## 

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Ihis publication presents information with respect to employment in and payrolls of the federal gownmment and federal government enterprises. It provides information for the quarter ending June 30 , 1971 and also for each of the months included therein.

Statistics Canada being precluded from publishing data which might permit identification of individuals, it has been necessary to combine data in respect of the executive category with those in respect of the scientific and professional category.

Employment in the federal government, including enterprises but excluding members of the Canadian Eorces, was 401.5 thousand as of June 30, 1971. This represented a net increase of 16.2 thousand over employment as of Harch 31, 1971. This increase was due mainly to the hiring of seasonal employees for work during the summer months.

Total payroll for the quarter, as reported in this publication, was $\$ 741.3$ million and represented a net increase of $\$ 25.6$ million over the total for the previous quarter. This total excludes, for departments and departmental corporations, overtime payments and retroactive salary payments for which analyses by occupational categories were not available.

The total number of employees within this category was 140.7 thousand as of June 30 , 1971 , an increase of 6.1 thousand over the total as at March 31, 1971.

Gross payroll for the quarter was $\$ 292.2$ million, an increase of $\$ 6.8$ million over the previous quarter. This increase was due primarily to the hiring of seasonal employees, mainly within the Canadian National Railway System.

Comparable data for the same period of the previous year are not available.

The total ntmber of saployees in this category was 260.8 thousand at the end of June 1971 and ch:chenidd an increase of 10.1 thousand over the total at the end of larch 1971 . This increase was due primarily to the hiring of seasonal employees for work during the summer months.

Total payroll for the quatter anounted to $\$ 449.1$ m $11 / 10 n$, an increase of sis. 8 , whon over the total for the previous quarter.

Included within this category for the first time is the nowly established hepartment of linvironment. This department consists of the former Department of Fisheries and Forestry; Water Reso rces Program, Department of Energy, Ilines and Resources; Canadian Wildlife Service, Department of Indian Affairs and iorthern Development; Environmental Health Service, Department of National Health and Welfare; and, leteorological Service, Department of Transport.

Comparable data for the same period of the previous year are not available.

## History

Publication of statistics on Government of Canada employment and payrolls commenced with data for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1925. Over the years these statistics have been published under various titles and various periods of time. A summary follows:

## Presentation

This report is composed of three parts. INTRODUCTION (Table 1) summarizes data on all persons employed by the Federal Government and its agencies. PART A (Table 2) presents employment data of agency and proprietary corporations and other agencies and corporations by province. A list of these appears on page 21. PART B consists of Tables 3 to 10 which present statistics relating to the depart = ments and departmental corporations listed in the Financial Administration Act plus "Parliament", that is, employees of Senate, House of Commons and Library of Parliament.

## Comparability with Former Survey

The statistical series produced on an annual basis for the years 1925 to 1952 was intended to include the number of pemanent and temporary employees in the general government administrative services (this broadly speaking, included those coming under the Civil Service Act). In addition, the payrolls of certain classes of employees referred to as "non-enumerated" classes were shown in the publication. The survey did not include a count of these "non-enumerated" classes. Since there was a distinct variation in the interpretation by departments of what constituted these groups, there were substantial differences between departments in the types of employees and payrolls included in the annual series.

The series comencing in April 1952 included employees not formerly in the publications as well.

## Comparability between Numbers and Earnings

The user of these statistics is advised to avoid making direct comparisons between the numbers of employees reported and the payrolls reported, the reason for this being that numbers relate to the employees on strength on the last day of the month wherever possible and otherwise in the final pay period of the month. Since in certain categories, especially casual employment, considerable fluctun tions, in numbers employed, occur during a month, it will be seen that a comparison between the paydoils during the month and the number on strength at the end of the month would, in many cases, not be valid

## Users of these Statistics

Users of the statistics fall into four main categories. These are:

1. Those who wish to use summary data and identify government as an employer. In this category are included those persons who wish to relate the significance of government as an employer to business in general.
2. Persons interested in an analysis of the administrative structure of the Federal Government. These, in the main, include government departments themselves. The analyses of data as presented in tables 8 and 9 of the publication permit a comparison between the number of staff employed as reported in the publication and the number of positions established for each department of the government as published in the annual Estimates of Canada. This is, of course, mainly an administrative use which is of value to the Treasury Board and to the Public Service Commission as well as the various government departments. A further administrative use of the data is to determine the significance of the labour input factor through an analysis of wage costs as a proportion of total expenditures by vote.
3. Persons wishing to make a comparison between employment in the Federal Government and enployment in the other levels of government, or between the Federal Government current data and prior data.
4. The final group of users are those who are interested in government as an employer in each of the principal industries. For this purpose the data must be analysed on a Standard Industrial Classification basis. This analysis, to date, has not been undertaken. The application of this analysis

Organizations of the first three types report gross payrolls (all monies paid to the employees covered), while those in the latter two report over-time payments, retroactive payments and regular payrolls separately.

## Part A - Agency Corporations, Proprietary Corporations and Other Agencies and Corporations (Table 2)

The agency corporations and proprietary Corporations are listed in the Financial Administration Act unde: Schedules C and D respectively. The Glossary on page 30 of this report provides definitions oi these two types of corporation. The "Other Agencies and Corporations" though not isted in the Einancial Administration Act are, nevertheless, organizations of the Crown.

Statistics for these organizations are collected in two ways: (1) directly from the corporation or agency; (2) through the Labour Division (Employment Section) of Statistics Canada. The statistics reported do not permit a presentation by occupational category therefore, composite data are published. In most cases, employees reported represent the staff strength during the final pay period of the month. Gross payrolls are reported and accordingly include overtime payments, retroactive salary payments and other types of special payments in addition to regular salaries and wages. The basic data are recorded in two ways:

1. By employee: Individual position records are maintained for the majority of positions in the departments and departmental corporations of the Government of Canada. The position record cards contain data on the occupants of these positions. The records are amended monthly based on documents received authorizing changes concerning positions and/or their occupants, thus permitting a count of persons employed on the last day of the month. Because of the time lag in the routing of position and personnel changes through normal channels, it is not always possible to include all changes in the appropriate month. The number of employees for a given month, therefore, will not al ways represent the exact staff strength at the end of that month. Regular payrolls, being based on the annual salary rates of employees on strength at the month's end, will not necessarily equal the actual amounts paid in salaries during the month. As a result of the introduction, within the public service, of the bi-weekly pay as of April 1,1969 , three pays will be reported in the statistics for the month of January and July each year. These factors do not seriously effect the V/ilidity of the statistics.
2. By group of employees: Statistics with respect to employees occupying positions for which no individual records are maintained, are collected by means of reports providing: the staff strength at the end of the month, regular payrolls for the month (including amounts paid to those offstrength at the end of the month) retroactive salary payments and overtime payments. ## Classification by Function

The statistics of departments and departmental corporations are classified in Tables 5 and 6 by function. The classification by function portrays employment and payrolls as they relate to particular services provided by the federal government. It also provides the salary component of the cost of services provided by the federal government. Employment statistics presented on this basis have been

The classification by function provides a means of studying the operations of governments wishout the complications arising from differences in administrative establishments in each government als between governments. This analysis is useful in three ways. First it permits a detailed study of allployment of the Government of Canada accorcing to the main purposes or functions. Since these functiont are not subject to the periodic changes which alter the administrative structure of the government, it is possible to develop a statistical series which, with minor exceptions, is consistent over an extended period of time. Second, since differences in administrative establishments are eliminated, it is possible to make meaningful comparison between federal government expenditures on employment and similar expenditures by other levels of government. Third, an analysis of the relationship between expenditures on employment and total expenditures can be made with regard to each function. (See Federal Government Finance, Cat. No. 68-211.)

## ETRINGS ANi SEPARATIONS

Data on hirings and separatiuns were first published in the Federal Government Employment report for December 1959 and covered the quarter October 1 to December 31, 1959. This table records hiring and separation averages by department.

Each "department" is considered for purposes of turnover statistics as a separate employing agency. Consequently, movements of personnel between "departments" are treated in the same way as movements into and out of the government service. The aggregate hirings and separations are sumed up in "Total - all departments". It should be noted, therefore, that hiring and separation data for the entire Government of Canada as an employer cannot be secured from this table.

It should also be noted that the totals shown in this table differ from hiring and separation data published by the Public Service Commission of Canada. The latter organization treats all staff employed under the authority of the Public Service Employment Act as a complete unit and consequently is concerned only with movements into and out of "Act" employment. The Commission therefore is not concerned with inter-departmental movements of employees, but, with movements of staff to and from "Act" employment even when such movements occur within a department.

The glossary of terms on page 30 should be referred to for definitions of certain terms used in the table on hirings and separations. These terms are:

1. Average employment (p. 31, item 21)
2. Monthly average (as pertains to hirings and separations) ( $p$. 31, item 22)

Owing to the fact that relatively small changes in the staff of small departments can result in erratic fluctuations in the hiring and separation rates, such rates are not shown for "Departments" with daas Gned :0 amodoy?as

1. Department: Departments are the named divisions of the Government of Canada as listed in Schedule A of the Financial Administration Act
2. Crown corporation: A corporation which is ultimately accountable, through a Minister to Parliameic for the conduct of its affairs, and includes the corporations named in the Financial Administration Act in Schedule B as departmental corporations, in Schedule C as agency corporations and in Schedule D as proprietary corporations.
3. Departmental corporation: A Crown corporation which is a servant or agent of Her Majesty in right of Canada and is responsible for administrative, supervisory, or regulatory services of a governmental nature. These are listed in Schedule $B$ of the Financial Administration Act.
4. Agency corporation: A crown corporation which is an agent of Her Majesty in right of Canada and is responsible for the management of trading or service operations on a quasi-commercial basis, or for the management or procurement, construction or disposal activities on behalf of Her Majesty in right of Canada.
5. Proprietary corporation: A Crown corporation which (1) is responsible for the management of lending or financial operations, or for the management of commercial and industrial operations involving the production of, or dealing in, goods and the supplying of services to the public, and (2) is ordinarily required to conduct its operations without appropriations from the Federal Treasury.
6. Other agencies and corporations: These are organizations which are not listed in the Financial Administration Act as departments, agency or proprietary Crown corporations but are, nevertheless, organizations of the Federal Government. Because of their nature, they have been classed with agency and proprietary Crown corporations.
7. Executive Category: is composed of occupational groups engaged in the development of government policy, the divegcion of govarnanent progranupen and reiated funccioun in whicn treve in a ruquirement for exceptional abiliky in ukilizing reapurces or in initiaking or modilying adminiatrative functiona.
8. Scientific and Professional Category: is copponod of occupacional groups engagod in tho application of a comprehensive bocy of knowledge acquired through university graduation in fields specified in group definitions, and of professional groups in which membership in Canada is generally controlls... by legally established licensing bodies. Some fields included within this occupational category are; auditing, biological sciences, dentistry, economics, sociology and statistics, engineering and land survey.
9. Administrative and Foreign Service Category: is composed of occupational groups engaged in the planning, execution, conduct and control of programmes serving the public interest, the political and economic relations between Canada and other countries, and the requirements of internal management in the Public Service of Canada.
10. Technical Category: is composed of occupational groups engaged in the conduct of analytical, experimental and investigative duties in the natural, physical, and social sciences, and the preparation, inspection and measurement of biological, chemical, and physical substances and materials, and the design, construction, inspection, operation and maintenance of complex equipment, systems and process, and the performance of similar technical duties.
11. Administrative Support Category: is composed of occupational groups engaged in the preparation, transcribing, transmitting, systematizing and maintenance of records, reports and communications of manual processes, or by operating various machines and equipment, as in the direct application of rules and regulations.
12. Operational Category: is composed of occupational groups engaged in the performance of a craft or of unskilled work in the fabrication, maintenance and repair activities, in che operation of machines, equipment and vehicles, and in the provision of postal, protective, correctional, personal or domestic services.
13. Casual and Others Category: is composed of all employees in Departments and Departmental corporations of the Government of Canada who are not defined as in Executive, Scientific and Professional, Administrative and Foreign Service. Technical, Administrative Support or Operational categorias.
14. Regular payroll: The basic wage and salary payments made to employees during a specified period of tlae, excluding overtime, retroactive salary payments and special payments.
15. Gross payrolls: For agency corporations, proprietary corporations and other agencies and corporaiions gross payrolls include, in addition to regular pay, overtime payments, retroactive salary payments and special payments.
16. Retroactive payments: Payments covering adjustments applicable to prior months resulting from salary increases. Data are included in the month which payment is made.
17. Overtime payments: Payments for work done beyond the normal working hours. Data are included in the month during which the payments are made even though the payments may pertain to overtime worked during previous months.
18. Classification by function: The function indicates the service provided by Government. Its purpose is to afford comparability of data over a number of years and with other levels of governnent without the complicating factor of periodic structural changes of departments and the differences of structures of other levels of government. For further details, see page 23.
19. Hiring: The initial appointment of a person to the reporting "department" whether as a new employee in the Government Service or by transfer from another "department". Movements within a department are not considered as hirings.
20. Separation: The termination of service of an employee in the reporting "department" by leaving the Government Service or by transfer to another "department". Movements within a "department" are not considered as separations.
21. Average employment: As used in the table on hirings and separations represents the mean monthly average number of employees in each "department" during the quarter.
22. Monthly average (as it purtains to hirings and soparations): represents the arithmotic mean i-e. one chard of cive accuai hiratgs anc separacions for cha quarter
