ADVANCE STATEMENT OF EARNINGS AND HOURS WORKED IN MANUFACTURING IN THE LAST WEEK OF OCTOBER, 1949.

In the following tables appear the preliminary results of the fourth annual survey of earnings and hours of work of male and female wage-earners and salaried employees in manufacturing establishments usually employing 15 or more persons. The data relate to all employees on the payrolls of approximately 8,150 co-operating plants in the week ending Oct. 31, 1949, except travelling salesmen, homeworkers, watchmen, charwomen and workers engaged on new construction. Production workers, route drivers and delivery men, maintenance and related employees are classified as wage-earners; executive, managerial, office and factory clerical staffs and professional workers constitute the salaried personnel. Proprietors and firm members are not included. The survey does not cover firms in Newfoundland.

Establishments reported the gross earnings, including incentive and other bonuses, overtime pay and payments for leave in the week surveyed, of their full time and part-time employees, paid on a time, piece-work, commission or other basis. Separate data were shown for male and female wage-earners and salaried employees grouped according to the number of hours they worked and their hours of paid absence; there were 13 hours of work categories, ranging from under 30 hours to 65 hours or more.

In comparing levels of earnings and hours in the following tables, consideration should be given to the many factors affecting the data for the reported industries and areas. These include (1) differences in levels of activity for seasonal and other reasons, such as availability of raw materials and power, market conditions, industrial disputes, etc., (2) proportions of women employed, (3) occupational differences, (4) variations in the length of the standard working week and in short-time and overtime work in the week surveyed, (5) industrial and geographical differences in rates of pay, and (6) industrial distributions of workers in different provinces and cities. Women's earnings are generally lower than men's for numerous reasons, among which are (1) occupational differences, (2) pay differentials, (3) higher incidence of absenteeism and part-time work among women, (4) the lower average age of employed women, and (5) a shorter standard working week, on the average, for women, partly because large numbers are employed in industries operating on comparatively short weeks, and partly because women in many establishments work a shorter standard week than men. The comparatively high salaries paid executive and administrative employees, mostly male, contribute materially to the generally high level of earnings in this category.

Increases in average wages and salaries of both men and women in the year ending Oct. 31, 1949, amounted to between 3 and 5 p.c. and were smaller than in the preceding year. The general advances in women's wages and salaries were somewhat smaller in amount but greater in proportion to their earnings in 1948 than the increases in men's earnings. Changes in the average working time were comparatively small.

A more comprehensive report, to be published later, will contain final figures and additional information on levels of earnings and hours of work, in industrial and geographical detail. Tables showing distributions of wage-earners by hours worked will be included.
