
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

ESTIMATES OF LABOUR INCOME

March 1958

The total of wages, salaries, and supplementary labour income paid to residents of Canada in March is estimated, on the basis of preliminary information, at \$1,234 million, thus indicating a small increase (\$2 million) from the previous month. Gains in construction (residential construction in particular) and in manufacturing were offset by a fall in the primary industries group. The distributive group (transportation, storage, communication, public utilities, and trade) and the finance and services group were practically unchanged. However, when adjustments are made to eliminate the effects of seasonal influences, the resulting "deseasonalized" income total shows a substantial gain over the previous month, up from \$1,284 million to \$1,295 million (again based on preliminary information). A large part of this increase is attributable to non-seasonal advances in construction, forestry, and non-government services.

A comparison of the (unadjusted) income estimate for March with that for March of last year reveals a $2\frac{1}{2}$ p.c. increase in which three of the five major industrial groups shared: finance and services (8 p.c.), construction (7 p.c.), and the distributive group ($3\frac{1}{2}$ p.c.). Declines of 2 p.c. and $2\frac{1}{2}$ p.c. were recorded for manufacturing and for the primary industries group, respectively.

Considering the first quarter of 1958 as a whole, total labour income is estimated at \$3,697 million, up from \$3,607 million in the first quarter of 1957 (a $2\frac{1}{2}$ p.c. increase). All major industries shared in this increase except manufacturing and forestry (the latter industry in particular was much lower than last year). The seasonally adjusted estimate, \$3,862 million, shows no change from the fourth quarter of last year. However, this lack of change in the seasonally adjusted total conceals some offsetting movements in different industries. In particular, construction and nongovernment service registered substantial non-seasonal increases while manufacturing and the transportation, storage, and communication industry moved in the opposite direction.



Notes on Estimates of Labour Income

Estimates of total labour income comprise all wages, salaries and supplementary remuneration for employees' services. Gross earnings—before deductions for income tax, unemployment insurance and pension contributions—are used in the calculation of total wages and salaries, which include bonuses and commissions as well as free room and board provided by the employer. Employers' contribution to unemployment insurance, workmen's compensation, pensions and welfare are shown as supplementary labour income.

The monthly estimates of total wages and salaries are projections from annual estimates, mainly on indexes of aggregate payrolls for major industrial groups along with various employment and wage rate data. A constant number of working days in each month is assumed in the estimation of labour income. A detailed account of the concepts and methods is set out in the report "National Accounts, Income and Expenditure by Quarters 1947-1952" (November 1953).

The annual estimates of labour income are compiled from basic sources within the Bureau and from other reports of governments and business. Labour income constituted 62 per cent of net national income at factor cost in 1956. The relationships between labour income and other items of the national accounts are shown in the bulletin "National Accounts, Income and Expenditure, 1950-1956" (May 1957).
