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THE HISTORY OF THE

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT EMPLOYMENT STATISTICS

Explanatory Notes

The present statistics are the result of a monthly survey of Government of Canada employment published since April, 1952. During its period of publication this monthly report has had three different titles. In the period April, 1952 to August, 1953, it was known as "Government of Canada Employment and Payrolls". In the period September, 1953 to March, 1954 the report was known as "Federal Government Employment and Payrolls" and since April, 1954 the name of the publication has been "Federal Government Employment". The monthly statistical series replaces one formerly issued annually under several different titles the first of which was "Statistics of the Civil Service of Canada". This report was issued annually for the fiscal years ended March 31, 1925 to 1931. Combined reports with the above title were issued for the fiscal years ended 1932 to 1934; 1935 and 1936; and 1937 to 1939. The title of the report was changed to "Summary Statistics of the Civil Service of Canada". Reports under this title were issued in a combined form for the fiscal years ended 1940, to 1942 and for each of the fiscal years ended 1943 to 1948. The title was again changed to "Summary Statistics, Federal Civil Service Employment and Payrolls" for the year ended March 31, 1949. For the years ended March 31, 1950, 1951 and 1952 three reports were issued entitled "Federal Civil Service Employment and Payrolls".

These statistics are presented in a form which is intended to facilitate, among other uses, direct comparisons between (a) numbers employed as presented in this publication and (b) the number of positions established as shown in the Estimates of Canada.

Table 1 includes statistics relating to Departments and Departmental Corporations as listed in Schedules A and B of the Financial Administration Act, and in addition, the Auditor General's Office, Legislation (including the Senate, House of Commons and Library of Parliament) and the Privy Council (including the Privy Council Office and the Prime Minister's Residence). Table 2 includes the Agency and Proprietary Corporations etc. set out in Schedules C and D of the Financial Administration Act, and as listed in a later part of this text. Tables 3 and 4 (summarized in Table 1) are based on an administrative classification which may be directly compared in most cases, with the Estimates of Canada for 1956-57. In these tables the totals which are shown exclude "casuals and others".

The statistics relate only to civilian employees and members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Force (which being a semi-military organization are not considered as being civilians). Members of the Armed Services are excluded. Deputy Ministers are included in the staffs of Departmental Services but Ministers of the Crown and the Solicitor-General are excluded. For Boards, Commissions and other Agencies those members or officers serving on a full-time basis, and whose salaries are fixed accordingly, are included, whereas directors or board members, who are paid on a per diem basis, or who receive a nominal honourarium for their services, are excluded.

A description of the sources of data and the bases upon which the information is submitted and prepared for use in these statistics is contained in the following outline:

DEPARTMENTS AND DEPARTMENTAL CORPORATIONS (Tables 1, 3 and 4)

CLASSIFIED POSITIONS

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics maintains individual position records on an establishment basis for what are called "classified positions" in the various departments and branches of government, the employees of which come within the general purview of Treasury Board Regulation and Control. A tabulation from these records provides a count of the number of employees and their salary rate. Because of an inevitable timelag in the routing of position and personnel changes through

normal Civil Service channels and the posting of these changes on Bureau of Statistics records, it is not always possible to include all of the changes for the previous month. The count of employees for any given month, therefore, will not necessarily represent exactly the number of staff actually on strength at the end of the month. The earnings given for employees in the classified positions, being based on annual salary rates, will not necessarily equal the actual amounts paid in salaries in any given month. These factors, however, are not considered to be of such significance as to seriously affect the usefulness of the statistics.

Permanent, temporary and term employees are all included in the classified category and no attempt is made to prepare separate statistics on each. In addition to the records maintained for classified positions individual position records are also maintained for the following boards, commissions and agencies:

EXEMPT CLASSES

Prevailing Rates, Ships' Officers and Ships' Crews, and Casuals and Others are not maintained on individual position records as is the case in connection with classified positions. The Bureau of Statistics obtains data on these staffs by means of special reports taken from payroll records. Since these reports are prepared on the basis of pay periods they may be said to represent the actual amounts paid out to employees during each month.

AGENCY AND PROPRIETARY CORPORATIONS AND OTHER

QUASI-INDEPENDENT GOVERNMENT BODIES (Table 2)

Statistics for this group do not provide for any segregation between what are termed classified and exempt employees. Accordingly, these data include what might be termed to be continuing salaried employees as well as prevailing rate and casual employees. The information shown on table 2 is obtained in two ways. The Employment Statistics Section of the Bureau of Statistics provide information with respect to the following:

COMPARABILITY WITH FORMER SURVEY

The old statistical series on an annual basis for the years 1925 to 1952 was intended to include only the number of permanent and temporary employees in the general administrative departments of government (this generally speaking included those coming under the Civil Service Act). The survey did not include a count of what were described as "non-enumerated" classes. Since there was a distinct difference in the interpretation by various departments of what constituted "non-enumerated" classes there was a difference in the coverage of employees included in the annual series. Since the monthly series includes groups of employees not formerly included as well as various government services not formerly covered the statistics should not be compared with the former annual series.

DESCRIPTIONS OF PRINCIPAL TERMS USED

1. Department: Also known as departmental services, departments are the named divisions of the Government of Canada as defined in the Financial Administration Act.
2. Crown Corporations: a Crown Corporation is a corporation which is ultimately accountable, through a Minister, to Parliament for the conduct of its affairs, and includes the corporations named as departmental corporations, agency corporations and proprietary corporations in the Financial Administration Act.
3. Departmental Corporation: a Crown Corporation which is a servant or agent of Her Majesty in right of Canada and is responsible for administrative, supervisory, or regulatory services of a governmental nature.
4. Agency Corporation: a Crown Corporation which is an agent of Her Majesty in right of Canada and is responsible for the management of trading or service operations on a quasi-commercial basis, or for the management of procurement, construction or disposal activities on behalf of Her Majesty in right of Canada.
5. Proprietary Corporation: a Crown Corporation which (1) is responsible for the management of lending or financial operations, or for the management of commercial and industrial operations involving the production of or dealing in goods and the supplying of services to the public, and (2) is ordinarily required to conduct its operations without appropriations from the Federal Treasury.
