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## INTRODUCTION

An explanation of how the statistics for: (1) Agency and Proprietary Corporations and Other Quasi-Independent Government jodies, and; (2) Departmental Branches, Services and Corporations are collected and maintained, is given, together with other background detail, in Part C - Explanatory Notes commencing on page 19. Data on Agency and Proprietary Corporations and Other Quasi-Independent Government Bodies is presented in Part A Table 1. That for Departinental Branches, Services and Corporations is sumnarized in Part B Table 2, presented on a functional classification basis in Tables 3 and 4 ; and on an administrative basis in Tables 5 and 6 . Overtime payments are reported in Table 7 for staffs included in Part 13. The classification by function is explained in detail on pages 22 to 25 . The administrative classification is based upon the departmental establishment as presented in the official Estimates of Canada, thus permitting the analyst to follow the growth and changes in employment of each department. This process, of course, must always take into consideration canges in departmental organization which occur from time to tine.

## PARI A - AGENCY AND PROPRIETARY CORPORATIONS AND OTHER QUASI-INDEPENDENT GOVERNMENT BODIES

Table 1 sumarizes the record of employment of these organizations for the months shown.

PARI 13 - DEPARTMENTAL BRANCHES, SERVICES AND CORPORATIONS
Salaried employees were fewer in number in National Defence (Army, Navy and Air) and in the Department of Transport. A seasonal increase of staff in the Experimental Farms Branch of Agriculture was the principal reason for the higher numbers of prevailing rate employees. Transport which had employed a number of casuals for brush clearing work in March released these in April thus occasioning the decline in casual staff.

## COMPARABILITY BETWEEN NUMTERS AND EARNINGS

The user of these statistics is advised to avoid making direct comparisons between the numbers of persons reported and the earnings reported, the reason for this being that numbers relate to the last day of the nonth wherever possible and otherwise to the final pay period of the month. Since in certain categories, especially casual employment, a very considerable fluctuation in numbers employed may occur during any inonth, it may be seen that a comparison between the earnings of all persons employed during the month and the numbers on strength at the end of the inonth would in many cases not be valid.

## ART C

## EXPLANATORY NOTES

The present statistics are the result of a monthly survey of Government of Canada employment published since April, 1952. During its period of publication this monthly report has had three different titles. In the period April, 1952 to August, 1953 it was known as "Goverument of Canada Employ= ment and Payrolls". In the period September, 1953 to March, 1954 the report was known as "Federal Government Employment and Payrolls" and since April, 1954 the name of the publication has been "Federal. Government Employment". The monthly statistical series replaces one formerly issued annually under several different titles the first of which was "Statistics of the Civil Service of Canada". This report was issued annually for the fiscal years ended March 31, 1925 to 1931. Combined reports with the above title were issued for the fiscal years ended 1932 to $1934 ; 1935$ and 1936; and 1937 to 1939. The title of the report was changed to "Sunmary Statistics of the Civil Service of Canada". Reports under this title were issued in a combined form for the fiscal years ended 1940 to 1942 and for each of the fiscal years ended 1943 to 1948. The title was again changed to "Sumary Statistics, Federal Civil Service Employment and Payrolls" for the year ended March 31, 1949. For the years ended March 31, 1950, 1951 and 1952 three reports were issued entitled "Federal Civil Service Employment and Payrolls".

These statistics are presented in a form which is intended to facilitate, among other uses, direct comparisons between (a) numbers employed as presented in this publication and (b) the number of positions established for each administrative branch of government.

The report is split into two main purtions. Part A is couposed of one table which presents the statistics of agency and proprietary corporations, and those of other quasi-independent government bodies. These bodies are listed in a later part of this text. Part 13 consists of tables 2 to 7 which present statistics relating to departmental branches, services and corporations as listed in Schedules $A$ and $B$ of the Financial Administration Act plus a few which are not listed therein. Data regarding departmental branches, services and corporations is summarized in table 2 . Statistics regarding these bodies is presented on the basis of a classification by function in tables 3 and 4 and administratively in tables 5 and 6 while table 7 details overtine payments by department. In all the tables in Part $B$ totals shown exclude "casuals and others" which are presented separately.

The statistics relate only to civilian employees and members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Force (which being a semi-military organization are not considered as being civilians). Members of the Armed Services are excluded. Deputy Ministers are included in the staffs of Departmental Services but Ministers of the Crown and the Solicitor-General are excluded. For Boards, Commissions and other Agencies those members or officers serving on a full-time basis, and whose salaries are fixed accordingly, are included, whereas directors or board members, who are paid on a per diem basis, or who receive a nominal honourarium for their services are excluded.

A description of the sources of data and the bases upon which the information is submitted and prepared for use in these statistics is contained in the following outline.

See the Glossary on page 26 for the definition of these two types of corporations. ## Salaried Employees (Formerly Entitled "Classified Employees")

The use of the term "salaried" in the present report is intended to end confusion which has resulted from the former use of the term "classified". "Classified" is understood by many persons using these statistics to relate only to employees who are certified under the civil Service Act, whereas the coverage as presented in this report includes many salaried employees whose positions are exempt from the Civil Service Act. "Salaried" as used in this report means all persons paid on the basis of a stated annual salary rate, with the exception of the group of government employees which are known as "ships" officers". The latter group are excluded because of their special treatment under the Financial Administration Act. Statistics on "Salaried" employees are given in Tables 2 to 6 . These persons are employed in departmental branches, services and corporations which are subject to the regulation of the Treasury Board. For a complete definition see the Glossary on page 26.

The basic data is recorded in two ways: (1) by employee; (2) by group of employees.
(1) By employee:

Individual position records are maintained for the majority of salaried positions in the departmental branches, services and corporations of the Government of Canada (the remainder will be treated under "(2) by group of employees"). The position record cards contaln data on the occupants of these positions. The records are amended monthly on the basis of documents received authorizing changes concerning positions and/or their occupants - thus affording a count of employees as at the last day of the month. Because of an unavidable time lag in the routing of position and personnel changes through normal channels, it is not always possible to include all changes applicable to any month in statistics for that month. The count of employees for any given month, therefore, will not always represent the exact staff strength at the end of the month. Regular earnings being based on
annual salary rates will not necessarily equal the actual amounts paid in salaries for any given month. However, these factors are not considered to be of such significance as to seriously affect the usefulness of the statistics.

These individual records maintained for departmental branches, services and corporations include: (a) the regular governmental services and departments, and; (b) boards, conmissions and agencies. The latter group covers the following:

(2) By group of employees:

Statistics pertaining to the remainder of salaried employees in departmental branches, services and corporations (for which no individual position records are maintained) are collected by means of forms or statements. The total staff strength at the end of the month is reported. Regular earnings (which excludes overtime, bonuses and other extra benefits) represents the total earned during each month by all persons employed in that month including those who are off-strength at the end of the month. ## Non-Salaried Employees (Prevailing Rates, Ships' Officers, Ships' Crews, Casuals and Others)

Individual position records, such as those maintained for the majority of "salaried" positions, are not kept for the non-salaried staff. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics obtains data on these employees by means of summary reports based on payroll and other records. Since these reports are prepared on the basis of pay period they represent the actual amounts paid out to employees during each month. The ships' officers are included in the group of non-salaried positions even though they are in fact salaried employees. This latter group has been recorded separately from the salaried employee group owing to their special treatment under the provisions of the Financial Administration Act.

The statistics of departmental branches, services and corporations are classified in tables 3 and 4 by functior. The purpose of providing a classification by function is to supply a means of studying the operations of governments without the complication which results from differences in administrative establishment which occur from time to time in each government and between governinents. This analysis is useful in three ways. First it pernits a detailed study of employment by the Government of Canada according to the main purposes or functions. Since these functions are not subject to periodic changes which alter the adninistrative structure of the government it is possible to develop a statistical series which, with minor exceptions, is consistent over an extended period of tine. Second, since differences in adninistrative establishment are eliminated it is possible to make meaningful comparisons between federal government expenditures on employment and similar expenditures by other levels of government. Third, an analysis of the relationship between expenditures on employment and total expenditures can be made with regard to each function. The use of percentages will facilitate comparisons es= pecially between levels of government.

The classification by function reflects the purpose served by the expenditure, and employment statistics presented on this basis have been classified in accordance with concepts evolved by the Public Finance Section of the Dominion Bureau of statistics for the presentation of financial statistics. The following listing shows how the administrative detail has been applied to the various functions and will serve to indicate clearly the meaning of each function.

## COMPARABILITY WITH FORMER SURVEY

The statistical series produced on an annual basis for the years 1925 to 1952 was intended to include the number of permanent and temporary employees in the general administrative government services (this broadly speaking, included those coming under the Civil Service Act). In addition, the earnings of certain classes of employees referred to as "non-enumerated" classes were shown in the publication. The survey did not include a count of these "non-enumerated" classes. Since there was a distinct variation in the interpretation by departments of what constituted these groups there resulted differences between departments in the coverage of employees and earnings included in the annual series. The
monthly series which commenced in April, 1952 includes employees not formerly counted in the tabulations as well as a number of government services not previously included, and consequently the statistics should not be compared with the former annual series.

## GLOSSARY OF PRINCIPAL TERMS USED

1. Department: Also known as departmental services, departments are the named divisions of the Government of Canada as defined in the Financial Administration Act.
2. Crown Corporations: A Crown Corporation is a corporation which is ultimately accountable, through a Minister, to Parliament for the conduct of its affairs, and includes the corporations named in the Financial Administration Act as departmental corporations, agency corporations and proprietary corporations.
3. Departmental Corporation: A Crown Corporation which is a servant or agent of lier Majesty in right of Canada and is responsible for administrative, supervisory, or regulatory services of a governmental nature.
4. Agency Corporation: A Crown Corporation which is an agent of lier Majesty in right of Canada and is responsible for the management of trading or service operations on a quasi-commercial basis, or for the management of procurement, construction or dispusal activities un behalf of Her Majesty in right of Canada.
5. Proprietary Corporation: A Crown Corporation which (l) is responsible for the managenent of lending or financial operations, or for the management of comercial and industrial operations involving the production of or dealing in goods and the supplying of services to the public, and (2) is ordinarily required to conduct its operations without appropriations from the Federal Treasury.
6. Salaried employee: An employee who is paid on the basis of an annual salary rate and occupies a salaried position authorized by the Treasury Board or the Privy Council. These employees and positions may be of a continuing, term, seasonal, sessional, or part time nature. The positions are specified together with appropriate funds, in the Estimates of Canada and supplementary authorizing documents.
7. Prevailing rate employee: An employee employed in the Rublic Service of Canada whose remuneration is based on the rate of pay prevailing in the area where he is employed for the class of work he does. His rate of pay may also be on rates prevailing in any area in Canada for work comparable to that which he does. The rates may be hourly, daily, weekly or monthly. These employees are governed by the Financial Administration Act - Prevailing Rate Enployees General Regulations. They are occupants of positions authorized by the Treasury Board. The positions, together with appropriate funds, are listed in the Estimates of Canada and supplementary authorizing docunents.
8. Ships' officer: A person employed in the Public Service for duty on a ship that is the property of or chartered by or on behalf of Her Majesty as a master, mate or marine engineer who is duly certified under the Canadian Shipping Act or in a position designated by the Treasury Board as that of a ship's officer. Excluded are members of the Armed Forces and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. An annual rate of pay is deternined by the Treasury Board after consultation with the Department of Labour. These employees are governed by the Financial Administration Act - Ships' Officer's Regulations. They are occupants of positions established by the Treasury Board and these positions, together with appropriate funds, are listed in the Estimates of Canada.
9. Ships' crew employee: A person employed in the Public Service for duty on a ship that is the property of or chartered by or on behalf of Her Majesty as an unlicensed crew member. Excluded are members of the Armed Forces and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. A monthly rate of pay is determined by the Treasury Board after consultation with the Department of Labour. These employees are governed by the Financial Administration Act - Ships' Crews Regulations. They are occupants of positions established by the Treasury Board and these positions, together with appropriate funds, are listed in the Estimates of Canada.
10. Casual and other enployee: All employees in Departments and Departmental corporations of the Government of Canada who are not deftned as Salaried, Prevalling Rate, Ships' Officers or Ships' Crews employees.
11. Locally-Engaged employees: These are persons, usually citizens of foreign countries, employed by the Government of Canada to perform duties in their country. Their salary is stated in the currency of the country where they are employed. Salaried locally-engaged employees are those persons occupying positions: (1) in classes having the suffix U.K. i.e., Clerk 2 (UK), Stenographer 1 (UK), etc.; (2) as Assistants. Some locally-engaged enployees are employed on a casual basis and are paid from the vote "Casuals and Others". The term "locally-engaged" excludes Canadian employees posted abroad.
