## DEPARTNENTAL BRANCHES, SERVICES AND CORPORATIONS

An explanation of how the statistios of this group of government organizations are collected and maintained is given on pages 24 and 25 of this report. The tabular presentation of the detail sumarized in table 2 is made in two prinoipal forms, these being according to a classification by funotion and an administrativo olassification. The olassification by function is explained below. The administrative classification is based upon the departmental
ostablishment as presented in the official estimates thus permitting the analyst to follow the growth and changes in employment of each department. This process, of course, must always take into oonsideration changes in departmental organization which occur from time to time.

## Class IrICATION BY FUNCTION

The statistics of departmental branches, services and corporations are classified in tables 3 and 4 by function. This is the first month in which this presentation of federal government employment statistics has been made. The purpose of providing a classification by function is to supply a means of studying the operations of governments without the complication which results from differences in administrative establishment which occur from time to time in each government and between governments. This analysis is useful in three ways. First it permits a detailed study of employment by the Governnent of Canada according to the main purposes or functions. Since these functions are not subject to periodic changes which alter the administrative structure of the goverament it is possible to develop a statistical series which, with minor exceptions, is consistant over an extended period of time. Second, since differences in administrative establiahment are eliminated it is possible to make meaningful comparisons between federal government expenditures on employment and similar expenditures by other levels of government. Third, an analysis of the relationship between expenditures on employment and total expenditures can be made with regard to each function. The use of percentages will facilitate comparisons especially between levels of government.

The classification by function reflects the purpose served by the expenditure, and employment statistics presented on this basis have been classified in accordance with concepts ovolved by the Public Finance Section of the Dominion Buresu of Statistics for the presentation of financial statistics. The following listing shows how the administrative detail has been applied to the various functions and will serve to indicate clearly the meaning of each function.

Conmencing with April, 1957, a change in the method of collection of data for this report was implemented and the accompanying review of the series showed that in a number of cases, gaps existed. Steps were taken to obtain information oovering staffs which had not previously been reported. Reports of the type indicated were submitted for the first time in April and ccvered 422 employees who had sarnings of $\$ 82,442$ during that month.


Adoption of the new reporting forms and the resulting study led to a different treatment of employment in the following services:

1. Finance - Royal Comission on Canada's Economic Prospects: the majority of employees were formerly treated as "casuals and others", all employees are now treated as "salaried".
2. Sational Film Board: "casuals and others"employees will far exceed those previously reportod with the inclusion of oontract employment beginning with this report.
3. Logislation: Sessional employees formerly listed as "basuals and others" are now treated as "salaried" employees.

The Royal Carmission on Broadcasting which went out of existence on liarch 31, 1957 has been deleted from this report.

The use of the term "salaried" in the present report is intended to end confusion which has resulted from the former use of the term "classified". The term "classified" is understood by many persons using these statistics to relate only to employees who are certified under the Civil Service Act, whereas the coverage as presented in this report includes many salaried employees whose positions are exempt fron the Civil Service Act. "Salaried" as used in this report means all persons paid on the basis of a stated annual salary rate, with the exception of the group of government employees which are known as "ships" officers". The latter group are excluded because of their special treatment under the Financial Administration Act. Further explanation in this regard is prosented on pages 24 and 25 of this report.

COMPARABILITY BETIEBI NUMBERS AHD EARHINGS
The user of these statistios is advised to avoid making direct comparisons between the numbers of persons reported and the earnings reported, the reason for this being that numbers relate to the last day of the month wherever possible and otherwise to the final pay period of the month. Since in certain categories, especially casual employment, a very considerable fluctuation in numbers employed may occur during any month, it may be seen that a comparison between the earnings of all persons employed during the month and the numbers on strength at the end of the month would in many cases not be ralid.

Further detail on methods of collection and other background information may be obtained by reference to the "Explanatory Notes" which appear on pages 23 to 26 of this report.

# PART C <br> Explanatory Notos 

The present statistics are the result of a monthly survey of Government of Canada employment published sinoe April. 1952. During its period of publication this monthly report has had three different titles. In the period April, 1952 to August, 1953 it was known as "Government of Canada Employment and Payrolls". In the period September, 1953 to March, 1954 the report was known as "Federel Goverment Employment and Payrolis" and since April, 1954 the name of the publication has been "Federal Government Employment". The monthly statistical series replaces one formerly issued amually wnder several different titles the first of which was "Statistics of the Civil Service of Canada". This report was issued annually for the fiscal years ended March 31, 1925 to 1931. Combined reports with the above title were issued for the fiscal years ended 1932 to 1934 ; 1935 and 1936; and 1937 to 1939. The titlo of the report was changed to "Summary Statistics of the Civil Service of Canada". Feports under this title were issued in a corbined form for the fiscal years ended 1940 to 1942 and for each of the fiscal years ended 1943 to 1948. The titie was again changed to "Sumary Statistics, Federal Civil Service Employment and Payrolls" for the year ended Herch 31 , 1949. For the jears, ended March $31,1950,1951$ and 1952 three reports were issued entitled "Federal Civil Service Employment and Payrolls".

These statistics are presented in a form which is intended to facilitate, among other uses, direct comparisons betweon (a) numbers mployed as presented in this publioation and (b) the number of positions ostablished for each administrative branch of govermment.

The report is split into two main portions. Part A is composed of one table which presents the statistics of agency and proprietary corporations, and those of other quasi-independent government bodies. These are listed in a later part of this text. Part B consists of tables 2 to 7 whioh present statistios relating to departmental branches, services and oorporations as listed in Schedules $A$ and $B$ of the Financial Administration Act plus the Auditor General's Office, Legislation (including the Senate, House of Commons and Library of Parliament) and the Privy Council (including the Privy Council Offioe and the Prime linistor's Residence). The information regarding departmental branches, services and corporations is summarized in table 2. Detail regarding these bodies is presented on the basis of a classification by function in tables 3 and 4 and administratively in tables 5 and 6 while table 7 gives details of overtime earnings by department. In all the tables in Part B totals shown exclude "casuals and others" which are presented separately.

The statistics relate only to civilian employess and members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Force (which being a semi-military orgenization are not considered as being oivilians) Members of the Armed Servicos are excluded. Deputy Ministers are included in the staffs of Depart mental Services but Ministers of the Grom and the Solicitor-General are excluded. For Boards, Canmissions and other Agencies those members or officers serving on a full-time basis, and whose salaries are fixed accordingly, are included, wheres directors or board members, who are paid on a per diem basis, or who receive a nominal honourarium for their services ars excluded.

A description of the sources of data and the bases upon which the information is submitted and prepared for use in these statistics is contained in the following outline:

PART A
AGENCY AND PRORRIETARY CORPORATIONS AND OTHER QUASI-INDEPENDENT GOVERMRENT BODIES (TABLE I)

Statistics for this group of government bodies do not provide for any segregation between salaried and non-salaried employees and as a consequence the totals reported include all persons on strength during the final pay period of each month, including casual employees. The information shown in Table 1 is obtained in two ways. The Employment Statistios Section of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics provide information with respect to the following:

Agency corporations included above are indicated with a (C) and Proprietary Corporations with a (D). These are as listed in schedules "C" and "D" of the Financial Administration Act. The remainder are the quasi-independent government bodies which, though not subject to the Finanoial Administration Act are considered as being Canadian Government organizations and their employees as employed by the Federal Government.

## PART B

DEPARTNINTAL BRANCHES, SERVICES AND CORPORATIONS
(TABLES 2 TO 7 INCL.)
Salaried Employeos (Formeriy Entitled "Classified Employees")
The statistics shown in Cables 2 to 6 under the heading "Salaried" include all persons paid on the basis of an annual salary rate except "Ships' Officers" which, while paid an annual salary rate are subject to special treatment under the regulations made pertaining to the Financial Administration Act. These salaried employees are in departmental branches, services and corporations which are subject to the regulation of the Treasury Board and for which the positions are outlined in detail in the Estimates of Canada, or are established by means of supplementary Treasury Board ilinutes.

Individual position records are maintained for the majority of salaried positions in the departamental branches and services of the Government of Canada. Because of an inevitable time lag in the routing of position and personnel changes through normal channels it is not always possible to include all of the changes in statistios for the month to which they apply. The count of employees for any given month, therefore, will not necessarily represent the number of staff on strength at the end of the month. Employee earnings, being based on annual salary rates, will not necessarily equal the actual amounts paid in salaries in ary given month. These factors are not considered to be of such significanca as to seriously affect the usefuiness of the statistics. Permanent, temporary and term employees are all included in the salaried category and not attempt is made to prepare separate statistics on each.

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All salaried persons who are "locallymengaged" abroad are reported on forms at the present tine and position record cards are not maintained for each individual position.

Non-Salaried Employees (Prevailing Rates, Ships' Officers, Ships' Crews, Casuals and "Others")
Individual position records for these ataffe are not maintained as is the case in conneotion with the majority of "salaried" positions. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics obtains data on the "non-salarled" steff by means of special reports based on payroll and other records. Since these reports are prepared on the basis of pay period they represent the actual amounts paid out to employees during each month. The ships officers are included in the group of non-salaried positions even though they are in fact salaried employees. This latter group has been recorded separately from the salaried employee group owing to their special treatment under the provisions of the financial Administration Aot.

## COMPARABILITY HITH FORLER SURVEY

The statistical series produced on an annual basis for the years 1925 to 1952 was intended to include only the number of nermanent and temporary employees in the general administrative departments of government (this generally spoaking included those coming under the Civil Service Act). The survey did not include a count of what were described as "non-anumerated" classes. Since there was a distinct variation in the interpretation by departments of what constituted "nonenumeratod" classes there resulted differences between departments in the coverage of employees included in the ennual series. The monthly series which comnenced in April, 1952 includes groups of emplojees not formerly included as well as various govermont services not formerly covered and consequently the statistics should not be compared with the former amul series.

## DESCR IPTIONS OF PRINCIPAL TERRN USED

1. Department: Also knowa as departmental services, departmonts are the named divisions of the Government of Canada 28 defined in the Financial Administration Aot.
2. Crown Corporations: a Crown Corporation is a corporation which is ultimately accountabla, through a ivinister, to Parliament for the conduct of its affairs, and includes the corporations naned as departmental corporations, agency corporations and proprietary corporations in the Financial Administration Act.
3. Departmental Corporation: a Crown Corporation which is a servant or agent of Jier lajesty in right of Canada and is responsible for administrative, supervisory, or regulatory services of a governmental nature.
4. Agency Corporation: a Crown Corporation which is an agent of Her liajesty in right of Canada anic is responsible for the management of trading or service operations on a quasimcormercial basis, or for the management of procurement, construction or disposal activities on behalf of fier liajesty in right of Canada.
5. Proprietary Corporation: a Crown Corporation which (l) is responsible for the management of lending or financial operations, or for the management of comercial and industrial operations involving the production of or dealing in goods and the supplying of services to the public, and (2) is ordinarily required to conduct its operations without appropriations from the Federal Treasury.
