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


Labour Force Survey

March 1998

Employment increased slightly in March (+18,000), bringing the gain since February 1997, when employment growth strengthened, to 466,000 (+3.4%).



Unemployment fell by 25,000 in March and the unemployment rate edged down 0.1 percentage points to 8.5%, the lowest since August 1990.



Increase in employment among adult women

In March, employment among adult women rose by 34,000, all in full-time work, bringing the gain since February 1997 to 237,000 (+4.5 %). By contrast, employment among adult men was little changed in March, as an increase in part-time partially offset a decline in full-time. This leaves their employment up 176,000 (+2.7%) since February 1997.

Among youths aged 15 to 24, employment was unchanged in March, following a jump of 38,000 in February. Since February 1997, youth employment has risen by 53,000 (+2.6%).

Private sector growth continues


In March, the number of private sector employees climbed by 39,000, continuing the strong upward trend observed since February 1997. Over this period, the gain totalled 490,000, an increase of 5.3%. After rising sharply between late 1996 and August 1997, self-employment has trended downward. With no change in March, self-employment is close to the level of a year earlier.

The number of employees in the public sector fell by 21,000 in March, leaving employment lower by 34,000 (-1.6%) compared with February 1997.

Manufacturing still creating employment

For the second consecutive month, employment in manufacturing rose by 30,000. This industry has shown strong growth of 184,000 (+8.8%) since February 1997. Over this period, employment growth has been solid in both durable (+8.0%) and non-durable (+9.5%) manufacturing.





Employment in health and social services rose by 22,000 in March, leaving it slightly higher than in February 1997 (+1.6%). Agricultural employment also increased in March (+9,000).

The gains in March were partially offset by losses in utilities (-9,000), business and personal services (-22,000), and finance, insurance and real estate (-12,000).

Gains in Quebec and British Columbia

Employment in Quebec rose by 20,000 in March, following an increase of 35,000 in February. These two increases completely offset the 46,000 jobs lost in January, when the ice storm led to a large number of temporary layoffs. The number of unemployed declined for a second straight month, dropping the unemployment rate to 10.1%, slightly below that observed in December.

In British Columbia, employment increased by 14,000 in March. Over the last two months,

employment in this province has increased by 23,000, recouping most of the losses incurred in December and January. Employment in British Columbia is now only slightly higher than in February 1997.

In Nova Scotia, employment fell by 5,000 in March, the first drop since April 1997. Since that time, employment has risen by 19,000 (+4.8%). In New Brunswick, employment fell by 4,000, reducing the growth since February 1997 to 6,000 (+2.0%).

Employment in Alberta fell by 9,000 in March. Despite weakness in the last two months, employment in this province has risen by 60,000 (+4.2%) since February 1997.

Employment was unchanged in Ontario, following large gains in the two preceding months. Since February 1997, employment there has increased by 263,000 (+5.0%), while the number looking for work has dropped by 81,000. This has pushed the unemployment rate in the province down to 7.4%, 1.6 points lower than in February of last year.



New Housing Price Index

February 1998

In February, the New Housing Price Index for Canada increased 1.0% compared with February 1997.

New Housing Price Indexes, February 1997 to February 1998



The largest monthly increases were noted in Charlottetown (+1.4%), Regina (+0.6%) and Hamilton (+0.5%), as some builders passed on the cost increases associated with spring 1998 construction to new home buyers. Smaller increases were noted in several other cities as builders reacted to improving market conditions. However, these increases were offset by monthly decreases in Victoria (-0.7%), Sudbury-Thunder Bay (-0.5%) and St. John-Moncton-Fredericton (-0.3)%. Generally, contractors attributed these decreases to competitive market conditions.

From January to February 1998, this index of contractors' selling prices for new houses showed virtually no change.

Steel primary forms

Week ending April 4, 1998 (preliminary)

Production of steel primary forms for the week ending April 4, 1998 totalled 314 738 metric tonnes, up 12.2% from 280 498 tonnes a week earlier and 1.8% from 309 297 tonnes a year earlier. Year-to-date production at the end of the week totalled 4 129 367 tonnes, a 9.3% increase from 3 777 431 tonnes for the same period in 1997.

Railway carloadings

February 1998

In February, carload freight (excluding intermodal traffic) loaded by railways in Canada totalled 19.5 million tonnes, a 4.4% increase from February 1997. The carriers received an additional 1.9 million tonnes from U.S. connections during February.

Intermodal (piggyback) tonnage in February totalled 1.3 million tonnes, a 1.6% decrease from the same month last year. The year-to-date figures showed a decrease of 4.4% from 1997.

Total traffic (carload freight and intermodal traffic) increased 4.0% during February. This brought the 1998 year-to-date total to 41.1 million tonnes, a 7.7% gain on the previous year. Receipts from U.S. connections rose 11.4% during the same period.

Year-to-date data for 1998 and 1997 have been revised.

Basic summary tabulations

1996 Census

This series from the 1996 Census provides summary information for small geographic areas of the country in tabulations using two or more inter-related census variables.

The entire series comprises 66 basic tabulations. One tabulation containing data on Aboriginal peoples is released today. Geographies include census divisions and subdivisions; census metropolitan areas, tracted census agglomerations and census tracts; federal electoral districts (1996 representation order); federal electoral districts (1987 representation order) and enumeration areas; and forward sortation areas. All geographies include data for Canada, the provinces and territories.

Prices begin with a flat fee of \$60, plus \$1 for each of the first 100 geographic areas, and 5¢ for each additional area.

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
