The purpose of this open house is to inform the public of the Board's current activities and to hear public comments and suggestions regarding the Board's work. In addition, information will be presented on the operation of the Lake Erie – Niagara River Ice Boom, revision of the Ashland Avenue rating used to determine flows over Niagara Falls and current Great Lakes water levels.

The evening's format has been chosen to encourage an open dialogue with, and among, the participants. Posters, maps and other informative material will be displayed, and it is anticipated that discussions will focus on the responsibility of the Board in matters which affect the flows and levels of the Niagara River. Representatives of the Board will respond to concerns and guestions where possible, and record for later action - if required – those items concerning the Board which cannot be dealt with completely during the evening.
