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PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT EMPLOYMENT

APRIL - JUNE 1962

A review of totals indicates that the number and gross earnings of employees were considerably higher during the quarter ended June 30, 1962 than for the January - March 1962 quarter. This resulted primarily from increased seasonal activities in the "Transportation and Communications" and "Natural Resources" functions.

Data for the Departmental Services, Government Enterprises and Workmen's Compensation Boards of Quebec and British Columbia are not available for inclusion in this report.

The 178,209 employees reported for June 1962 represented a 0.4 per cent decrease from June 1961 (178,958) and a 7.8 per cent increase over March 1962 (165,-354).

Earnings of employees for the April 1 - June 30, 1962 quarter totalled \$168,-226,000; a gain of 4.7 per cent from the April - June 1961 quarter (\$160,627,000) and a gain of 2.9 per cent from the January - March 1962 quarter (\$163,557,000). Total earnings of provincial employees (available for inclusion in this report) for the period January 1 - June 30, 1962 amounted to \$331,783,000. Employees in Departmental Services earned \$193,204,000 or 58.2 per cent of the total while staff of Institutions of Higher Education received \$36,929,000 or 11.1 per cent. Those in Enterprises earned \$97,292,000 or 29.3 per cent and of the Workmen's Compensation Boards received \$4,358,000 or 1.3 per cent.

Employees (and their earnings) of Government Enterprises of the Northwest Territories are now included in this series for the first time having commenced reporting in April, 1962.

A description of the statistics included in this series is given together with the background detail on page 22 of this report.

Data for certain Alberta government departments was not received in time for this report. The total staff of these departments for March 1962 was 9389 employees whose earnings amounted to \$10,414,932 in the January - March 1962 quarter. These figures have been included in this report. It is not felt that any significant change will be made when the revised data become available.

GLOSSARY OF PRINCIPAL TERMS USED

<u>DEPARTMENTAL SERVICES</u>: Also known as General Fund activities. This comprehends the activities carried on by provincial governments as reflected in their Estimates and in addition, expenditures on employment by special or administrative funds.

PROVINCIAL INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION: These are educational institutions at the university level which are under the control of the provincial government, but which are not administered under departmental authority.

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT ENTERPRISES: These produce goods and services for sale to governments or to others, making a direct charge for goods and services.

SALARY EARNERS: Employees in receipt of a salary based on monthly or annual rates of pay. These employees may be of a continuing, term, seasonal, sessional or part-time nature.

WAGE EARNERS: Employees in receipt of a wage based on hourly, daily or weekly rates of pay.

FULL-TIME WAGE EARNERS: Employees who occupy a continuing full-time position.

OTHER WAGE EARNERS: Employees who do not occupy a continuing full-time position. Examples are: seasonal, part-time and casual wage earners.

NUMBER OF EMPLOYEES: Represents the number of persons on the payroll for the last pay period reported in each month.

GROSS EARNINGS: Earnings reported are the gross earnings of all persons paid for work done during the month whether they were on strength at the end of the month or not. They include retroactive pay, salary adjustments and over-time payments.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

APRIL - JUNE 1962

This report presents statistics of employment and payrolls of eight provincial governments and the Yukon and Northwest Territories for the second quarter (April 1 to June 30, 1962). The information for departmental services and government enterprises of the provinces of Quebec and British Columbia is not available at the present time. The first published quarterly report in this series was for October 1 - December 31, 1959.

The purpose of this survey of provincial government employment is to: (1) provide statistics relative to national labour force and national income and expenditure accounts, (2) provide governments with figures which will serve their needs for statistical measurements of employment.

An analysis of departmental or "general fund" services is presented according to function. This analysis is useful in three ways. First, it permits a detailed study of the employment in each province according to major functions or purposes. Since these functions are not altered by changes in administrative structure which occur from time to time it is possible to develop a series which is consistent, with minor changes, over an extended period. Second, since differences in administrative establishment do not affect a function classification it is possible to measure the extent of employment in comparable terms between provinces as well as between the various levels of government. Third, this classification permits analysis for each function, of the relationship between expenditures on employment and total expenditures.

- 1. DEPARTMENTAL SERVICES: In this publication "General Fund" activities are shown under the heading "Departmental Services". This comprehends the activities carried on by provincial governments as reflected in their Estimates and, in addition, expenditures on employment by special or administrative funds. For a more complete explanation of "General Fund" refer to the annual report published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics entitled "Financial Statistics of Provincial Governments" (Publication No. 68-207).
- 2. PROVINCIAL INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION: These are educational institutions at the university level which are under the control of the provincial government but which are <u>not</u> administered under departmental authority. It will be noted, therefore, that this group does not include certain institutions that are considered in some degree to be provincial institutions of higher education, such as Ontario Agricultural College, Ontario Veterinary College, and others. The latter are included in group one, "Departmental Services".

On the other hand, figures given for "Provincial Institutions of Higher Education" include employment figures for subsidiary organizations that are not recognized as being educational in nature. For example, University of Toronto includes Connaught Medical Research Laboratories.

3. PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT ENTERPRISES: These produce goods and services for sale to governments or to others, making a direct charge for the goods and services, which is intended to compensate largely or wholly for the cost, or to yield a profit. Often the activity is entrusted to a special organization for administration, and obtains its capital funds by loans from the government or shared-capital subscribed by the government, or by outside borrowing guaranteed by the government. There is frequently, therefore, a considerable degree of financial and administrative autonomy.

Such activities are not usually carried on by governments, though they may be common to most governments at a certain level. Consequently, they should be reported separately from general activities in statistical presentations. A list of these enterprises by province follows this text.

4. WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION BOARDS: For the first time separate data for the Workmen's Compensation Board of each province (for which data is available) is shown. This data was formerly included with the "Provincial Government Enterprises".

Employees included in these statistics are divided into two main groups, namely:

SALARY EARNERS AND WAGE EARNERS

For the purpose of this report, Salary Earners include all salaried staff whether employed on a full-time or a part-time basis. Wage Earners are divided into two groups: 1) Wage Earners - Full Time; These are wage earners who are employed throughout the year on a full-time basis. 2) Other Wage Earners: These are wage-earning employees who are not employed on a full-time year-round basis. Examples are seasonal, part-time and casual wage earners.

In the accompanying tables, the significant features of provincial government employment within each of the provinces supplying these statistics have been recorded.

Employment and earnings have been reported for each pay period, and in general, are divided between "salary earners" and "wage earners" according to the continuity of employment. The rule followed, where several pay periods occur during the month, is to take the number of individuals reported for the final pay period and the total amount paid to all persons employed during the month.



Thus no comparison between numbers and earnings should be made for the purpose of obtaining average earnings, especially in the case of "wage earners" where the numbers on strength may vary substantially within a single month.

Salary earners include those public officials who are appointed for a term of one year or more, such as judges and other court officers paid by the province. Certain justices and judges within the provinces are appointed by the Government of Canada which pays most of their stipend. Since the numbers and Federal payments to these persons are footnoted in the "Federal Government Employment" report they have not been included in this report. Any salaries or allowances paid by the Provincial Government, however, have been included and footnoted in the "Provincial Government Employment" report.
