NOTES

The Library of Parliament Trade and Investment series provides information on Canada's trade and investment relationship with the world and with selected countries. It also describes the trade relationship of each of Canada's 10 provinces and three territories with the world.

All figures were prepared using
Statistics Canada data available in
summer 2016, with three exceptions: "Share of
Global Services Exports and Imports," "Exports
as a Percentage of Gross Domestic Product"
and "Imports as a Percentage of Gross Domestic
Product." Those three figures use services trade
data from the World Trade Organization and
gross domestic product (GDP) data from the
World Bank.

The services trade data are balance of payments—based.

Numbers in this paper have been rounded. Definitions appear at the end of this paper.

All dollar amounts are in Canadian dollars unless otherwise noted






Canada's services trade with the world in 2015: \$223.6 billion

- Exports: \$100.1 billion, a 4.6% increase from 2014
- Imports: \$123.5 billion, a 3.6% increase from 2014

Services trade deficit in 2015: \$23.4 billion, unchanged from 2014

Share of the Total Value of Global Services Trade




Exports in 2015: 1.6% of the total value of global exports, a decrease from 1.7% in 2014


Exports as a Percentage of Gross Domestic Product

Imports as a Percentage of Gross Domestic Product




Canada's imports as a percentage of Canadian GDP in 2015: 6.2%, an increase from 6.0% in 2014


Destinations for Exports by Region



Major destinations for services exports, by region, in 2014:

- United States 55.0%, with a value of \$52.7 billion
- Europe 20.0%, with a value of \$19.2 billion
- Asia 11.2%, with a value of \$10.8 billion
- Americas (excluding the United States) – 6.9%, with a value of \$6.6 billion
- Africa 2.2%, with a value of \$2.2 billion

Major Destinations for Exports by Country (\$ billions)




Major destinations for services exports, by country, in 2015:

Sources of Imports by Region




Major sources of services imports, by region, in 2014:

- Americas (excluding the United States) – 8.8%, with a value of \$10.5 billion
- Middle East 1.1%, with a value of \$1.3 billion




Major sources of services imports, by country, in 2015:






Canada's services exports to the world in 2015:

- Commercial services \$62.4 billion, a 4.1% increase from 2014
- Travel services \$20.8 billion, a 7.6% increase from 2014
- Transportation and government services – \$16.9 billion, a 2.8% increase from 2014

(\$ billions)




Canada's services imports from the world in 2015:

- Commercial services \$59.3 billion, a 5.9% increase from 2014
- Travel services \$37.6 billion, a 0.6% increase from 2014

Services trade deficits in 2015:


- Travel services: \$16.8 billion, a decrease from \$18.1 billion in 2014

- Government services \$452.0 million, an increase from \$419.0 million in 2014

Highest-valued categories of commercial services exports in 2015:


- Technical and trade-related services – \$13.9 billion

(\$ billions)




Travel services exports in 2015:

(\$ billions)




Travel services imports in 2015:

(\$ billions)




Transportation services exports in 2015:

DEFINITIONS

Balance of payments—based data: Balance of payments—based data calculate trade flows using surveys of international trade and investment activity of firms and other entities.

Balance of trade: The trade balance is the difference between the value of exports and the value of imports. There is a trade surplus if the value of exports exceeds the value of imports. There is a trade deficit if the value of imports exceeds the value of exports.

Gross domestic product (GDP): GDP measures an economy's total production in a given year. As one entity's income is another entity's spending, GDP is equal to the total value of final sales or to the total value of incomes.

Services trade: Services trade is trade in travel, transportation and government, and commercial services. Travel services are goods and services purchased abroad by travellers, with one exception: cross-border transportation. Transportation services are the transportation of goods and cross-border travellers, and related services. Government services arise largely from official representation and military activities, and some governmental commercial activities. Commercial services are all other services, such as management, financial or engineering services; the category also includes charges for the use of intellectual property.
