## **Dangerous goods accident information system** 1997

Statistics Canada, in co-operation with Transport Canada, today releases the Dangerous goods accident information system. This is a database of all reported accidents involving the transport of dangerous goods.

These reports are filed if an accident involving dangerous good results in a release that presents a danger to health, life, property or the environment. Reports are also filed for accidents involving death or injury, or damage to containment due to impact stress or fatigue. The data are presented on an annual basis.

There is great detail available for each accident, ranging from the date, time, and location of the accident to the emergency personnel who responded at the scene. Also, any additional written comments, which were provided with the report, are included on the diskette and are accessible to FoxPro users. The data contained in this database are current up to 1997.

# Registered retirement savings plans contributions

1997

More than 6.1 million Canadians contributed a record \$27.4 billion to registered retirement savings plans (RRSP) during the 1997 tax year. However, the growth in both the contributions and the number of contributors slowed considerably from previous years.

The number of contributors rose 2.7% from 1996, which was the smallest increase since 1991. Similarly, contributions went up only 2.4% compared with a 12.9% increase the previous year. All amounts have been adjusted for inflation as measured by the Consumer Price Index.

From 1991 to 1996, the yearly average growth rate in the number of contributors was 6.1%, more than twice the growth rate from 1996 to 1997. Similarly, the average yearly increase in contributions from 1991 to 1996 was 13.5%, more than five times the growth between 1996 and 1997. Comparisons are made back to 1991, since this was the year when the *Income Tax Act* was amended to make the RRSP contribution limits more equitable between those who contribute to registered pension plans and those who do not.

Part of this slowdown in RRSP growth may be attributed to the fact that starting in 1997, Canadians had to convert RRSPs into income at the age of 69, instead of 71. However, the number of taxfilers that this change affects cannot account for the majority of the differences in the growth rates from this year to previous years.

## Contributors declined in three provinces and two territories

The number of taxfilers who contributed to RRSPs declined in 1997 in both territories and three provinces (Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick). It was only the second occasion since 1991 that any province or territory recorded such a decline.

In certain provinces, these declines may have been in part a result of interprovincial migration of taxfilers. Newfoundland, for example, recorded a 1.5% decrease in contributors, but the number of taxfilers fell 0.8% at the same time. Conversely, Alberta recorded a 4.1% increase in taxfilers along with a 5.0% increase in contributors.

Contributions also declined at the provincial level for the first time since 1991, falling in Newfoundland,

Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, as well as the two territories.

On the other hand, both contributors and contributions increased in central Canada. In Quebec, the number of contributors rose 4.0% to more than 1.4 million, and they contributed \$6.1 billion, up 7.5%. In Ontario, 2.4 million taxfilers (+2.9%) contributed almost \$11.4 billion (+2.0%).

In both 1996 and 1997, 3 out of every 10 taxfilers (30.0%) contributed to an RRSP. The highest proportion occurred in Alberta where 33.8% of taxfilers made a contribution, followed by 31.6% of taxfilers in Ontario and 31.4% in both British Columbia and the Yukon. Residents of these regions also reported median total incomes above the national median. Not surprisingly, the provinces that reported median total incomes below the national median, most notably the Atlantic provinces, have the lowest participation rates.

Taxfilers in Ontario and British Columbia had the highest median contribution (\$2,900) of any province, followed by those in Alberta at \$2,700. Taxfilers in the Northwest Territories had a median contribution of \$4,000.

Among all taxfilers, the median employment income was \$21,300 in 1997, but jumped to \$35,300 for individuals who contributed to RRSPs.

## Taxfilers aged 45 to 54 had highest RRSP participation rates

In 1997, the average RRSP contributor was 42 years old. Middle-aged taxfilers had the highest rate of participation. About 44% of taxfilers in the age group 45 to 54 contributed to RRSPs, the highest proportion of any age group. Those aged 65 and over contributed the most on average (\$6,750) of any age group.

In 1997, Canadians contributed only 13.5% of their total allowable limits (\$203.6 billion). This left unused room (the total RRSP contribution limit) of more than \$176 billion to be carried over for the 1998 tax year. Added to this unused room will be new room, which represents 18% of 1997 earned income minus the pension adjustments. Room data applicable to the 1998 tax year are also available.

### **Help-wanted Index**

November 1998

For the fifth consecutive month, the index that measures the number of help-wanted newspaper advertisements remained unchanged at 144 in November (1996=100).

Most provinces indices showed increases, except Alberta (-5.4%), British Columbia (-2.5%), and Saskatchewan (-1.5%).

## Population estimates by age and sex

July 1, 1998 (preliminary)

Population estimates by age and sex for Canada, the provinces and the territories, as of July 1, 1998, are now available. These estimates by age and sex are based on the 1996 Census counts adjusted for people who were missed in the Census (undercoverage), and those who were enumerated more than once or enumerated when they should not have been (overcoverage). They are consistent with the estimates of the total population released on September 24th. Historical revisions back to 1971 are also provided. The reference date for these annual estimates is July 1. The revised estimates take into account methodological improvements in the estimates of under- and overcoverage introduced in the 1996 Census.

The population estimates for July 1, 1998 are preliminary because the estimates for the components of population change (births, deaths, international and internal migrations) since the 1996 Census are based on data which will be revised.

### **Short-term Expectations Survey**

The Short-term Expectations Survey results covering the end of the fourth quarter 1998 and the first month of the new year show that little change is expected in the performance of the economy.

In September, the mean forecast for gross domestic product was an advance of 0.3% compared with actual growth of 0.1%. Little change is expected for October and November, with mean monthly growth of 0.2% and 0.1%, respectively.

Forecasts for international trade show that stability is expected over the October through December period.

The forecasted mean trade surplus for these three months is \$1.7 billion, a very slightly increase balance than the actual figure for September of \$1.6 billion. The forecasts for both exports and imports were lower than the actual figures for September.

Forecasters are also expecting a slight increase in the Consumer Price Index between November 1998 and January 1999. Actual inflation has been higher than expected — the forecasted average for October was 0.8% compared with the actual rate of 1.0%.

The unemployment rate fell to 8.1% in October while the participation rate remained steady at

65.2%. Forecasters are adjusting downwards the unemployment rate for the coming three months, with mean forecasts of 8.2% in November, 8.2% in December and 8.3% in January. Participation rates are forecast to remain stable.

## **Electric power statistics**

September 1998

Net generation of electricity increased to 41 423 gigawatt hours, up 1.2% from September 1997. Exports decreased 0.6% to 3 957 gigawatt hours and imports increased from 793 gigawatt hours to 1 327 gigawatt hours.

Generation of hydro electricity decreased 4.4% to 23 195 gigawatt hours due to low reservoir levels in Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba. Thermal conventional generation was up 16.3% to 12 894 gigawatt hours, mainly to accommodate higher electricity demand in Ontario. Generation from nuclear sources was down 4.2% to 5 334 gigawatt hours.

Year-to-date net generation at the end of September totalled 404 680 gigawatt hours, down

1.3% from the previous year. Year-to-date exports (34 781 gigawatt hours) were up 3.7%, whereas year-to-date imports (11 407 gigawatt hours) rose 101.3% from the previous year.


