Public sector employment

1998 (preliminary)

Employment in the public sector started to stabilize in 1998 after an average decline of 1.8% in the past five years. The public sector employed an average of just under 2.8 million people last year, down a marginal 0.6% from 1997. The public sector contains all institutional units controlled by government.

The decline of about 15,400 jobs in 1998 was the smallest since 1993. In contrast, the public sector workforce fell by approximately 88,000 in 1996 and 70,000 in 1997.

After several years of tighter budgetary control and restructuring by governments, there are now as many people working in the public sector today as there was in 1984. However, on average, there were 92 public sector employees per 1,000 persons in 1998, down from 108 in 1984.

Among the provinces, Quebec and Ontario registered the largest declines in public sector employment in 1998. Ontario had 949,400 public sector employees, down 3,400 (-0.5%) from 1997, while there were 717,500 in Quebec, down 13,400 (-1.8%). Public sector employment increased the most in Alberta where 1,600 employees were added to the work force.

Almost all the decline occurred in government

The decline in public sector employment in 1998 occurred for the most part in the government, which consists of individuals who work for the federal, provincial/territorial and local governments. In 1998, these three levels of government employed an average of just over 2.5 million people, 0.6% less than in 1997.

Employment in the government business enterprises, a major component of the public sector, remained virtually unchanged with 257,700 employees in 1998.

Employment fell in all three levels of government, with the federal work force experiencing the largest drop (about 47% of the total decline). The federal government (including military) employed an average of 331,100 people in 1998, down 2.0% or 6,900 from 1997. The federal employment reduction in Quebec included a transfer of almost 1,100 employees to the provincial government at the beginning of the year. This transfer was the result of the implementation of the Canada-Quebec Labour Market Agreement in Principle signed in April 1997.

The provincial/territorial work force also declined by about 6,100 employees to 1.3 million. Hospitals in Ontario and Quebec, as well as the general administration in Ontario, accounted for most of the provincial/territorial decline.

The local government work force fell by about 1,700 to 889,800. Declines in the local work force were highest in Quebec and British Columbia, while Ontario experienced the biggest increase in local government workers.

Public sector wages and salaries up for the first time in five years

Overall, wages and salaries paid to employees in the public sector increased for the first time in five years in 1998. Public sector employees received \$101.6 billion in wages and salaries last year, up 0.6% from 1997.

Total outlay on wages and salaries for government was \$90.5 billion, about 90% of the public sector total. Provinces and territories paid \$43.2 billion in wages and salaries, an increase of \$370 million over 1997. Most of this increase went to health and social services. Federal government paid out \$14.4 billion in 1998, \$116 million more than in 1997.

Total wages and salaries for municipal governments were \$33.0 billion in 1998. Although there was little change in total remuneration paid by local governments, wages and salaries paid by school boards increased \$351 million while those paid for municipal administration decreased by \$258 million.

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
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
