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
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
# PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION OF EMPLOYEES IN MANUFACTURING BY WEEKLY EARNINGS

## EARNINGS AND HOURS IN MANUFACTURING IN THE LAST WEEK OF OCTOBER, 1950.

### INTRODUCTION

The annual surveys of earnings and hours in manufacturing in the final week of October supplement the records<sup>1</sup> of employment, payrolls and manhours obtained monthly from manufacturing establishments usually employing 15 or more persons. For the selected week, they provide information on levels of earnings and hours for wage-earners and salaried employees separately, and further classified according to sex. The 1950 enquiry required the grouping of employees by range of earnings, the first information of this type collected from establishments by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics since 1944, when the Annual Census of Manufactures obtained similar data from practically all plants operating in the last week of January.

The 8,575 returns tabulated for 1950 covered 1,051,911 persons, 96 p.c. of the employees reported in the corresponding monthly survey, and 89 p.c. of the estimated total of all employees engaged in manufacturing in the same year. The co-operating firms were asked to provide data for all persons on their payrolls in the week ending Oct. 31, except homeworkers. Proprietors and firm members, pensioners, personnel in separately-organized sales offices, and employees absent without pay throughout the week were to be excluded.

The coverage differed from that of previous years in that the 1950 survey included travelling salesmen directly employed by the plant, and watchmen and charwomen, the latter a comparatively small group. In addition, data were reported for the first time for most of the larger plants in Newfoundland.

The questionnaire called for distribution of the male and female wage-earners and salaried employees in 16 intervals of weekly earnings, ranging from under \$10 to \$100 and over. In general, the wage-earners included production workers to the level of working foremen, maintenance staffs, route drivers and delivery men, and related employees; salaried personnel comprised executive, administrative, supervisory, office and clerical employees, travelling salesmen on the factory payrolls, professional staffs, and related workers. Gross earnings, before deduction for taxes, unemployment insurance, etc., were required, including time, piece-work and commission earnings, regularly paid bonuses, overtime pay, and payments to persons absent with pay in the survey week. The reported hours included part-time, full time and overtime hours worked, and any hours of paid absence in the week.

GENERAL SUMMARY

The grouping of employees by amounts earned in the week of Oct. 31, 1950, indicated fairly uniform distributions about the averages of earnings except in the case of the salaried men, a group which includes numerous highly-paid administrative and professional employees. Women's earnings were more closely concentrated about their mean than were men's earnings. The average weekly pay of all reported employees and the interquartile range of earnings, i.e., the earnings of the middle 50 p.c. of the employees, were as follows:

Among the 17 major industrial divisions in Canada as a whole, men's wages for the week were highest in paper products manufacturing, where they averaged \$57.77 a week; 20 p.c. of the men in that group received between \$50 and \$54.99, and 51 p.c. were paid \$55.00 or more. Transportation equipment plants reported the highest average weekly wages of \$37.91 for women, of whom 36 p.c. were paid between \$40 and \$49.99, and 12 p.c. received more. Women's average hourly rate in the same division, at 94.3 cents, was highest. Male wage-earners averaged 139.9 cents an hour in printing and publishing houses, the maximum figure indicated in any division in the 1950 survey. The paper products division reported the highest salaries for men, with an average of \$81.14 a week; 21 p.c. of the salaried men were paid \$100 or more. In tobacco processing establishments, women's salaries, at \$39.48 for the week, were above those in other divisions. Provincially, hourly earnings of male wage-earners, and wages and salaries of female employees were highest in British Columbia. Manufacturers in Ontario, however, reported the highest weekly wages and salaries for men.

From 1946, the first post-war year, to Oct. 31, 1950, wages and salaries had increased substantially, as indicated below:

The upward movement has been continuous, with varying percentage increases from year to year. Between the 1949 and 1950 enquiries, men's weekly wages and their salaries rose by 7.6 p.c. and 6.1 p.c., respectively, as compared with corresponding advances of 3.5 p.c. and 3.0 p.c. in the preceding year. The increases in women's wages and salaries in 1950 amounted to 6.7 p.c. and 5.4 p.c., respectively, over their levels in 1949, when the figures were 4.9 p.c. and 4.4 p.c. higher than a year earlier. Earnings have continued to rise since October, 1950. Thus, the monthly records from Nov. 1, 1950, to Dec. 1, 1951, indicate increases of \$ 6.49 in weekly wages and salaries, \$ 6.42 in weekly wages, and 18.1 cents in average hourly earnings of hourly-rated wage-earners in manufacturing.

Women made up 24 p.c. of the reported employees, and received 15.0 p.c. of the weekly payroll in October, 1950, when their number was larger than in the same week a year earlier, but their proportion in the total staffs was smaller, falling by 0.7 points since October, 1949. The reduction in the ratio of women in the salaried personnel was more marked, the figure declining from 32.1 p.c. in 1949 to 30.4 p.c. in 1950. Women's earnings were also lower in relation to men's average wages and salaries than they had been a year earlier. These changes were associated with greater-than-average expansion in the heavy manufactured goods industries, employing comparatively few women, and with the generally smaller pay increases received by women employees.

The salaried personnel comprised 18.5 p.c. of the reported workers in manufacturing as a whole, as compared with 17.6 p.c. in 1949. The increase resulted in part from the inclusion of travelling salesmen in the more recent survey. The salaried staff received 22.5 p.c. of the gross payroll in 1950.

The average hours worked by the salaried personnel of both sexes have declined steadily though slightly in the post-war period; the 1950 figures were 40.2 hours for men and 38.4 hours for women. The average working time of wage-earners in manufacturing generally has shown a less consistent movement, mainly because variations in short time, overtime, and industrial distributions have tended to obscure the trend toward a shorter work week. The averages of 44.6 hours for male and 40 hours for female wage-earners reported in 1950 were slightly higher than in 1949. In 1946, the average working time was 44.9 hours and 40 hours for men and women, respectively.

The close agreement between the general levels of earnings and hours derived from the annual and monthly surveys for the last week of October, 1950<sup>1/</sup>, may be observed from the following general averages:

#### PART 1.- DISTRIBUTION OF EMPLOYEES.

Salaried employees made up 18.5 p.c. of the total staff reported in 1950, 16.9 p.c. of the men, and 23.4 p.c. of the women. In the preceding year, 17.6 p.c. of all employees, 15.9 p.c. of the men, and 22.9 p.c. of the women, were classified in this category. The proportions of women among salaried workers has gradually fallen from 34 p.c. in 1946 to 30.4 p.c. in 1950. Among the wage-earners, women made up 22.6 p.c. in 1950; their proportions have varied by less than 2 points in the 5 years.

The distinction between wage-earners and salaried employees is not precise; consequently, establishments vary to some extent in their classification of employees under these headings, particularly in their grouping of clerical workers located in the plant. In general, the proportions of salaried workers to wage-earners vary, industrially and geographically, with the prevalent scale of operation and the organization of individual establishments. In industries or areas where the typical unit is small, proprietors and firm members (excluded from the survey) frequently undertake a major part of the managerial and office duties that in larger establish-

ments require the services of salaried workers. Salaried staffs attached to the factory also tend to be smaller when separate sales offices undertake the distribution of products. On the other hand, large head office and professional staffs expand the proportions of salaried workers. An above-average percentage of salaried workers is reported in Ontario, for example, partly because there are many large administrative offices in that province. The classification of editorial and news staffs in the salaried group of the printing and publishing industry places well over a third of the reported employees in this category, as compared with less than a fifth in manufacturing as a whole. Industrial distributions of workers, and differences in levels of activity due to seasonal, market, and other conditions, also affect the relative proportions of wage-earners and salaried personnel.

The proportions of women among the wage-earners and salaried employees vary with the type of industrial activity. They make up less than 10 p.c. of the wage-earners in the durable goods division, and more than 35 p.c. of those engaged in the manufacture of non-durable goods. In such industries as apparel manufacturing, tobacco processing, and canning and preserving, they constitute more than half of the plant employees. In most divisions of industry, higher proportions of the office than of the plant employees are women. Where few female wage-earners are employed, women tend also to form below-average proportions of salaried workers. The provincial proportions of female wage-earners and salaried employees in manufacturing generally, shown in Tables C and E, are affected by the predominant industrial activities in each area.

PART 2.- HOURS OF WORK

In the years from 1946 to 1950, the average hours of wage-earners in manufacturing as a whole have shown comparatively small changes; those of salaried employees have declined slightly from year to year. Tables F and G summarize the data for both groups. The wage-earners' average working time was somewhat higher in 1950 than in 1949, partly because short time was less important in the later year, and partly because of more rapid expansion in industries where the standard work week is above the average.



normal or standard work week<sup>1/</sup>, which in turn varies mainly as a result of local custom, provincial legislation, terms of wage agreements, and industrial distributions. The average hours are also influenced by the number of casual and part-time workers and the duration of their employment, by absenteeism, labour turnover, amounts of overtime work, occupational requirements, and proportions of workers of each sex. Men in plants and in offices frequently average longer hours than women, among whom the incidence of absenteeism and part-time work is higher. Few women are employed in factory occupations requiring unusually long hours; their normal work week is frequently shorter than that of men in the same establishment, and large numbers of women are employed in industries in which the work week is comparatively short.

### PART 3.- WAGES AND SALARIES.

Distribution of Employees by Weekly Earnings.- Employers classified their male and female wage-earners and salaried employees in 16 groups of earnings, from \$10 or less to \$100 or more, rising by \$5 intervals from \$10 to \$59.99, and by \$10 intervals from \$60 to \$99.99. As mentioned in the introduction, the 1950 survey obtained the first material on distributions of employees by earnings from establishments since the Census of Manufactures survey in January, 1944<sup>2/</sup>. The data in the two surveys are not entirely comparable, largely because the earlier survey included establishments employing less than 15 persons, was conducted at a different time of year and under wartime conditions. The general comparisons, given in Table I on page 11, are nevertheless interesting, indicating marked shifts in distribution of employees, resulting largely from sharp increases in rates of pay in the intervening period.

Variations in the provincial distributions of employees by amounts earned are obviously related to the pay levels, occupational and sex differences, numbers of casual and part-time workers, and length of the working week in the more important industries in each area. Most of the employees in the low-earnings ranges are casually-employed workers, or those who do not work full time in the week. Part-time work is particularly common among women; thus the 1949 survey showed that 12.8 p.c. of the women

wage-earners reported in manufacturing worked 30 hours or less, as compared with 4.3 p.c. of the men. Short time or casual work is characteristic of such industries as fish processing and fruit and vegetable canning, the duration of employment depending upon the immediate availability of materials. Short hours in the survey week in the former industry in New Brunswick were largely responsible for the high proportion of female wage-earners reported in that province as earning less than \$10, shown in Table B. Although the highest percentages of men employed as wage-earners and as salaried employees throughout the country earned between \$50.00 and \$59.99, an unusually large proportion of the latter were found in the high-earnings groups, mainly because of the concentration of administrative employees in the upper brackets.

The detailed data on earnings prepared in 1950 makes possible an analysis of the components of the general averages of earnings. Table H shows for each category of worker, the average, or mean, weekly earnings, the median figure, above and below which fell the weekly earnings of one half of the reported employees, and the interquartile points, between which were grouped the earnings of the middle 50 p.c. Largely because of the limited number of occupations in which women are employed, their earnings were more closely concentrated about the mean than were men's earnings. The interquartile ranges of earnings of the male employees varied appreciably from province to province, being generally narrower in Western Canada. These variations are related to the typical pay rates and hours of work in the predominant industries in the different areas.

Average Earnings.- In the 12 months ending Oct. 31, 1950, the general advances in average weekly wages amounted to \$3.60 for men, and \$1.82 for women, bringing the figures to \$50.93 and \$29.00, respectively. In the same period, men's salaries rose by \$3.98 to \$69.35, and women's salaries, by \$1.76 to \$34.38 a week. The comparison is affected to a small extent by the inclusion of data in the 1950 survey for travelling salesmen, and for a number of plants in Newfoundland. More important factors reflected in the year-to-year comparisons of the figures for manufacturing generally are circumstances affecting the component industries, including variations in working time, pay rates, and general levels of activity. All major industrial groups and all provinces recorded an upward movement in average weekly wages and salaries in 1950.

Among the industries for which data are published in Tables 1 and 2, the largest increases in hourly earnings occurred in agricultural implements and motor vehicles, where the averages advanced in the 12 months by 16.6 cents and 13.4 cents, respectively, to 131.8 cents and 146.0 cents an hour at Oct. 31, 1950. The latter group with an

increase of 3.4 hours in the time worked, reported a substantial rise of \$10.36 in the average weekly wages. In a few industries, notably fish processing, low production in the 1950 survey week resulted in a decline in earnings from the 1949 level. Practically all industries reported higher salaries in 1950, the sharpest advance of \$9.07 to \$65.75 for workers of both sexes being recorded in clay products manufacturing, where the average weekly earnings of salaried men advanced by \$11.02 to \$75.49.

Women's wages and salaries generally remained well below those of men in the same industry; their earnings in proportion to men's earnings, shown in Table D, were slightly less than in 1949. In addition to differentials in wage rates, the disparity between pay levels of women and men reflect occupational differences, the shorter hours of women workers, and the fact that many women are younger and less experienced employees. An examination of the figures for industries employing more than 1,000 female wage-earners, shows the highest average of hourly earnings, (97.2 cents), in plants manufacturing motor vehicle parts and accessories. In these groups of industries, the greatest advance in women's wages in the 12 months was less than 10 cents an hour and \$4.00 a week. In several industries reductions in hours and other circumstances resulted in small declines in their average weekly pay as compared with 1949. Women's salaries generally showed moderate increases in the year.


#### PART 4.- METROPOLITAN AREAS.

Five large cities - Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton, Winnipeg and Vancouver - employing substantial numbers of workers in a fairly diversified list of industries, together accounted for 43.8 p.c. of the reported wage-earners of both sexes, 40.8 p.c. of the men, and 54 p.c. of the women. The high proportion of women wage-earners arises from the industrial distributions in these centres, where numerous consumer-goods plants are situated. The proportions of salaried workers in these cities, (54 p.c. of both sexes, 52.7 p.c. of the men, and 57 p.c. of the women), are higher than the corresponding proportions of wage-earners, partly because many large head office staffs are located in these centres.

In most of the smaller metropolitan areas, industrial activity is concentrated in a few fields, so that levels of earnings and year-to-year changes tend to follow those of the industries represented rather than the general provincial averages. Thus the particularly large increases in earnings and hours in Windsor in 1950, resulting from substantial pay increases and unusually high production levels, approximate more closely the advances in the automotive industry than the changes indicated in the general provincial average for manufacturing as a whole. The distributions of employees in the cities grouped by amounts earned, shown in Table J generally follow patterns similar to those in the large industrial groups represented, although special circumstances in individual establishments naturally have a much greater effect than in larger units.
