Travel-log

Spring 2000

The spring 2000 issue of *Travel-log*, Statistics Canada's quarterly tourism newsletter, features the article "The Changing Family and the Evolution of the Canadian Family Travel Market, 1980–1998." The first part of the article describes the changes that have occurred in the family structure, and provides an overview of the demographic changes from 1980 to 1998 in order to shed light on the factors that seem to influence today's travel market. The second part of the article describes travel by Canadian families in 1998 compared with that of adults travelling alone, and presents some of the strategies used by the tourism industry to adapt to these new markets.

Each quarter, *Travel-log* examines the trends of the Travel Price Index. It also features the latest travel indicators, travellers' characteristics and the international travel account.

Help-wanted Index

March 2000

In March, the Help-wanted Index (1996=100) increased by 0.6% to 171. At the Canada level, the index has not recorded a month-to-month decrease since March 1996; however, the rate of increase has slowed in recent months.

In March, none of the provincial indices posted a decrease.

Note:

The historical revision of the Help-wanted Index has been implemented this month. This revision includes the period from January 1997 to date. The Help-wanted Index is compiled from the number of help-wanted ads published in 22 newspapers in 20 major metropolitan areas. The index is a measure of companies' intentions to hire new workers. These indices have been seasonally adjusted and smoothed to ease month-to-month comparisons.

New Housing Price Index

February 2000

The New Housing Price Index rose 0.4% from January to February. On an annual basis, this index of contractors' selling prices for new houses increased 2.1%. This is the highest annual increase since May 1990, when it rose 3.8%.

On a monthly basis, the 0.4% increase at the Canada level was the highest in more than six years. The largest increases were noted in Kitchener–Waterloo and London (+1.5%). In Kitchener–Waterloo, builders faced higher prices for building materials, such as insulation and drywall, as well as higher labour costs. In London, builders paid more for building lots, municipal permits and building materials.

Higher prices for building materials and labour also contributed to the monthly increase in St. John's (+1.1%). Marginal decreases were noted in Sudbury–Thunder Bay (-0.2%) and Victoria (-0.1%), and five urban centres registered no change from January.

Annual changes varied considerably among the urban centres surveyed. The highest annual increases occurred in St. Catharines–Niagara (+5.5%) and Ottawa–Hull (+5.0%), mostly as a result of higher prices for materials and labour. Notable increases were also observed in Kitchener–Waterloo, Halifax, Winnipeg, Regina, Calgary and Montréal. Three urban centres registered decreases on an annual basis, with the largest drop in the highly competitive Victoria market.

Railway carloadings

Seven-day period ending March 21, 2000

Non-intermodal traffic loaded during the seven-day period ending March 21 increased 12.7% to 5.1 million tonnes compared with the same period of last year. The number of cars loaded increased 12.3%.

Intermodal traffic tonnage totalled 418 000 tonnes, 9.4% more than in the same period of last year. The year-to-date figures grew 16.7%.

Total traffic increased 12.5% during the reference period. This brought the year-to-date total to 60.0 million tonnes, a rise of 12.7% from the previous year.

All year-to-date figures have been revised.

Particleboard, oriented strandboard and fibreboard

production strandboard Oriented February totalled 603 301 cubic metres. 2.9% up from 586 174 cubic metres in February 1999. Particleboard production reached 184 899 cubic metres, a decrease of 0.3% from 185 493 cubic metres in February 1999. Fibreboard production 89 totalled 773 cubic metres. up 38.7% from 64 743 cubic metres in February 1999.

For January and February 2000, year-to-date oriented strandboard production totalled 1 292 290 cubic metres, a 2.4% increase from 1 262 529 cubic metres for the same period in 1999. Particleboard production reached 384 883 cubic metres, up 1.1% from 380 794 cubic metres produced over the same period in 1999. Year-to-date fibreboard production reached 190 747 cubic metres, up 37.4% from 138 870 cubic metres during the same period in 1999.


