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

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

COMMENTARY

The survey of earnings and hours of work in manufacturing for the last week of October 1964 covered approximately 11,000 establishments employing 15 or more persons, comprising some 90 per cent of the total employment in all establishments engaged in manufacturing as reported in the Annual Census of Manufactures. In addition to data collected annually on hours and earnings of men and women classed as wage-earners and as clerical and other salaried employees, the 1964 survey included distributions of employees in each category by 16 classes of weekly earnings. Separate series for the clerical and non-clerical salaried employees were obtained for the first time in 1964 and the upper limit of the class ranges as a whole was raised from \$150 to \$200 a week, with the class intervals increased from \$10 to \$20 for those over \$120.

The survey covers the manufacturing establishments participating in the monthly payroll survey of the Section, the results of which are published in "Employment and Payrolls" Catalogue No. 72-002 and "Man-Hours and Hourly Earnings" Catalogue No. 72-003 and related to approximately the same employees. There are, however, certain conceptual and other differences that affect comparisons to some extent, although, as recorded in the explanatory and descriptive notes at the back of this publication, general levels of earnings and of wage-earners' hours do not differ greatly between the two series. Among significant differences are inconsistencies in industrial classification affecting particularly the numbers of employees reported in "railroad and rolling stock equipment" and the "dairy products" industry sub-groups. Inconsistencies in classification will be eliminated in 1966 when both surveys will conform to the revised standard industrial classification.

Employment

The number of employees in manufacturing reported in the 1964 survey was 4.5 p.c. above the 1963 level. The rate of increase in numbers of female employees continued to be higher than that of men, amounting to 5.8 p.c. as against 4.1 p.c., in 1964 over 1963, while in the 3-year period 1960-63, the increases had been 9.4 p.c. for women and 8.2 p.c. for men. The proportion of women reported rose slightly from 23.4 p.c. in 1963 to 23.7 p.c.

As shown in Table D, the proportion of all employees classified as salaried and of men in this category was virtually unchanged between 1963 and 1964. Among women, the percentage reported in the salaried category fell from 27.6 p.c. to 27.4 p.c. in manufacturing as a whole; from 44.2 p.c. to 43.7 p.c. in durable goods manufacturing and from 22.2 p.c. to 22.0 p.c. in the non-durables sector.

In all of these comparisons, it should be borne in mind that variations in levels of activity and in industrial composition of reported employment in successive survey weeks can affect the relative proportions since the salaries category is more stable than the wage-earners and less responsive to factors affecting production.

Changes in proportions between salaried employees and wage-earners were less notable than those between the clerical category of salaried employees and the residual group which includes managerial,

professional, technical and supervisory employees and travelling salesmen attached to the manufacturing establishment. The residual group excludes proprietors and firm members who are not covered by the survey. While the overall increase in numbers of salaried employees from the 1963 survey week amounted to 4.7 p.c., 4.6 p.c. among men and 5.2 p.c. among women, the increase in the non-clerical category amounted to 9.3 p.c. so that the proportion of clerical and related workers to the managerial and other non-clerical category fell from 51.4 p.c. to 49.3 p.c., as shown in the following table. This decline continues a trend in evidence since the series were instituted in 1951. It could be conjectured that this expansion of the white-collar non-clerical group is related to automation and other changes in technology.

Within the clerical category, the proportion of women has also shown a gradual but consistent increase since 1951, rising in the 14 years from 41.7 p.c. to 49.6 p.c. The following table shows the changes over this period. While these measures clearly indicate a substantial change over time in the sex composition of the category, in this as in other tables, the historical comparisons are somewhat limited by inconsistencies on the part of some respondents in classifying marginal occupations to the clerical or the non-clerical component of the salaried-employee group.

Hours of Work

The averages of reported hours, including hours worked and hours of paid absence, were somewhat higher in 1964 than in the same week of 1963. Wage-earners' hours rose from 41.5 to 41.7 for the week, with the largest increase in durable goods of 0.4 hours to 42.5, while hours in non-durables increased from 41.0 to 41.1. The longer week was, on the whole, restricted to male workers whose average week amounted to 42.6 hours, up from 42.3 hours in 1963, reflecting increases in hours in durable goods and non-durables from 42.4 to 42.8 and from 42.2 to 42.3

hours, respectively. Women's average hours at 38.8 in manufacturing and at 38.6 in non-durable goods were unchanged from 1963 while in the durable goods division the average declined slightly from 39.7 to 39.6 hours.

Variations in average weekly hours worked as reported for industries and areas in this survey are influenced by several factors. Chief among these are changes in the duration of the standard work week, the number of part-time and casual employees and their working time in the survey week, the amounts of overtime worked and of time lost through absenteeism, labour-turnover and lay-offs, differing occupational requirements and the relative proportions of men and women employed. Women generally average fewer hours than men because their standard work weeks tend to be shorter, small proportions are employed in industries where the work week is above average, and they have a higher incidence of part-time work and of absenteeism. The level of activity in the survey week and consequent weighting in industry group figures of industries that averaged longer or shorter hours than the norm is also a factor.

Average hours reported for all salaried employees also increased slightly in the year, advancing from 38.4 to 38.5 hours in manufacturing, and from 39.1 to 39.3 in durable goods and remaining unchanged at 37.8 in the non-durables division. Men's hours rose by 0.1 to 38.9 overall, by 0.3 to 39.7 in durable goods and were unchanged at 38.2 in non-durables. Salaried women's hours showed little or no change over the year.

Tables 19, 20 and 21 provide historical information on hours, as well as on earnings, for the major industry divisions, the provinces and the more important urban areas.

Wages and Salaries

As shown in Table A, overall averages of weekly earnings in the 1964 survey week, at \$91.90, were \$3.75 higher than in the corresponding 1963 period, an advance of 4.3 p.c., representing increases for men of \$4.41 or 4.5 p.c. to \$103.17 and for women, of \$2.21 or 4.1 p.c. to \$55.56 a week.

Average hourly earnings of wage-earners as a whole rose by 7 cents, an increase of 3.6 p.c. over 1963. The durable goods industries recorded larger increases in magnitude and proportionally than the non-durables. In the former, average hourly earnings rose 8 cents to \$2.20 an hour, an increase of 3.8 p.c., while in the latter a 6 cent rise to \$1.85 an hour, represented a gain of 3.4 p.c. Hourly earnings of male wage-earners rose from \$2.18 to \$2.26 an hour in durable goods and from \$2.06 to \$2.13 in non-durables, increases of 3.7 p.c. and 3.4 p.c., respectively. Women's hourly earnings advanced from \$1.47 to \$1.53 in durables and from \$1.22 to \$1.27 an hour in non-durables, a 4.1 p.c. increase in each case.

Because of the somewhat longer average working time in the 1964 survey week, the overall increase in average weekly wages of 4.4 p.c. was proportionately greater than in hourly earnings, and brought average weekly earnings to \$84.35 in 1964. Men's earnings rose by 4.6 p.c. and women's by 4.4 p.c. to bring the levels to \$94.00 and \$51.41, respectively. Again,

because of the increase in the work week advances in men's earnings were proportionately greater in the durable goods than in the non-durables category (5.0 p.c. and 4.0 p.c.) while the reverse was the case among women wage-earners, where increases of 3.9 p.c. in durables and 4.5 p.c. in non-durables represented gains of \$2.26 and \$2.13, respectively, to \$60.55 and \$49.21 a week.

The average weekly earnings of salaried employees moved upward from 1963 levels, an increase of \$4.25, or 3.8 p.c., bringing the average to \$115.54 in 1964. Men's salaries rose by 3.9 p.c. to \$133.55 and women's salaries by 3.6 p.c. to \$66.51. In the case of male salaried employees, the third of their number allocated to the clerical category averaged \$99.58 for the week, a gain of \$5.09 over 1963, while the two-thirds in the residual managerial, professional and other salaried group averaged \$150.76, a gain of \$2.76 in the year. Among salaried women, the 91 p.c. classed as clerical workers averaged \$64.80, up \$2.24 from 1963 while the small but substantially increased number in the residual category averaged \$83.88, the same as in the preceding year.

Distributions of Employees by Weekly Earnings

Data derived from the distributions of wage-earners and salaried employees by amounts earned in the survey week of October 1964 are summarized in Tables G and H with percentage distributions given in detail by industry and area in Tables 11 to 18. Since similar data were last collected in 1959 average weekly wages have increased by 18.2 p.c. and average weekly salaries by 19.0 p.c.; consequently, there have been substantial shifts into higher earnings ranges throughout the industry. Whereas in the preceding survey 23 p.c. of female wage-earners and 4 p.c. of salaried women averaged less than \$30 for the week, in 1964 the respective percentages were 11 p.c. and 2 p.c., undoubtedly representing, in the main, short-time and part-time workers. Even more marked was the upward movement of employees into the over \$100 ranges where 29 p.c. of the wage-earners were reported in 1964 as compared with 13 p.c. in 1959. Similarly 51 p.c. of salaried employees were in this category as compared with 39 p.c. five years ago. Proportions of men in the same ranges increased from 17 p.c. to 37 p.c. among wage-earners and from 52 p.c. to 69 p.c. among salaried employees. The largest proportion of employees in the high-earnings ranges were, of course, non-clerical salaried men which comprise managerial, professional and other comparatively highly-paid occupations.

The interquartile range of weekly earnings in which fell the middle 50 p.c. of the employees had a lower limit of \$58.88 and an upper limit of \$103.97 for wage-earners in 1964, as compared with \$51.84 and \$87.92 a week in 1959. The corresponding interquartile range for salaried employees fell between \$73.27 and \$142.10 in 1964, and between \$60.75 and \$117.73 in the 1959 survey. Comparative figures for men and women as well as for both sexes together are given in Table G, which also shows median earnings in the two survey periods. Over the past five years median wages increased by \$11.21 to \$83.06 a week for both sexes, by \$13.36 to \$91.34 for men, and by \$7.78 to \$49.99 a week for women. In the same period, median salaries advanced by \$16.88 to \$103.61 for both sexes, by \$19.25 to \$121.17 for men, and by \$9.81 to \$64.78 for women.



WEEKS ENDING NOV. 30, 1946-47 AND OCT. 31, 1948-64




WEEKS ENDING NOV. 30, 1946-47 AND OCT. 31, 1948-64



IN MANUFACTURING, METROPOLITAN AREAS


WEEKS ENDING NOV. 30, 1946-47 AND OCT. 31, 1948-64


AVERAGE WEEKLY WAGES

THE ANNUAL SURVEY OF EARNINGS AND HOURS AND RELATED SERIES

Descriptive Notes

The annual survey of earnings and hours of men and women in manufacturing establishments, which covers the last week in October, supplies data supplementing those collected in the Employment Section's monthly surveys of employment, payrolls and manhours. Related information is obtained in the census of manufactures conducted by the Industry and Merchandising Division and the survey of wage rates and hours of labour of the Economics and Research Branch, Department of Labour. Since these surveys are designed for different purposes, they vary in coverage, content and definitions of terms. Following are some explanatory notes on the information contained in the present publication and the main differences between it and the other series.

1. The Annual Survey of Earnings and Hours in Manufacturing

General.—The annual survey, commenced in 1946, obtains from establishments separate data on earnings and hours of work of men and women classified as wage-earners and as salaried employees in one week in the autumn of each year. Additional material has been collected as follows in the indicated years:

1. Percentage distributions of male and female wage-earners by hours worked in the survey week, from 1946 to 1949, 1955 and 1958.
2. Percentage distributions of male and female wage-earners and salaried employees by earnings in the week, in 1950, 1953, 1956, 1959 and 1964; interquartile and median earnings are published for Canada and the Provinces.
3. Earnings and hours of general office and clerical workers, segregated in 1951, 1954, 1957, 1959, 1960, 1963 and 1964 from data for administrative, professional, supervisory and other salaried employees.

The survey was not conducted in 1961 and 1962 but was resumed in 1963.

Coverage.—Data are obtained from manufacturing establishments usually employing 15 or more persons that are operating in the survey week at the end of October. The number of employees for whom data are reported usually differs by less than 1 p.c. from the number reported in manufacturing in the corresponding monthly survey of employment and payrolls, and comprises approximately 90 p.c. of those reported by virtually all establishments in the annual census of manufactures.

Establishment reports cover the plant, administrative and related employees. Where a firm operates in more than one industry or area, separate reports are obtained for each operation if separate payroll records are maintained. Separately-organized non-manufacturing operations, such as sales offices and force account construction, are excluded.

Employees.—Establishments are asked to furnish material for all full-time, part-time and casual employees receiving pay in the survey week, except home-workers. Proprietors, firm members, pensioners and staffs of separately-organized sales offices are excluded.

Wage-earners are defined as production and ancillary workers, including working foremen, route-drivers, shipping and maintenance staffs, and related employees.

Salaried employees comprise executive, administrative, supervisory and professional personnel, and travelling salesmen directly responsible to the plant administration, as well as general office and clerical workers in the office and plant, for whom statistics are periodically segregated.

Hours include full-time, short-time and overtime hours worked and any hours of paid absence in the week. Establishments are asked to estimate the hours as closely as possible for employees for whom time records are not kept.

Earnings comprise gross pay for the week, before deductions for taxes, unemployment insurance contributions, etc. Gross pay includes time, piecework, and commission earnings, regularly-paid incentive, cost-of-living and other bonuses, overtime earnings and payments to persons absent with pay in the survey week.

Completion of the questionnaire.—Establishments differ to some extent in their classification of employees as between wage-earners and salaried staff but insufficiently to affect significantly the general figures. Somewhat greater difficulty is experienced in distinguishing clerical and related workers from supervisory and professional staffs and there are sometimes differences in allocation of certain categories of workers in successive surveys. Instances occur where sales personnel previously reported in the survey are later excluded as separately-organized staffs. Changes in industrial classification of individual establishments may be made from time to time. While these factors may cause variations in the averages in comparatively small industry and area units, they rarely affect the year-to-year comparisons of the general figures. An exception is the change in definition of clerical workers made in 1959 which resulted in a substantial shift of salaried employees from the clerical to the residual or non-clerical category.

2. Monthly Surveys of Employment, Payrolls and Man-hours

Statistics obtained in monthly reports from the manufacturing establishments co-operating in the annual survey are included in "Employment and Payrolls" and "Man-hours and Hourly Earnings".

briefly described on the second page of this publication. The same general definitions of employees, hours, and earnings are used, and the averages for manufacturing in the October publications vary insignificantly from those obtained in the annual survey, as indicated below for October, 1964.

Two factors are mainly responsible for existing differences between the two series: (1) The monthly surveys call for data for the last pay period in the month. When this period exceeds a week, the calculated weekly equivalents of reported payrolls and hours may differ from statistics accumulated from individual pay records for the annual survey week. The effect on the general average is slight, but tends to be somewhat greater in industries or areas where longer pay periods are common, particularly if seasonal changes are in process. (2) The monthly reports on man-hours and wages relate only to wage-earners for whom records of hours are maintained, resulting in exclusion of most route-drivers, some pieceworkers and certain others not paid on an hourly basis, in all amounting to about 5 p.c. of the wage-earners. Comparability with the annual data is appreciably affected only in industries such as food and beverages, and in areas such as Saskatchewan, where records of hours are not currently available for fairly substantial proportions of wage-earners. In addition to the above-mentioned points of difference, such factors as avoidance of strike periods in most cases in the annual survey and occasional changes in industrial classification or in reporting procedures subsequent to publication of the monthly statistics, may contribute to some variations in the averages computed in the two surveys, particularly in small industry and area units.

3. Annual Census of Manufactures

Since 1917, an annual census of manufacturing establishments has been taken by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, relating to practically all establishments in the industries surveyed and obtaining data on employment and payrolls in addition to information regarding the physical quantity and value of the various products made, materials

used, cost of fuel and electricity, inventories, etc. Data for working proprietors and firm members are included but not for sales personnel, workers engaged on new construction and, in some cases, head office and research staffs, particularly when they are located away from the plant. With these exceptions, staffs reported as office and supervisory employees and as production workers generally correspond to salaried employees and wage-earners, respectively, as defined in the annual survey of earnings and hours. Numbers of men and women, but not their payrolls are reported separately. Office and supervisory employees are reported on the basis of an annual average, and production workers for the last pay period of each month and a 12-month average calculated. Gross payrolls for the calendar year are provided, including year-end and infrequently paid bonuses, which are usually omitted from the annual survey covering the last week in October.


Statistics obtained in the census of manufacturing are published in "General Review of the Manufacturing Industries of Canada", and in "The Manufacturing Industries of Canada", which consist of a separate report on each province, and a geographical distribution of manufacturing in Canada by provinces, counties, cities, etc.

4. Annual Survey of Wage Rates and Hours of Labour

Since 1901, the Department of Labour has collected annually from many thousands of manufacturing establishments information on wage rates of time workers and straight time earnings of piece and other incentive workers in representative occupations of a non-supervisory nature. Results of the survey are published in the form of weighted averages and predominant ranges of rates for typical occupations in numerous industries and of index numbers of average wage rates, in relatively fine industrial detail. Information on average weekly salaries in typical office occupations and on average wage rates in maintenance and service occupations is published for 52 Canadian communities. Data on standard hours of work are also provided for most industries.

This wage and salary information is included in the annual report "Wage Rates, Salaries and Hours of Labour" which is published as a loose-leaf table service for the industries and communities covered. These tables are later published as a bound volume. The monthly "Labour Gazette" also publishes information on employment, earnings, working conditions, terms of settlement in major collective agreements and related subjects.





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
