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

## COMMENTARY

The 1966 survey of Earnings and Hours of Work in Manufacturing in the last week of October consists of data that have been collected and compiled on the basis of the revised 1960 Standard Industrial Classification. The manufacturing establishments contacted were the same as for those covered in the monthly survey of employment, payrolls and man-hours.

This survey is distinctive in that male and female salaried employees and wage-earners, their hours and their earnings are reported separately. Data for salaried employees distinguish between clerical and related workers and other salaried (managerial, professional, supervisory and other salaried) employees.

Reporting establishments have been assigned to the appropriate industry according to the 1960 Standard Industrial Classification manual for the years 1963, 1964, 1965 and 1966. A detailed description of the industrial groups identified in the publication by appropriate codes may be found in the S.I.C. Manual.<sup>1</sup>

The implementation of the New Establishment Concept has resulted in some change in the content of the manufacturing industries category. Activities formerly reported separately and even under different industrial codes are now consolidated and included in the industry which represents the predominant activity. A more complete description of classification and conceptual changes recently effected as well as of the concepts and methods applied in this particular survey may be found in Descriptive Notes at the back of the publication.

### Earnings

Average weekly wages and salaries as well as hourly earnings of wage-earners have increased in manufacturing in both durable and non-durable goods. Increases have occurred in the survey period of each year since 1963 with the most

pronounced changes taking place in the survey week of October 1966 in comparison with that of October 1965.

In non-durables manufacturing, increases in average weekly wages within major industrial groups in the four-year period ranged from 25.4 per cent in petroleum and coal products to 13.0 per cent in food and beverages. Slaughtering and meat packing was unique in the food and beverages group having average weekly wages at a reduced level in October 1966 in comparison with October 1965. Fewer overtime hours worked in large establishments resulted in this situation.

Petroleum and coal products establishments recorded sharply increased average weekly wages in October 1966 over the like period of the previous year. This was the result of an increase in average hourly earnings of 31 cents together with increased overtime worked during the 1966 period. Increases in earnings have been substantial in this grouping as well as in paper and allied products between each of the four successive survey weeks.

In durable goods, increases in average weekly wages ranged from a high of 19.8 per cent in metal fabricating industries to a low of 12.6 per cent in transportation equipment over the four-year period. Wood products showed an overall increase of 18.4 per cent during the four years. Wage-earners in this major industry group averaged earnings of \$87.70 in the last week of October 1966. This industry has the lowest average level of earnings in the durable goods sector. The highest level of earnings for wage-earners was recorded in primary metal industries at \$116.99 in October 1966. The percentage increase in average weekly wages in primary metal industries over the four-year period at 15.3 per cent was relatively lower than the percentage increase in average weekly wages in wood products in the same period.

In manufacturing, female employees earn relatively lower earnings than male employees in the same categories while percentage increases during the survey period from October 1963 to October 1966 were somewhat higher for female employees than for male employees in each category.

The province showing the highest level of earnings in all categories in each of the survey periods was British Columbia.

#### Hours of Work

In contrast with the gradual increase recorded in average earnings during recent survey weeks average hours of work have remained relatively constant with somewhat higher average weekly hours recorded in October of 1964 and 1965 than in October 1963 for both wage-earners and salaried employees. Reduced average hours were recorded for manufacturing as a whole and for both non-durables and durables for both categories of employees in the last week of October 1966 as compared with the last week in October 1965.

In non-durables manufacturing the average number of hours worked by wage-earners decreased between the October 1963 survey week and the corresponding week in October 1966 in all major industrial groups with the exception of paper and allied industries, printing, publishing and allied industries, petroleum and coal products and chemicals and chemical products. In each of these cases the average weekly hours recorded in October 1963 were only marginally lower than those in October 1966. Petroleum and coal products is the one exception and this is accounted for by overtime

worked in large refineries in the survey week of 1966 resulting in average weekly hours of 43.9 which exceed that recorded for previous years since 1963 in this industrial group.

In durables the average weekly hours worked were lower for both wage-earners and salaried employees in October 1966 as compared with October 1963 in wood products, furniture and fixtures and transportation equipment. Metal fabricating industries reported precisely the same average weekly hours of 42.5 as both October 1963 and October 1966 for wage-earners as opposed to an increased week of 43.0 and 43.1 hours in 1964 and 1965 respectively. Motor vehicles is one major industry in the transportation equipment group which is regularly at an unusually high production period in the survey week but the length of the working week varies from year to year. For example, Windsor recorded a higher working week in October 1966 in comparison with that of the previous year largely as a result of overtime worked in the automotive plants at this particular time.

There is not as great a difference in the number of hours worked by male and female salaried employees as is true in the case of wage-earners. Female employees in all categories generally work fewer hours per week than male employees. This is illustrated in the following table.

#### Employment

This survey covers approximately 91.5 per cent of the total employment in the manufacturing industries.<sup>4</sup> This is essentially a survey of earnings and hours of work in manufacturing rather than of employment. However, comparison of numbers of employees reported in each category, industrial group and locality in October 1966 is made with the knowledge that these are proportions of total reported employment only.

Female employees comprise 23.9 per cent of total reported employment and this ratio is not

appreciably higher than that recorded in earlier years. The increase in women known to have been employed in Canada in 1966 has largely been absorbed in the service industries rather than in manufacturing.

Salaried employees form an increasing proportion of employees reported in manufacturing and in October 1966 comprised 26.1 per cent of the total. Within the salaried employee category, clerical workers are now a smaller proportion of total salaried employees than formerly largely as a result of increased education, automation and changing technological procedures within this industrial sector. Of clerical workers reported, female employees have constituted an increasing proportion of the total over recent years.

LAST WEEK IN OCTOBER 1963-1966



LAST WEEK IN OCTOBER 1963-1966





LAST WEEK IN OCTOBER 1963-1966



## THE ANNUAL SURVEY OF EARNINGS AND HOURS IN MANUFACTURING AND RELATED SERIES

### Descriptive Notes

The annual survey of earnings and hours of men and women working in manufacturing establishments covers the last week of October, and provides data supplementing those already collected in the Employment Section's monthly surveys of employment, payrolls and man-hours. Related data are also obtained through the Census of Manufactures conducted by the Manufacturing and Primary Industries Division of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and the survey of wage rates, salaries, and hours of labour conducted by the Economics and Research Branch, Department of Labour. But since these are primarily designed to serve different purposes, they vary in coverage, content and the definitions of the various terms used. The following paragraphs provide information on the data contained in the present publication and highlight some of the areas of differences between it and the other series.

#### 1. The Annual Survey of Earnings and Hours of Work in Manufacturing

##### General

The annual survey of earnings and hours of work in manufacturing became a regular feature of the Employment Section in 1946 after the responsibility for conducting this survey was transferred thereto. This survey involves collection of separate data on earnings and hours of work paid for, from manufacturing establishments, relating to a week in the autumn of each year, for male and female employees classified as wage-earners and salaried employees. Series compiled on the basis of additional information collected through this survey are given below for the indicated year.

- (a) Percentage distribution of male and female wage-earners by hours worked, or paid for, in the survey week, from 1946 to 1949, 1952, 1955, 1958 and 1965.
- (b) Percentage distribution of male and female wage-earners and salaried employees by earnings in the week, in 1950, 1953, 1956, 1959 and 1964. Interquartile and median earnings are published on national and provincial basis.
- (c) Earnings and hours of general office and clerical workers segregated in 1951, 1954, 1957, 1959, 1960 and each year since 1963 from data for administrative, professional, supervisory and other salaried employees.

The survey was not conducted in the years 1961 and 1962 but was resumed in 1963.

##### Coverage

All manufacturing establishments employing 20 or more persons in any month of the year are included in the scope of this enquiry. Although the total number of establishments covered in this annual survey constitutes only one third of the total

establishments reporting to the Annual Census of Manufacturers conducted by the Manufacturing and Primary Industries Division, it covers approximately 90 per cent of the total number of employees working in the manufacturing industries of Canada. The difference in the employment total obtained from the annual survey of earnings and hours from that obtained as an average of monthly surveys regularly amounts to about 1 per cent.

Commencing with the 1966 survey and reflected in the revised data for 1963, 1964 and 1965 employment, earnings and hours data are based on the new concept of the establishment and the 1960 Standard Industrial Classification. According to the latter, an "establishment" is defined as the smallest unit which is a separate operating entity capable of reporting all elements of basic industrial statistics including employment and payroll data. Activity reports for branches are segregated and allocated by geographical location.

While under the 1948 classification system manufacturing industries were grouped into 17 major industrial groupings, the revised classification system provides 20 major groupings in this area. Furniture and Fixture industries is a new grouping which includes the old furniture industry plus establishments manufacturing furniture which were formerly included with the metal and miscellaneous industry groups.

Primary Metals, Metal Fabricating industries and Machinery industries (except electrical) are groupings according to the new classification system replacing the former Iron and Steel Products and Non-ferrous Metal Products industrial groupings. Changes within metal and machinery industries as well as within Electrical Products and Chemicals and Chemical Products groupings are complex. The resulting series must be regarded as being distinct from the previous series in content. It now conforms to those published in our monthly publications and in all publications in the Manufacturing and Primary Industries Division.

The revised industrial classification system has resulted in some establishments formerly reporting to manufacturing being transferred to other categories. This has changed the industrial content of the Transportation Equipment Industry, particularly, since this grouping has been reduced by railway shops which now report as a sector of Transportation, Communication and Other Utilities. On balance, the change to the 1960 S.I.C. had no significant effect on the numbers of employees in manufacturing in total.<sup>1</sup>

<sup>1</sup> When assessing data published on the revised basis it should be kept in mind that the recapitulation procedure used in tabulating information for the years prior to 1966 excluded those activities formerly reporting to industrial sectors other than manufacturing.

### Concepts and Definitions

**Employees.** — The survey covers all full-time, part-time and casual wage-earners and salaried employees of reporting establishments who are paid for rendering current services or are on paid absence during the survey week. Casual employees working less than the equivalent of one full day in the survey week and other employees not receiving pay for any time during the reference period are not included.

The "employee" concept excludes working owners and partners of unincorporated businesses and proprietors and other members of the board of directors of corporations (even if they are actively engaged in the operation of the establishment), home-workers, pensioners, and persons providing services to an establishment on the basis of a contract for services.

**Wage-earners** are defined as production and ancillary workers, including working foremen, route-drivers, shipping, delivery and maintenance staffs, and related employees.

**Salaried employees** comprise executive, administrative, supervisory and professional personnel, and travelling salesmen, directly responsible to the administration as well as general office and clerical workers in the office and plant, for whom statistics are segregated.

**Hours** include full-time, short-time and overtime hours worked and any hours of paid absence in the week. Establishments are asked to estimate the hours as closely as possible for employees whose hours of work are not recorded.

**Earnings** comprise gross pay for the week, before deductions for taxes, unemployment insurance contributions, etc. Gross pay includes salaries, straight-time wages, piecework and commission earnings, regularly-paid incentive, cost-of-living and other bonuses, overtime earnings and payments to persons absent with pay in the survey week. The payroll concept does not include supplementary labour costs, operational costs or payments unrelated to the survey week. Thus the data do not include such items as employer's contributions to unemployment insurance, medical plans, workmen's compensation, other welfare plans, the value of room and board, compensation in kind, travelling expenses, retirement gratuities, or bonuses paid at irregular or infrequent intervals.

**Durable goods** manufacturing industries include wood products, furniture and fixtures, primary metal industries, metal fabricating industries, machinery (except electrical), transportation equipment, electrical products and non-metallic mineral products. All other manufacturing industries are designated as non-durable goods.

**Completion of the Questionnaire.** — Establishments differ to some extent in their classification of employees as between wage-earners and

salaried staff but it is felt that this does not significantly affect the validity of the data. Some what greater difficulty is experienced in distinguishing clerical and related workers from supervisory and professional staffs and certain categories of workers are known to be reported differently in successive surveys. While these factors may cause variations in the averages in comparatively small industry and area units, they rarely affect the year-to-year comparisons of the aggregate data.

### 2. Monthly Surveys of Employment, Payrolls and Man-hours

Statistics obtained in monthly reports from the manufacturing establishments reporting to the annual survey of earnings and hours of work in manufacturing are included in "Employment and Average Weekly Wages and Salaries" and "Man-hours and Hourly Earnings", briefly described on the second page of this publication. The same general definitions of employees, hours, and earnings are used, and the averages for manufacturing in the October publications vary very slightly from those obtained in the annual survey, as indicated below for October, 1966.

Two factors are largely responsible for the existing differences between the two series: (1) The monthly surveys call for data for the last pay period in the month. When this period exceeds a week, the calculated weekly equivalents of reported payrolls and hours may differ from statistics accumulated from individual pay records for the annual survey week. The effect on the overall averages is slight, but tends to be somewhat greater in industries or areas where longer pay periods are common, particularly if seasonal changes are in process. (2) The monthly reports on man-hours and wages relate only to wage-earners for whom records of hours are maintained, resulting in exclusion of most route-drivers, some pieceworkers and certain others not paid on an hourly basis, in all amounting to about 3 per cent of the wage-earners. Comparability with the annual data is appreciably affected only in industries such as food and beverages, and in areas such as Saskatchewan, where records of hours are not currently available for a fairly substantial proportion of wage-earners. In addition to the above-mentioned points of difference, such factors as the substitution of a selected normal week in order to avoid strike periods in the annual survey and occasional changes in industrial

classification or in reporting procedures subsequent to publication of the monthly statistics may contribute to some variations in the averages computed in the two surveys, particularly in small industry and area units.

### 3. Annual Census of Manufactures

Since 1917 the Dominion Bureau of Statistics has conducted an annual Census of Manufactures. Data are collected on a wide range of inputs including employment, payroll and man-hours. These are collected together with output data on both manufacturing and non-manufacturing activity.

Since the adoption of the New Establishment Concept and the revision to the 1960 Standard Industrial Classification reporting entities have become more standardized throughout the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

Questions on owner-operator employment and withdrawals are included on the census questionnaire and these data are segregated from tabulations of employment and payrolls. Since 1956, data on man-hours have been incorporated in the census for productivity measurement purposes. In 1966, estimates of these data relating to executive and administrative staffs were collected as a supplement to information collected formerly. Man-hours data for both administrative staff and production workers are collected on a yearly basis. Information relating to the number of male and female employees, (but not to their payrolls), is reported separately in the annual Census of Manufactures reports. Executive, administrative and office staff are reported on the basis of an annual average whereas production and related employees are reported for the last pay period of each month. Gross payrolls for the year are reported for each class of employee.

Statistics obtained from the annual Census of Manufactures are first published in the Manufacturing and Primary Industries Division's 135 individual industry reports.

### 4. Wage Rates, Salaries and Hours of Labour

Since 1901, the Department of Labour has collected annually from many thousands of manufacturing establishments information on wage rates of time workers and straight-time earnings of piece and other incentive workers in representative occupations of a non-supervisory nature. Results of the survey are published in the form of weighted averages and predominant ranges of rates for typical occupations in numerous industries and of index numbers of average wage rates, in relatively fine industrial detail. Information on average weekly salaries in typical office occupations and on average wage rates in maintenance and service occupations is published for 52 Canadian communities. Data on standard hours of work are also provided for most industries.

This wage and salary information is contained in the annual report entitled, "Wage Rates, Salaries and Hours of Labour" which is published as a loose-leaf table service for the industries and communities covered. These tables are later published as a bound volume. The monthly Labour Gazette also publishes information on employment, earnings, working conditions, terms of settlement in major collective agreements and related subjects.
