MAJOR RELEASES

Travel between Canada and other countries

June 1998

There were a record 1.6 million overnight trips to Canada in June, up 2.0% from May. Americans made a record 1.2 million overnight trips to Canada, up 2.2% from May. Overnight visits from residents of countries other than the United States also advanced 1.3%. Meanwhile, Canadians made 1.6% fewer trips abroad — despite a record number of overnight trips to countries other than the United States (up 0.9% from May to 350,000). Overnight visits by Canadians to the United States fell 2.3% to 1.2 million.

Overnight car trips by Americans to Canada rose 2.1% to 775,000 in June. Meanwhile, Canadians made fewer (-2.8% to 675,000) overnight car trips to the United States. The number of trips by Americans flying to Canada rose 2.8% to a record 306,000. Meanwhile, the number of Canadians travelling to the United States by plane advanced 1.5% to 391,000 in June.

Drop in same-day car trips between Canada and the United States

Same-day cross-border car trips by Americans increased 2.3% between May and June but remained below the peak of 2.3 million in January 1998.

Meanwhile, Canadians made the fewest number of same-day car trips to the United States (-3.0% to 2.4 million) since February 1987. The monthly number of same-day car trips by Canadians to the United States has been falling since the peak of 5.4 million in November 1991.

Note to readers

Month-to-month comparisons use seasonally adjusted data (that is, adjusted for variations that repeat annually and for variability caused by the different volumes of travellers associated with different days of the week). Year-over-year comparisons use unadjusted data (the actual traffic counts).

Visits include trips of one or more nights plus same day excursions.

Low dollar not luring overseas visitors

Europeans made 2.9% fewer overnight trips to Canada in June compared with a year earlier. However, there was an increase in the number of visitors from the United Kingdom (+3.9% to 95,000). The English pound reached a ten year high of C\$2.42 in June. Overall, visits from residents of countries other than the United States fell 5.5% (unadjusted) compared with June 1997.

Residents of Asia continued to make fewer visits to Canada (down 12.8% from June 1997 to 135,000) — despite an increase in visitors from Hong Kong (+43.6% to 16,000). After surging from fewer than 6,000 visits in June 1993 to over 26,000 visits in June 1996, visits from South Korea fell back to 7,000 in June 1998.

Full-time enrolment reached 395,326 in 1996/97, up 1.6% compared with 1995/1996. Both career and university credit programs accounted for the increase.

The college survey obtains information on student enrolments and graduates from programs with a grade 12 entrance requirement or equivalent. Enrolments and graduates from programs not requiring grade 12 are captured in a separate Trade and Vocational Survey. Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island recently raised the entrance requirement for most of the trade and vocational programs, and as a result, these enrolments and graduates are now part of the career program counts.

Career enrolments totalled 288,622, up 1.2% from a year earlier and 13.3% higher compared with 1992/93. The significant increase in career enrolments in Nova Scotia since 1992/93 was mainly due to a difference in survey reporting. The 2.5% increase in university credit enrolment between 1995/96 and 1996/97 reversed a five-year downward trend.

Total part-time enrolment declined to 153,736 students in 1996/97, down 3.0% compared with a year earlier.

Community colleges and related institutions: Post-secondary graduates 1995/96

There were 79,540 graduates in career programs in community colleges and related institutions in 1995/96, up 9.6% from 1994/95 and 31.6% higher compared with 1991/92. The significant increase in graduates in Nova Scotia since 1992/93 was mainly due to a difference in survey reporting.


