Co-operation of CANADIAN BASE DEPOT with HOME GUARD units.

- 1. A further report is presented. This deals with co-operation of the CANADIAN BASE DEPOT with units of the HOME GUARD in the vicinity of its station.
- 2. Attention is directed to my previous Report No. 32, which sketched the development of the Depot and enclosed documents relating to the activities of its personnel during the heavy raids on MERSEYSIDE in May last. Lt.-Col. REMNE, LORNE SCOTS, commanding the Depot, has now furnished me with further documents concerning earlier phases of its work. Copies of some of these are attached as Appendix "A".
- S. While the matter of co-operation with and assistance to the Home Guard is doubtless of limited importance, it has seemed to me to have sufficient interest to render it worth while to take this opportunity of ensuring the preservation of at least a few documents concerning it. Not only does it reflect one phase of the preparations made in the United Kingdom to resist the invasion which has threatened this country since the early summer of 1940, but it also throws some light on relations between the Canadian troops and the English population.

It will be observed further that two of them date from the early days of the Home Guard in the summer of 1940, when this force (at first known as the Local Defence Volunteers) was hastily organized under the imminent threat of an invasion in which, it was anticipated, the enemy would make considerable use of parachutists and airborne troops.
