### Skeletal street network files

The 1996 Skeletal street network files (SSNF) are now available. These digital files consist of cartographic reference features such as major streets (with street names but no address ranges) and some railway features. Most or the reference features used to define census tract boundaries are included as well as other major roads or streets, some shorelines and large lakes. The SSNF are "thinned-out" Street network files.

### Employment, earnings and hours

October 1997 (preliminary)

As a result of the work stoppage by Ontario teachers, average weekly earnings for employees on company payrolls fell \$1.17 to \$595.81 in October. Removing the effect of the teachers work interruption, average weekly earnings increased by \$1.30 or 0.2%, in line with the trend since June 1997.

The year-over-year growth rate in average earnings for Canada has been less than 2% since June 1997, with higher than average annual earnings growth in finance, insurance and real estate, mining, quarrying and oil wells and wholesale trade. Provincially, annual growth in earnings has been highest in New Brunswick, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Adjusting for the teachers work stoppage, paid employment grew strongly in October, with industries excluding education adding 63,000 employees to company payrolls. Gains were widespread with especially strong growth in manufacturing (+10,500), wholesale trade (+9,500) and retail trade (+14,300).

Except for Ontario and Saskatchewan, all provinces gained payroll employment in October. Employment gains were especially strong in Quebec, with employment growth widespread across most industries.

#### Note to readers

The Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours (SEPH) is currently in the final phase of a major, multi-year re-engineering project to improve estimates of the level of business payrolls and paid employment, and to reduce reporting burden on businesses. With the change in methodology, there is a risk that employment estimates from the administrative records may show a different seasonal pattern than the previous questionnaire data, which can only be assessed within the context of a longer time period. Statistics Canada continues to monitor these impacts and will help users interpret its data. To minimize impacts, it is recommended that SEPH data, particularly employment data, be used in the context of longer time periods or for detailed industry distributions.

### Department store sales and stocks

November 1997

Department store sales remained virtually unchanged in November. Sales edged up only 0.3% (seasonally adjusted) from October to \$1,370.7 million. November marked the third consecutive month of marginal increases. Sales have generally been on the rise since 1993, except for a leveling off in the latter half of 1995. Since the last half of 1996, consumer spending in department stores had been relatively strong until September of this year.

The largest year-over-year increases (unadjusted for seasonality) were reported in Alberta (+14.6%), Saskatchewan (+8.6%) and Ontario (+8.3%). Department stores in British Columbia, Yukon and Northwest Territories (+2.2%) and Nova Scotia (+0.9%) posted the smallest year-over-year change in November.

# Production and disposition of tobacco products

November 1997

Cigarette production by Canadian manufacturers saw a strong increase in November while shipments declined slightly. Production was well ahead of total shipments and the surplus boosted inventories.

November production jumped to 4.9 billion cigarettes, an increase of 20% from October but 8% less than in November 1996. Year-to-date production was 4% below year earlier levels.

Approximately 3.5 billion cigarettes were shipped in November, down 2% from October. Of these, 3.3 billion (-2%) were shipped to the domestic market. Exports fell 7% to 100 million and are now less than 4% of shipments. Total shipments on a year-to-date basis

reached 43.1 billion, down 5% from the same period of 1996.

Relatively strong production built up inventories for a second consecutive month, which is the usual pattern in the months preceding December. Closing inventories stood at 5.5 billion cigarettes in November, up 18% from the previous month but 2% lower than a year ago.

### Asphalt roofing

November 1997

Production of asphalt shingles totalled 3 156 312 metric bundles in November, down 21.6% from 4 024 146 metric bundles produced a year earlier.

Year-to-date production amounted to 40 258 660 metric bundles, a 6.1% increase from 37 923 585 metric bundles produced during the same period in 1996.

## For-hire motor carriers of freight, all carriers

Second quarter 1997

During the second quarter of 1997, an estimated 2,089 for-hire motor carriers of freight domiciled in Canada (with annual revenues of \$1 million or more) generated \$3.47 billion in total operating revenues. This was an increase of 12% compared with the second quarter of 1996 (\$3.1 billion).

Second quarter 1997 total operating expenses also increased from \$2.9 billion in 1996 to \$3.29 billion.

The operating ratio (operating expenses divided by operating revenues) of for-hire motor carriers of freight, increased by 1 point to (0.95) over the same period last year. Any ratio under 1.00 represents an operating profit.
