

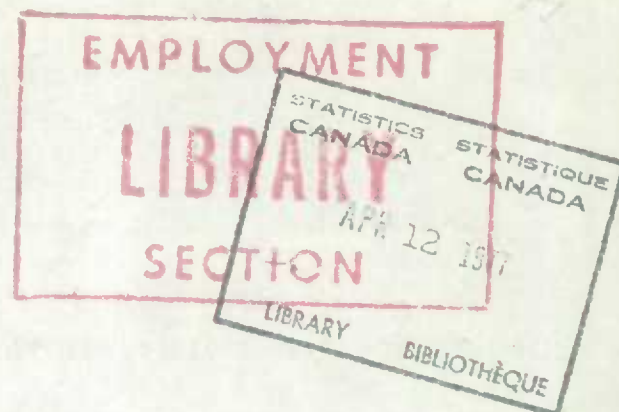

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT EMPLOYMENT

July - September, 1960

This Report is a companion series to the "Federal Government Employment" which presents details of employment and payrolls of the Government of Canada. The two series give details of federal and provincial government employment and will ultimately be supplemented by a third series covering the municipal government field.

In making comparisons between the federal and provincial government employment series two basic differences should be mentioned. In regard to earnings the provincial series includes, in the amounts shown, all earnings of persons on the payroll of the provincial government including overtime and all types of special payments; whereas, in the federal series, the amounts shown in the main tables of the report include only the basic salary of employees, not including such special items as overtime, isolation pay, and other similar payments. The second major difference relates to the definitions of employees. In the provincial series employees have been divided into two main groups, namely, "regular" and "casual". Regular Employees include those employed full-time on a permanent continuous basis, regardless of whether their earnings are based on an annual salary, or monthly, weekly, daily or hourly rates. Casual employees, on the other hand, include those who are employed on a seasonal, emergency, or part-time basis, where the duration of employment is limited and continuity is therefore lacking. This differs from the federal government employment report where persons employed on a seasonal basis are included in "salaried" employment totals if such employment is based on an annual salary rate. Likewise persons employed part-time are also included with the "Salaried" statistics if the employment is based on an annual salary rate. Prevaling rate employees who are employed seasonally or part-time are included in the "prevailing rate" figures in the federal government report.

Classification of these statistics by function permitting comparison between federal and provincial employment is discussed further at a later point in this text.

In the accompanying tables, the significant features of provincial government employment within each of the provinces supplying these statistics have been recorded. The information for departmental services and government enterprises of the provinces of Quebec and British Columbia is not available at the present time.

Tables 3 and 4, which record details of casual employment, indicate considerable fluctuations in the numbers and earnings shown for the Departmental Services. This fluctuation is almost entirely due to changes in the casual staffs employed in highway work in each province.

Functions and activities of government are varied in their nature and are carried out through differing types of organization. For statistical purposes, groupings and classifications of these functions and activities are needed and these do not necessarily follow the organizational divisions in practice in any one government or group of governments. For purposes of useful comparison the statistics presented in this document follow principles evolved at Dominion-Provincial Conferences on Provincial Finance Statistics.

The purpose of this survey of provincial government employment is to: (1) provide statistics relative to national labour force and national income and expenditure accounts, (2) provide governments with figures which will serve their needs for statistical measurements of employment.

An analysis of departmental or "general fund" services is presented according to function. This analysis is useful in three ways. First, it permits a detailed study of the employment in each province according to major functions or purposes. Since these functions are not altered by changes in administrative structure which occur from time to time it is possible to develop a series which is consistent, with minor changes, over an extended period. Second, since differences in administrative establishment do not affect a function classification it is possible to measure the extent of employment in comparable terms between provinces as well as between the various levels of government. Third, this classification permits analysis for each function, of the relationship between expenditures on employment and total expenditures.

Employment and earnings have been reported for each pay period and, in general, are divided between "casual" and "regular" according to the continuity of employment. The rule followed, where several pay periods occur during the month, is to take the number of individuals shown for the final pay period and the total earnings for the entire month. Thus no comparison between numbers and earnings should be made for the purpose of obtaining average earnings, especially in the case of the casual employment figures where the numbers on strength may vary substantially within a single month.

For purposes of this survey it has been necessary to establish two main categories of employees, namely, "regular" and "casual", because of a lack of uniformity in the official classes defined by the several provinces. A description of regular and casual has already been given. Regular employees include those public officials who are appointed for a term of one year or more, such as judges and other court officers paid by the province. Certain justices and judges within the provinces are appointed by the Government of Canada which pays most of their stipend. Since the numbers and Federal payments to these persons are footnoted in the "Federal Government Employment" report they have not been included in this report. Any salaries or allowances paid by the Provincial Government, however, have been included and footnoted in the "Provincial Government Employment" report.

1. **DEPARTMENTAL SERVICES:** In this publication "General Fund" activities are shown under the heading "Departmental Services". This comprehends the activities carried on by provincial governments as reflected in their Estimates and, in addition, expenditures on employment by special or administrative funds. For a more complete explanation of "General Fund" refer to the annual report published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics entitled "Financial Statistics of Provincial Governments" (Publication No. 68-207).

2. **PROVINCIAL INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION:** These are educational institutions at the university level which are under the control of the provincial government but which are not administered under departmental authority. It will be noted, therefore, that this group does not include certain institutions that are considered in some degree to be provincial institutions of higher education, such as Ontario Agricultural College, Ontario Veterinary College, and others. The latter are included in group one, "Departmental Services".

On the other hand, figures given for "Provincial Institutions of Higher Education" include employment figures for subsidiary organizations that are not recognized as being educational in nature. For example, University of Toronto includes Connaught Medical Research Laboratories.

3. PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT ENTERPRISES: These produce goods and services for sale to governments or to others, making a direct charge for the goods and services, which is intended to compensate largely or wholly for the cost, or to yield a profit. Often the activity is entrusted to a special organization for administration, and obtains its capital funds by loans from the government or shared-capital subscribed by the government, or by outside borrowing guaranteed by the government. There is frequently, therefore, a considerable degree of financial and administrative autonomy.

Such activities are not usually carried on by governments, though they may be common to most governments at a certain level. Consequently they should be reported separately from general activities in statistical presentations. A list of these enterprises by province follows this text.
