

March intentions of principal field crops areas

2000

Highest barley acreage in 19 years

Planted acreage of barley was expected to be 13.3 million acres, the highest since 1981, when farmers planted 13.7 million acres. The recent 10-year average seeded area is 11.4 million acres. All three Prairie provinces moved in concert: Manitoba (+37%), Saskatchewan (+28%) and Alberta (+18%). The growing livestock industry in the west is the major user of barley.

Field peas to set new record for seeded area

Field pea acreage will reach a record 3.0 million acres this year, a 935,000-acre (+43%) increase from the 1999 seeded area of 2.1 million acres. The previous record of 2.7 million acres was set in 1998. As with barley, the growth occurred in all three Prairie provinces: Manitoba (+71%), Saskatchewan (+45%), and Alberta (+38%). Peas are being used increasingly in domestic animal rations, and are exported to Europe and Asia as well.

Note to users

The March Intentions Survey of 12,000 farm operators was conducted by telephone interviews during the last week of March. This release contains producers' seeding intentions for field crops in the coming 2000/2001 crop year. Since these seeding intentions reflect producers' plans in March, they may differ from what will actually be seeded later in the year. Changes in market outlook, expected prices, spring weather conditions and the published seeding intentions themselves may alter prospective cropping patterns. Estimates of actual seeded areas will be released on June 29.

Durum wheat plantings to increase by more than one-third from last year

Western farmers expect to plant 6.1 million acres of durum wheat, an increase of 1.7 million acres from 4.4 million acres in 1999. The average for the past five years is 5.5 million acres, and the record of 7.3 million acres was set in 1998. The increase could be in response to a drought in the durum-growing regions around the Mediterranean Sea, lower planting intentions in the United States and better price prospects for durum wheat.

Quebec and Ontario farmers are poised to plant the largest grain corn crop in history

This year Quebec and Ontario corn producers reported that they intend to seed 3.0 million acres, 300,000 acres more than the record 2.7 million acres planted in 1999. Together, they plant 93% of the grain corn in Canada. This will be the single largest acreage of grain corn in history for the two provinces. The five-year average for Quebec and Ontario is 2.6 million acres. The increases over the last three years are related to the need for increased quantities of feed corn for an expanding hog industry in the two largest hog-producing provinces, and as input to the growing fuel ethanol industry.

Steel primary forms

Week ending April 15, 2000 (preliminary)

Steel primary forms production for the week ending April 15 totalled 298 221 tonnes, up by 0.6% from the week-earlier 296 531 tonnes and up 10.9% from 268 863 tonnes a year earlier. The cumulative 2000 total at the end of the week was 4 901 378 tonnes, a 9.2% increase compared with 4 486 764 tonnes for the same period in 1999.

Pulpwood and wood residue statistics February 2000

Pulpwood receipts totalled 4 267 642 cubic metres in February, down 4.1% from 4 448 652 cubic metres in February 1999. Wood residue receipts rose 10.0%, from 6 600 641 cubic metres in February 1999 to 7 258 894 cubic metres in February 2000. Consumption of pulpwood and wood residue totalled 9 719 697 cubic metres, up 7.2% from 9 063 360 cubic metres in February 1999.

The closing inventory of pulpwood and wood residue decreased 1.7% to 15 442 579 cubic metres, down from 15 712 174 cubic metres in February 1999.

Crushing statistics

March 2000

Canadian oilseed processors crushed 301 705 metric tonnes of canola in March, according to the monthly survey of crushing plants. Oil production

totalled 125 547 tonnes, and meal production was 187 265 tonnes.

In the first eight months of the 1999/2000 crop year, the canola crush volume was 2 065 047 tonnes, an 8% decline from the crush quantity of 2 245 261 tonnes in the same eight months of 1998/99.


