FINAL REPORT

of the

Commissioner appointed to investigate certain charges made by the halfbreed residents of the United States against R. C. Macdonald.

Hon Frank Oliver P. C.

Minister of the Interior.

Ottesa.

Sir:

Following up my interim report herein of the 18th August 1905. I now beg to present my final report to you for the information of his Accellency. The Governor General in Council. I forward herewith four typewritten copies of the evidence given at the Commission.

After a careful consideration of this evidence and remembering the demonstration of the situates and other circustances during the sittings of the Commission. I feel comply justified in finding that the charges of adscendure, misrepresentation and fraud made in the two petitions forwarded to your Department against the said R. C. Macdenald and his agents were fully and clearly disproved.

It would appear that a large majority of the halfbreeds who signed the said petitions were ignorant of the contents thereof, and were induced to sign same by disappointed scrip buyers, having selfish motives to serve, and many of the petitioners were under misapprehension as to the purposes of said petitions.

R. C. Macdonald and his employees were not guilty of practising any deceit, fraud or misrepresentation in their transactions with the halfbreads in question, and the charges made against them were almost shelly unwarranted.

In a few instances, however, that came under my consideration, and hereafter particularly referred to, there are doubts as to shether the halfbreeds clearly understood the nature and intent of the documents signed by them for Fr. R. C. Macdenald, and in order to give them the benefit of such doubt and do these among jurites. I have decided to recommend that their scrip be recalled or held pending further consideration and action.

provides report the only obtain cases calling for observation are the following:-

Lean Politres, File No.981978.

I would recommend that this man's serip be delivared to himself. He was not of age when dealing with Macdonald and his serip has not been is used yet.

Binnie Beitres, File Se, 94781

Macdenald holds this scrip, but has not yet paid for it. She sold it to him for \$200 and he is ready to pay for it, but she wishes to go back on her bargain with him. She is an intelligent waman, and I think perfectly understood the bargain and should be satisfied to carry it out as agreed.

John B. Lattergrass, Sr. File No.777157.

With further reference to this case I would recommend that the scrip be held until the claimant repays to R. C. Macdonald \$10 and Alex. Lesserance \$20, and thereupon the scrip be delivered direct to John B. Lattergrass Sr., or the legal representatives of the deceased halfbreads emtitled thereto.

Re Garieppy. File No. 952478.

It appears that Fronerick Gerieppy, the administrator of the estate of the three deceased relatives, is not competent to properly discharge his duties. I would therefore recommend that these three scrip be re-called and held until all the heirs furnish a release of their claims thereto and direct area a disposition thereof.

> Re J. Baptises Beaugrand dit Champagne. File No. 947355.

This man claimed scrip for three children, viz:

Marie Florestine, Maxime and 2s ther. One scrip was issued

for Marie Florestine and he sold it to Macdonald and received

his money and seemed antisfied. No undue advantage was taken

of him by R. C. Macdonald or his agents.

Re Marie Anestesia Morin, File No. 951225.

This woman was granted five scrip as administratrix of the estates of deceased sons. She sold her scrip to Macdenald, and after being served with writ in suit for specific performance she settled and accepted \$1.000. I submit that her case does not call for further action.

Re Angelique Davis, File No. 966397.

Scrip issued but not delivered. I believe she signed the order and agreement of sale to be conside though the empahtically denied deling so. However, in case she may nave misunderstood the true meaning and import of the deciments I respectfully recommend that the scrip be delivered to herecif.

Re Pierre Warin. File No. 947455.

This man satiled with Macdonald at \$240 and received the money. He has no ressonable ground for complaint.

Re Pierre Yaverdure. File No. 940005.

he was awarded three strip for three deceased children and sold them to Macdonald, who paid him \$600 for same. Mr. Lavardue has no reasonable ground for complaint.

Re Antoine Ouilette, File No. 947449.

The two serip amerded this man for deceased sons, Jean Marie and Albert have been delivered to him by Mr. PC. 2108 (a)

Macdonald. This complaint is, therefore, satisfactorily settled.

Re John Baptiste Davis. File No. 985845.

R. C. Macdonald purchased from this man the scrip to be issued for two deceased sons. Joseph and John Raptists, and when these are issued the scrip should be delivered to Macdonald. Mr. Macdonald makes no claim to the claimant's scrip for daughter Philomens.

Re Laurent Dushesne. File No.

This man claims two scrip. One re deceased daughter, Marie Rose and one for daughter Marie Virginia. The scrip are not issued yet. The daughter Marie Virginia is now of age and entitled to her own scrip. The other scrip was sold by Mr. Duchesne to Mr. Macdonald. Netwithstanding this man's denial under eath that he put his man's to the order and assignment, I am satisfied he swore falsely. To my mind no unlasful or wrongful means were adopted to produce his signature or mark or the sale of his scrip. Therefore, I recommend that the scrip due Mr. Duchesne re his daughter Marie Rose be delivered to Macdonald according to order on file.

Re Therese Reaugrand Boyer. File No. 947557.

This element's serie is held by the Department. Her chief complaint was that Macdonald had her scrip. In this

she was mistaken. No valid reason was advanced why her assignment to Macdonald and order for her scrip should not be held good.

Re Sarah Smith, nee Beaugrand, Filo No. 947563.
Re Rose Descateau nee Beaugrand.

These two sisters have no reasonable complaint. They each accepted \$215 in presence of relatives in full settlement for the scrip sold to Macdorald.

Re Jean Haris Beaugrand, File No. 947063.

This man accepted \$250 for his scrip and was scatled with on that basis. He should be satisfied.

Reviewing the whole conduct of R. C. Macdenald and his agents in their dealings with those halfureeds in the light of the sworn costimon, and the decomments produced. I have no hesitation in reporting that such conduct was gonerally fair and honorable, and he they should be honorably acquitted of any misrepresentation, dishonasty or fraudulent practice in obtaining from the halfureeds the assignments and orders for their scrip claimed by them under the Order-in-Council of the 15th August 1904.

INTERIM REPORT



OF THE

HALPBREED RESIDENTS OF THE UNITED STATES AGAINST R. J. HAJDONGO.

HON. FRANK CLIVER, P. J.,

MINISTER OF THE INTERIOR,

Sic: -

By authority of a Jornission issued to me under the Great Seel of Janaca bearing date the 'wenty-first day of June, A. J., 1905 directing me to held an inquiry at the Village of Killagney in the Province of Manitoba respecting charges made by the Helf Breed residents of the United States against R. J. 'seconded, I beg to present an interim report to you for the information of His Excellency, The Gevernor General in Jouncil.

Meetings of the said Jommission epened at Killarney on Tuesday, the twinty-fifth day of July A.D., 1905 at Ten o'elock in the forenoon. There were present as counsel representing the Grown Mr. Hugh Phillipps, afterwards attained by Mr. A. G. Hay, as counsel representing some of the petitioners and other complainants, Mr. H. W. H. Knott; as counsel representing the said R. C. Magaznaid Mr. H. W. Howell, K.C. and Mr. P. H. Phippen. Several hundreds of the Half Breads and others interested, including men, women, and children, attended in the town and at the hall during the sittings.

The Jormission held sittings and heart evidence on the 25th., 25th., 27th., and 25th. days of July and on the 3rd., 4th., 5th., 7th., 8th., and 9th. days of August and every op. ortunity was given to all persons appearing before your Jormissioner to make their somm plaints. The arguent of Jounsel was heard in Winniper on Friday, the 11th. August.

Mr. James Perkins was appointed and acted throughout the investigation as official stemographer and reporter having provincely been sworn to discharge these duties faithfully and negurately.

Meders. Joseph A. Marion, Joseph Brien, Alex. Delarende and Joseph Merin were sworn and sated as Interpreters on different occasions during the inquiry.

At the opening session the sommission and petitions were read over and explained to the large number of persons in attendance in the English and French languages.

The names of the Petitioners were then called but only a few of them were found to be present but all were invited to remain and present any complaints they might have against R. J. Haedonald or any other person.

Forty-eight persons gave evidence and their testimony was taken down by the Stenographer and will be extended and typewrite-en and be forwarded to you in about five weaks.

Evidence was adduced concerning the serip which has been issued and which has been sent to Mr. Esquonald for the following persons, namely:-

Minnie Poitres-for self. File 94731.

Prederick Garriepy-as administrator to the Estate of accessed brother and sisters, Jean Louis Garriepy, Harie goodle Garriety, and Marie Brosstine Garriety - File 952478

Jules Marion-for Self. File 347868.

Jean Baptiate Beaugrand dit Champagne, for decoused canghier, Harte Flerestine Beaugrand- File 947669.

Marie Anastasia Morin-as Administratrix to the Mesate of debased sone Jordin Amyotte, Joseph Ansoine Amyotte, Jinchee Bruno Amyotte, John A. yotte, and Theodore Amyotte File 951225.

Pierre Morin-for Self. File 947458.

Pierre Laverdure-for deceased daughters, Angels and Elise Laverdure, and deceased son, Hermingilde Laverdure-File 946005.

Evidence was also adduced respecting the Scrip of the following persons to whom, according to the returns placed before me, Sorip has been issued but has not been delivered by the Department, namely:-

Angelique Davis, nec Tureotte-Pile 956397.

Of the persons first mentioned to whem scrip has been issued and delivered to R. J. Macdonald, William Delorge Happenrey and gave evidence before me and stated that he seed his scrip to Macdonald and has received payment and had no complaint to make.

Jules Marion appeared before me and gave evidence that his scrip had been issued and he had agreed to yeddenald and he had been paid in full and he can have no complaint to make.

Agenor Lafontaine appeared before me and testified that he had refused to cell his scrip to Macdonald for \$200, but that he subsequently sold it to a man named Souture for \$250., the consideration for which he has duly received and he can have no further elaim upon this scrip.

Jean Marie Beaugrand testified amongst other things that he had agreed to sell his scrip to Macdonald for \$250. and admitted that he had received the price agreed upon.

Leon Poitras (File 981978) negotiated a sale of his Scrip by letter to R. J. Escadonald for \$300. but scrip has not issued yet.

John B. Lattergrass Sr. elaims scrips as heir of decembed brother and daughter, Jerome Lattergrass and Marie Resalie
Lattergrass Respectively (File 772167). Scrip not allowed yet. He also claims scrip for four other decembed children (Files 999616-18-89 Ac.)



Locadie, Florestine, Elizabeth and Maney, but he testified that these four children were all born in the United States. These are, therefore, not entitled to Scrip.

John B. Lattergrass, Jr. sold his Scrip to R. 3. Mass-donald but never applied for it. Mone issued.

Mario Matilda Joilibeis (File 988893) appeared and gave evidence but it turned out her application for sorip had been disallowed.

Olivine Marcil-her claim for scrip has also been disallowed.

Letters were received from Japt. John R. Allan regarding the claims for scrip of Marie Philomene Quellette (Mrs. Wells) and
Angelique Botineau (File 1236S A). Mr. H. Achesen of Saskatoon also
wrote regarding Mrs. Wells' claim. I understand those claims were not
allowed by the Department of the Interior and R. J. Macdenalu makes no
claim to their scrip.

John Baptiste Davis (File 985845) elaims as heir of two children, Philomene Davis and Joseph Davis, sarip sold to R. J. Mac-don dout not issued yet.

Laurent Duchesne claims as heir and representative of two daughters, Marie Role and Marie Virginio. The former is dead but the latter is now over 21 years of age. Scrip not issued yet.

John Baptiste Pelletier testified that he sold his Sorip to R. J. Macdonald and was satisfied.

Joseph Ducharms (File 983835) had no complaint.

Antoine Hainault signed the petition against R. J. Macdonald. He agreed to sell his serip to R. J. Macdonald at highest market price. Scrip not issued yet. He has no complaint.

The chief feature of the complaints of the above named John Ouellette, Seerge Mapoleon Rebinson, Leonard Makay, Pierre Bobell, and Benjamin Klymo, all resident in Montana, is the fact of the great delay that has taken place in paying them for their Serap.

There was no evidence of any nature or kind produced before me respecting any of the other scrip for which Emedenald had orders and which has been issued and delivered to him or issued and not delivered.

The evidence given at the Dommissism and taken down in shorthand has not yet been extended and the Reporter informs me it will be four or five weeksh before this oun be done. It will be impossible for me to make my findings upon the evidence as to the sorip involved in this comission of the other complainants above named until the shorthand lates are extended. I make this special interim report at the request of Mr. Macdonald for the consideration of the Minister.
