Public sector employment

1999 (preliminary)

Employment in the public sector continued to stabilize in 1999. The public sector employed an average of just under 2.8 million people last year, an increase of 900 jobs from 1998. This is the first such rise in seven years. (Employment is measured monthly, and averaged for the year.) The public sector contains all institutional units controlled by governments.

After several years of tighter budgetary control and restructuring by governments, there are as many people working in the public sector today as there were in 1985. However, there were less than 92 public sector employees per 1,000 persons in 1999, down from more than 108 in 1985.

Ontario and Alberta registered the largest increases in public sector employment in 1999. Ontario had 958,200 public sector employees, up 4,700 (+0.5%) from 1998; there were 259,300 in Alberta, up 4,300 (+1.7%). Public sector employment declined most in Quebec, where 12,000 jobs were lost.

The stability of public sector employment reflects trends in government employment, which accounts for almost 91% of the public sector work force. In 1999, federal, provincial/territorial and local governments employed just over 2.5 million people, virtually unchanged from 1998.

Employment fell slightly in two of the three levels of government. The provincial/territorial work force declined by about 1,800 employees (-0.1%) to 1.3 million. Hospitals and universities in Quebec, as well as colleges in Ontario, accounted for the provincial/territorial decline.

The federal government (including the military) employed an average of 330,000 people in 1999, down 0.3% or 970 jobs from 1998. A drop in the military of 2,400 jobs more than offset a 1,400-job increase in general government employees.

However, local government employment increased by about 2,200 jobs to 894,000 in 1999. Increases in the local government work force were highest in Ontario and Alberta, which had, respectively, 2,660 and 1,800 more jobs than in 1998.

Public business enterprises, which account for the remaining portion of the public sector, registered a second consecutive annual increase. In 1999, public business enterprises employed 262,000 people, up 0.6% or 1,500 jobs from the previous year.

Employer pension plans (trusteed pension funds)

Third quarter 1999

The market value of the total assets of employer-sponsored pension plans was \$524 billion at the end of the third quarter, virtually unchanged from the previous quarter.

Crude oil and natural gas

January 2000 (preliminary)

Crude oil production increased by 4.5% over January 1999; Newfoundland and Saskatchewan were the chief contributors to this gain. Exports, which accounted for 64.2% of total production, rose by 16.7% compared with January 1999.

Marketable natural gas production rose by 1.2% over January 1999. Domestic sales increased by 3.1%, the third consecutive monthly year-over-year growth. This increase is due in part to greater demand for natural gas by electric utilities. Exports continued a long-standing trend of increases, posting a 2.1% gain from January 1999.


