The British Columbia agriculture and agri-food system is diverse, with dairy, floriculture and nursery, and chicken farms comprising its main farm types, by value of farm cash receipts. British Columbia had 5% (2011) of Canada's food and beverage processing sales, with meat, other food (which includes snack food) and animal food manufacturing as its major food processing sub-industries, by value of shipments.

GDP

Canada

Real Gross Domestic Product (GDP) (2007 dollars) of the Canadian agriculture and agri-food system was \$103.4B in 2012, accounting for 6.7% of total Canadian GDP. The contribution of each component of the system accounted for the following shares of total GDP:

- Primary Agriculture (1.1%)
- Food, Beverage and Tobacco Processing (1.7%)
- Food Retail/Wholesale (1.8%)
- Input and Service Suppliers (0.6%)
- Foodservice (1.4%)

British Columbia

British Columbia's agriculture and food processing GDP in 2012 represented:

- 7.3% of Canada's agriculture and food processing GDP; and
- 1.5% of the province's total GDP.

British Columbia's Trade

- In 2012, British Columbia's agri-food exports totaled \$1.8B.
 This was up 18% over the 5-year average (2007-2011).
- The top British Columbia agri-food exports (excluding seafood)
 were fruit and nuts (e.g. fresh and frozen berries) at \$325M,
 other agri-food products (e.g. condiments and material for food
 preparation) at \$306M, and oilseed products at \$225M, in 2012.
- Exports of primary agricultural products were valued at \$633.8M in 2012 and accounted for 34% of British Columbia's agriculture and agri-food exports.
- Exports of processed products were valued at \$1.2B in 2012 and accounted for 66% of British Columbia's agriculture and agri-food exports.

Where does British Columbia source its food?

British Columbia sources its food from a variety of locations, including from within the province, from other Canadian provinces or territories and from other countries. In 2009, 30% of all the agriculture and food products that were sold in British Columbia were purchased from British Columbia producers and processors, 36% came from other parts of Canada, and 34% were imported from abroad.

Where do British Columbia's producers and food processors sell their products?

British Columbia's primary agricultural producers and food processors sell their products across Canada and around the world. In 2009, 45% of British Columbia's agriculture and agri-food production was purchased within the province, 37% was sold in other provinces and territories, and 17% was exported to international markets.

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Employment

The British Columbia agriculture and agri-food system employed 265,400 people in 2012, broken down as follows:

Federal Government Expenditures in Support of British Columbia's Agri-Food Sector

- In British Columbia, the total net annual expenditures came to \$144M per year, on average, between 2009-10 and 2013-14.
- These expenditures represented administrative expenditures of the Department (operating and capital) and program expenditures (subsidies and contributions).
- The data are presented on a financial year basis and, in some cases, were broken down and weighted between the provinces following certain factors.
- Operating and capital expenditures including research and inspection represented \$97M per year, on average, between 2009-10 and 2013-14. During the same period, program expenditures came to \$57M, on average.

Federal expenditures in selected program areas averaged as follows:

- Producer income support and stabilisation \$22.4M
- Research programs \$2.7M
- Inspection programs \$4.3M
- Environment programs \$3.7M
- Advancing Canadian Agriculture and Agri-Food (ACAAF) program and Canadian Agriculture Adaptation Program (CAAP) - Adaptation Council - \$1.4M

- ACAAF program and CAAP national component allocated to British Columbia - \$0.02M
- Canadian Agriculture and Food International (CAFI) program and AgriMarketing Program (AMP) - \$0.6M

Key Sectors

The Agri-Food industry of British Columbia is noted for its diversity.

The **fish and seafood industry** consists of wild capture and farm cultured fish. In 2012, the landed value of wild captured fish was \$366.8M and the harvested value of farmed fish was \$301.7M for a total value of \$668.5M at the primary level. There are 153 processing establishments that contribute additional value. In 2012, \$870M worth of fish and seafood were exported from British Columbia.

The **dairy industry** consisted of 491 farms in 2012 and generated farm cash receipts of \$530M in 2012. The 687M litres of milk produced were processed by 35 processing establishments. The industry generated an estimated \$14M from dairy product exports.

The **poultry industry** (chicken and turkey) consisted of 335 farms in 2012 and generated farm cash receipts of \$420M in the same year. There are 27 poultry processing establishments that generated \$152.3 worth of manufacturing sales and an estimated \$34M in exports.

The **egg industry** (hatching and table eggs) consisted of 189 farms in 2012 and generated farm cash receipts of \$113M in the same year. There are 53 hatching egg producers and 136 table egg producers in 2012. This industry generated \$46 worth of manufacturing sales.

The **greenhouse vegetables industry** consisted of 500 acres of greenhouses in 2012 and generated \$235M of farm cash receipts. There were 135 greenhouse operations that generated \$550M worth of manufacturing sales and \$115.6M worth of greenhouse vegetables exports.

The **floriculture industry** consisted of 1,263 farms in 2012. The industry generated farm cash receipts of \$438M and an estimated \$58.2M worth of exports in 2012.

The **cattle and calves industry** consisted of 4,080 ranches, farms and feedlots in 2012 and generated farm cash receipts of \$224M in the same year. The 22 animal (except poultry) slaughtering establishments generated \$37.7M worth of manufacturing sales and an estimated \$49.1M in exports.
