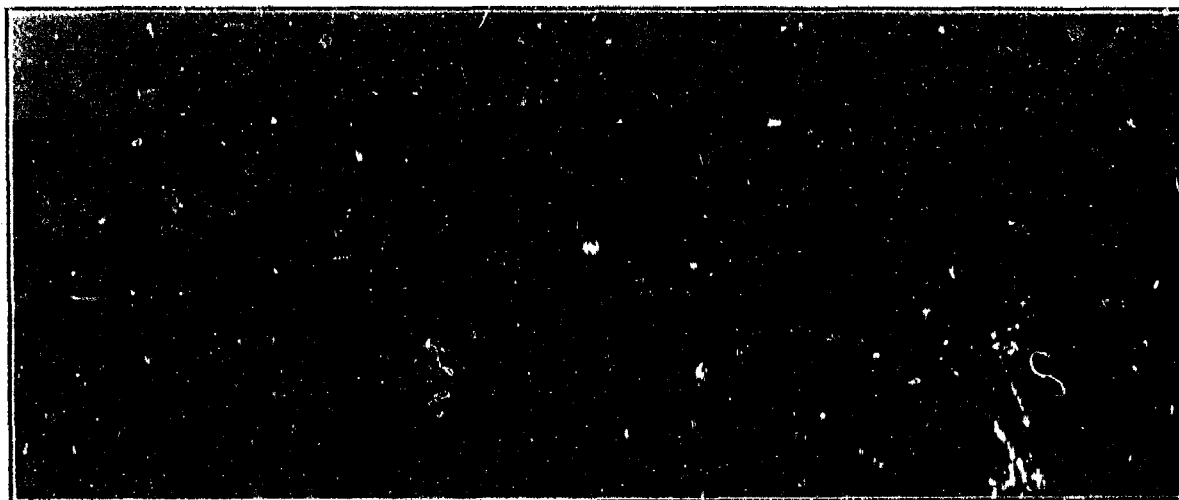
KAMLOOPS AGENCY

Visitations of Reserves and meetings with the Indians of the Kamloops Agency occupied the Commission from the 16th October to the 3rd November, 1913, as well as from the 5th to the 8th September, 1914, Mr. Agent Smith being under examination on the 19th and 20th November, 1913.

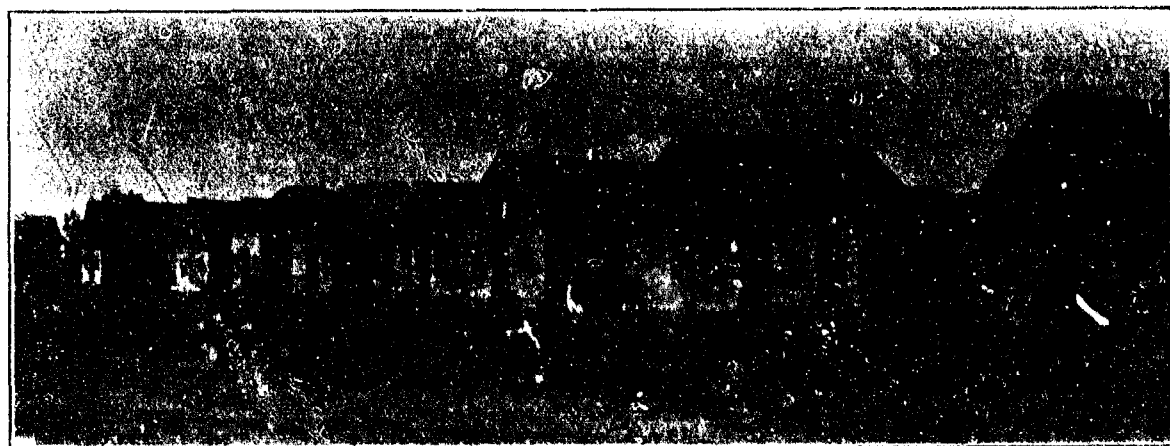
This Agency at the time of the Commission's creation contained seventy-one Reserves in all, of an aggregate area, according to the Official Schedule, of 166,555.94 acres, and an Indian population of 1701. During the course of the Commission's operations, however, this Agency has received an addition of thirty-two Reserves, of an aggregate area of 40,403.18 acres and an Indian population of 639, by the transfer (approved by the Commission after investigation) of certain Reserves from the Lytton Agency, for purposes of more efficient administration, the so added Reserves being geographically in touch with the Kamloops rather than the Lytton Agency headquarters. The established Reserves of the Agency were, therefore, found by the Commission to number 103, of 206,959.12 acres (as per Schedule) and 2,340 population, giving an Agency per capita of 88.44 acres, reduced by acreage errors of the Schedule to 73.828 acres.

Confirmations of 101 Reserves, containing a revised area of 169,728.13 acres, were made by the Commission, five Reserves being reduced by a total of 1327.00 acres—their areas being adjudged in excess of reasonable Indian requirements—and three Reserves, of 2171.53 acres, cut off as unused and non-essential to the maintenance of the native population. At the same time two new Reserves have been constituted and established, containing respectively 640.00 and 837.00 acres, in localities presenting more favourable opportunities for utilization of the land by the Indians in the characteristic industries of the Agency, farming and stock raising.

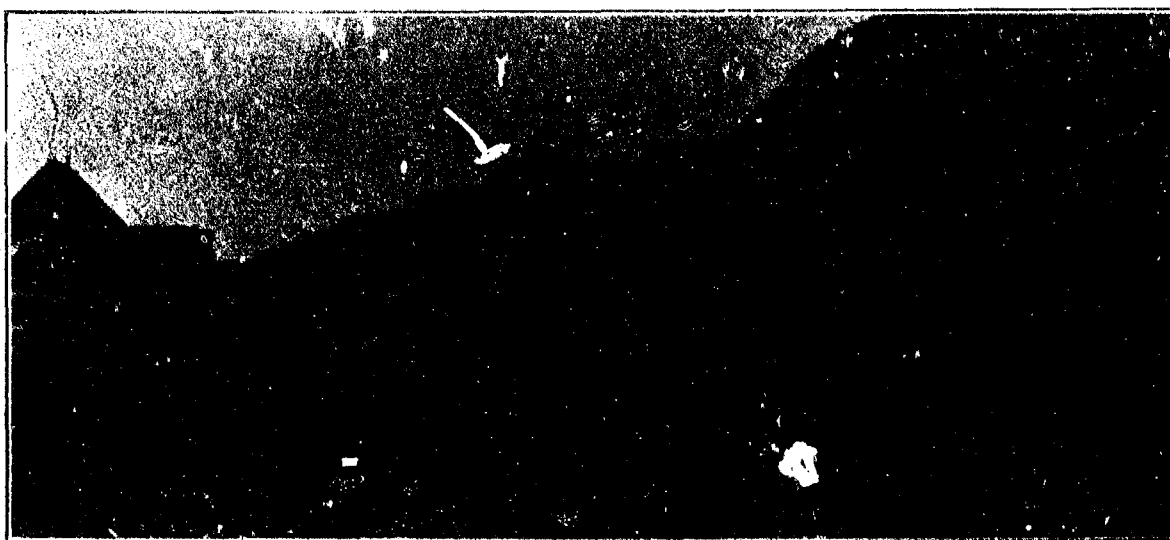
The completed work of the Commission accordingly leaves this Agency with 103 Reserves, of an aggregate area of 171,205.13 acres, or 73.16 acres per capita, an allowance by no means excessive in view of the fact that the southern portion of this Agency (in which the major population is found) is almost exclusively range country and large areas are consequently required by the Indians for their support, more especially as surrounding lands are held privately or by lease, and open range is therefore unobtainable. That portion of the Agency East of Kamloops City is more adaptable to mixed farming, and that to the West especially suitable for fruit raising and truck farming, for which reason less acreage meets the necessary and reasonable requirements of the Indian occupants.

MINUTES OF DECISION

In virtue of powers and instructions from the Governments of the Dominion of Canada and the Province of British Columbia contained in Commissions issued under the Great Seal of Canada respectively on the 23rd day of April, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, and the 7th day of April, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, to us directed, authorizing and empowering us as a Commission to fix, determine and establish the number, extent and locality of the Reserves to be set aside, allowed, established and constituted for the use and benefit of the Indians of the Province of British Columbia, we, the undersigned, having in each case made due enquiry into all matters affecting the requirements of the said Indians, do hereby declare the following to be the Reserves for the undermentioned Indian Tribes respectively, the date of our decision being in each case stated.

WATER RIGHTS OF INDIANS OF B.C.

MINUTE and RESOLUTION of the 15th June, 1916:

"WHEREAS former Indian Reserves Commissioners, acting under joint Governmental Agreements, allotted defined Water Rights to certain Tribes or Bands of Indians in British Columbia;

"WHEREAS this Commission has been unable to obtain any advice from the law officers of the Crown in right of the Dominion of Canada as to the authority of the said former Commissioners to allot such Water Rights;

"AND WHEREAS this Commission desires that any right or title which Indians may have to such allotted Water Rights may not be adversely affected by inaction on its part,

"BE IT RESOLVED: That, to the extent to which the allotting Commissioners had authority to allot such Water Rights, this Commission, insofar as the power may lie in it so to do, CONFIRMS the said allotted Water Rights as set forth in the Schedule hereto appended:

SCHEDULE

Kamloops Agency

Bonaparte Tribe: Minute of Decision of August 6th, 1881, constituting Hat Creek Reserve No. 2: "500 inches of water to be taken from Hat Creek is allotted for the use of the Indians."

Oregon Jack Creek Tribe: Minute of Decision of May 19th, 1886, constituting Reserve No. 7: "The surplus water of Nelson or Bernard Creek is hereby reserved for the use of the Indians on these allotments."

FISHING RIGHTS OF INDIANS IN B. C.

MINUTE and RESOLUTION of the 6th June, 1916:

"WHEREAS former Indian Reserves Commissioners, acting under joint Governmental Agreements, allotted defined Fishery Rights to certain Tribes or Bands of Indians in British Columbia;

"WHEREAS this Commission has been unable to obtain any advice from the law officers of the Crown in right of the Dominion of Canada as to the authority of the said former Commissioners to allot such fishery rights;

"AND WHEREAS this Commission desires that any right or title which Indians may have to such allotted fisheries may not be adversely affected by inaction on its part—

"BE IT RESOLVED: That, to the extent to which the allotting Commissioners had authority to allot such Fishery Rights, this Commission, insofar as the power may lie in it so to do, CONFIRMS the said allotted Fishery Rights as set forth in the Schedule hereto appended:

SCHEDULE

Kamloops Agency

Ashcroft Tribe: Minute of Decision of August 10th, 1881, *re* Fisheries: "The exclusive right of fishing on both shores of the Thompson River from the head of the Black Canyon upstream a distance of One (1) mile; also the exclusive right of fishing on both banks of the Thompson River from the mouth of Minnaberiet Creek, upstream a distance of one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) mile."

Oregon Jack Creek Tribe: Minute of Decision of August 12th, 1881: "A salmon fishery commencing One-quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$) mile above the mouth of Oregon Jack Creek and extending downstream on both banks of the (Thompson) River a distance of two (2) miles."
