PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT EMPLOYMENT

APRIL - JUNE 1966

The gross payrolls of provincial government employees reached a new high in the quarter ending June 30, 1966. This resulted primarily from (1) the normal seasonal increases in the "Transportation and Communications", "Recreation and Cultural Services" and "Natural Resources" functions (2) an additional pay period occurring during this quarter for those employees that are paid on a fortnightly basis (3) and Government Enterprises which reported gains of 10.3 per cent in staff and 8.7 per cent in payroll.

Data for the Departmental Services, Government Enterprises and Workmen's Compensation Boards of British Columbia are not available for inclusion in the publication. Data for the Institutions of Higher Education as included. Due to unavoidable delays in reporting, estimates have been used for the month of June for the Province of Manitoba and for some of the departments in the Province of Quebec. Revised figures will be published in the next quarterly report.

The 285,583 employees reported for June 1966 represents 4.7 per cent increase over June 1965 (272,790) and a 10.9 per cent increase from March 1966 (257,453).

Payrolls of employees for the April-June 1966 quarter totalled \$316.7 million a gain of 10.8 per cent over April - June 1965 (\$285.6 million) and of 6.4 per cent from January - March 1966 (\$297.6 million).

Total payrolls of provincial employees (available for inclusion in this report) for the period January 1 - June 30, 1966 amounted to \$614.2 million. Employees in Departmental Services earned \$368.8 million or 60 per cent of the total while staff of Institutions of Higher Education received \$69.3 million or 11.3 per cent. Those of Enterprises earned \$168.0 million or 27.4 per cent and Workmen's Compensation Board staffs received \$8.0 million or 1.3 per cent.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

APRIL - JUNE 1966

General

This report contains statistics of employment and payrolls for nine provincial governments and the Yukon and Northwest Territories. Information on departmental services and provincial enterprises for British Columbia are not available at the present time. The first published quarterly report in this series was for October 1 - December 31, 1959.

The purpose of this survey of provincial government employment is to: (1) provide statistics relative to national labour force and national income and expenditure accounts, (2) provide governments with figures which will serve their needs for statistical measurements of employment, (3) make such data available to research groups, students and the general public.

An analysis of departmental or "general fund" services is given by purpose or "function". This analysis is useful in three ways. First, it permits a detailed study of the employment in each province according to major functions or purposes. Since these functions are not altered by changes in administrative structure which occur from time to time they permit the development of a series which is consistent, with minor changes, over an extended period. Second, since differences in administrative establishment do not seriously affect a function classification it is possible to measure employment in comparable terms between provinces as well as between the various levels of government. Third, this classification permits analysis for each function, of the relationship between expenditures on employment and total expenditures.

Coverage

Data in the report consist of four major groups.

- 1. DEPARTMENTAL SERVICES: In this publication "General Fund" activities are shown under the heading "Departmental Services". This conprehends the activities carried on by provincial governments as reflected in their Estimates and, in addition, expenditures on employment by special or administrative funds. For a more complete explanation of "General Fund" refer to the annual report published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics entitled "Financial Statistics of Provincial Governments" (Publication No. 68-207).
- 2. PROVINCIAL INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION: These are educational institutions at the university level which are under the control of the provincial government but which are not administered under departmental authority. It will be noted, therefore, that this group does not include certain institutions that are considered in some degree to be provincial institutions of higher education, such as Ontario Agricultural College, Ontario Veterinary College, and others. The latter are included in group one, "Departmental Services".

On the other hand, figures given for "Provincial Institutions of Higher Education" include employment figures for subsidiary organizations that are not recognized as being educational in nature. For example, University of Toronto includes Connaught Medical Research Laboratories.

3. PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT ENTERPRISES: These produce goods and services for sale to governments or to others, making a direct charge for the goods and services, which is intended to compensate largely or wholly for the cost, or to yield a profit. Often the activity is entrusted to a special organization for administration, and obtains its capital funds by loans from the government or share capital subscribed by the government, or by outside borrowing guaranteed by the government. There is frequently, therefore, a considerable degree of financial and administrative autonomy.

Such activities are not usually carried on by governments, though they may be common to most governments at a certain level. Consequently, they are reported separately from general fund activities for statistical presentation. A list of these enterprises by province follows:

4. WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION BOARDS: Separate data for the Workmen's Compensation Board of each province (for which data is available) is shown. Prior to April 1962 this data was included with "Provincial Government Enterprises".



SALARY EARNERS AND WAGE EARNERS

Employees included in these statistics are treated as either Salary Earners or Wage Earners. For the purpose of this report, Salary Earners include all monthly or annually rated staff whether employed on a full-time or a part-time basis. Wage earners are divided into two groups: 1) Wage Earners - Full-time: These are hourly, daily or weekly rated staff who are employed throughout the year on a full-time basis. 2) Other Wage Earners: These are wage-earning employees who are not employed on a full-time year-round basis. Examples are seasonal, part-time and casual wage earners.

In the accompanying tables, the significant features of provincial government employment within each of the provinces supplying these statistics have been recorded.

Employment and payrolls are reported monthly, and in general, are divided between "salary earners" and "wage earners" according to the continuity of employment. The rule followed, where several pay periods occur during the month, is to take the number of individuals reported for the final pay period and the total amount paid to all persons employed during the month. Thus no comparison between numbers and earnings should be made for the purpose of obtaining average earnings, especially in the case of "wage earners" where the numbers on strength may vary substantially within a single month.

Salary earners include those public officials who are appointed for a term of one year or more, such as judges and other court officers paid by the province. Certain justices and judges within the provinces are appointed by the Government of Canada which pays most of their stipend. Since the numbers and Federal payments to these persons are referred to in the "Federal Government Employment" report they have not been included in this report. Any salaries or allowances paid by the Provincial Government, however, have been included and footnoted in the "Provincial Government Employment" report.

GLOSSARY OF PRINCIPAL TERMS USED

DEPARTMENTAL SERVICES: Also known as General Fund activities. This comprehends the activities carried on by provincial governments as reflected in their Estimates and in addition, expenditures on employment by special or administrative funds.

PROVINCIAL INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION: These are educational institutions at the university level which are under the control of the provincial government, but which are not administered under departmental authority.

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT ENTERPRISES: These produce goods and services for sale to governments or to others, making a direct charge for goods and services.

SALARY EARNERS: Employees in receipt of a salary based on monthly or annual rates of pay. These employees may be of a continuing, term, seasonal, sessional or part-time nature.

WAGE EARNERS: Employees in receipt of a wage based on hourly, daily or weekly rates of pay.

FULL-TIME WAGE EARNERS: Employees who occupy a continuing full-time position.

OTHER WAGE EARNERS: Employees who do not occupy a continuing full-time position. Examples are: seasonal, part-time and casual wage earners.

NUMBER OF EMPLOYEES: Represents the number of persons on the payroll for the last pay period reported in each month.

GROSS PAYROLLS: Payrolls reported are the gross payrolls of all persons paid for work done during the month whether they were on strength at the end of the month or not. They include retroactive pay, salary adjustments and over-time payments.
