

Police personnel and expenditures 1997 and 1998

There were 54,722 police officers in Canada as of June 15, 1998, virtually unchanged from the previous year, according to a new report released today.

The report, *Police personnel and expenditures in Canada - 1997 and 1998*, provides an analysis of police personnel on a national basis between 1962 and 1998, and on a provincial and census metrpolitan area (CMA) basis for 1998. It also contains an analysis of police expenditures at the national level between 1985 and 1997, and at the provincial level for 1997 alone.

Women accounted for nearly one out of every eight police officers (12%) in 1998, their highest proportion ever. This proportion has been increasing steadily since the mid-1970s, after remaining at less than 1% during the 1960s and 1970s.

Canada's police forces had 48,036 male officers in 1998, down 1.2% from 1997. Meanwhile, the number of female officers increased 9.8% to 6.686.

The number of police officers per capita declined for the seventh consecutive year to 181 for each 100,000 population, the lowest rate since 1970. This rate had increased steadily during the 1960s and early 1970s, peaking at 206 in 1975.

Manitoba had 195 police officers for every 100,000 population, the highest rate among the provinces for the third year in a row. Manitoba was followed by Quebec and Saskatchewan, each with 185. Newfoundland (143) and Prince Edward Island (149) continued to have the lowest per capita rates.

Thunder Bay had 186 police officers for every 100,000 population, the highest rate among the census metropolitan areas (CMAs), followed by Winnipeg and Saint John. The CMAs of Sherbrooke, Kitchener and St. Catharines-Niagara had the lowest rates.

Policing expenditures totalled nearly \$6 billion in 1997, about \$200 for each Canadian. After adjusting for inflation, it was the first constant dollar increase (+0.6%) in policing expenditures in five years.

Among the provinces in 1997, Quebec and Ontario each had the highest per capita costs for policing at \$177 (excluding federal policing costs), while Newfoundland (\$98) and Prince Edward Island (\$100) had the lowest.

Cement

December 1998

Manufacturers shipped 825 829 tonnes of cement in December, up 6.4% from 776 370 tonnes in December 1997, and down 21.4% from 1 050 437 tonnes in November 1998.

For January to December 1998, shipments totalled 12 113 413 tonnes, up 3.2% from 11 736 272 tonnes during 1997.


