overtime worked during previous months.
18. Administrative classification: This is an analysis of the departments and departmental corporations to provide statistical detail on their principal units i.e. branches, boards, comaissions, etc. These principal units include most of those identified in the annual Estimates of Canada.
19. Classification by function: The classification by function indicates the service provided by Government. Its purpose is to afford comparability of data over a number of years and with other levels of government without the complicating factor of periodic structural changes of departmests and the differences of structures of other levels of government. For further details, see page
20. Hiring: The inftial appointment of a person to the reporting "department" whether as a new employee in the Government Service or by transfer from another "department". Movements within a department are not considered as hirings. For purposes of hirings and separations only, the term "department" as used above is broadened to include branches or services having a separately administered personnel office.
21. Separation: The termination of service of an employee in the reporting "department" by leaving the Government Service or by transfer to another "department". Movements within a "department" are not considered as separations. For purposes of hirings and separations only, the term "department" as used above is broadened to include branches or services having a separately administered personnel office.
22. Average employment: As used in the table on hirings and separations represents the mean monthly average number of employees in each "department" during the quarter.
23. Monthly average (as it pertains to hirings and separations): represents the arithmetic mean i.e. one third of the actual hirings and separations for the quarter.
24. Monthly rate per 1,000 employees (as it pertains to hirings and separations); the rate is computed by the following formula:
