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Σ -STAT: The ultimate interactive learning tool

 Σ -STAT, Statistics Canada's interactive learning tool, has an improved format just in time for the start of school. The 2000 edition contains two new features that make it even more user-friendly and versatile.

Students can now search for data by theme. As well, Σ -STAT now features text to complement the data. Students can access selected articles from Statistics Canada products such as the *Canada year book 1999* and *Canadian social trends*.

The product's title sports a new look to reflect the enhancements. This ninth edition is now available on the Statistics Canada Education Resources Web site (http://estat.statcan.ca).

 \varSigma -STAT 2000, free to the education community, combines 450,000 current social and economic time series, containing data on business, industry, labour, prices, health, crime and many others, as well as data from the 1996 Census and historical censuses. For the plugged-in teacher, \varSigma -STAT 2000 offers a host of curriculum-relevant activities developed by educators specifically for Grade 6 and up. Students can watch history unfold as columns of data are easily transformed into maps and graphs to reveal important trends.

Travel between Canada and other countries July 2000

The estimated number of trips by foreigners to Canada fell in July for the fourth consecutive month, down 0.8% from June to 4.0 million. Meanwhile, after three consecutive monthly declines, the total number of trips by Canadians to foreign countries rose 0.3% to 3.9 million. (Unless otherwise specified, the data are seasonally adjusted.)

Overnight travel between Canada and the United States decreased on both sides of the border from June to July. Canadians made 0.8% fewer overnight trips to the United States, down to slightly less than 1.2 million. Similarly, overnight trips by Americans to this side of the border decreased 1.0% to slightly more than 1.2 million.

During the same period, both Canadians and Americans took slightly more same-day cross-border car trips. Canadians made 2.2 million car excursions to the United States in July, up 0.4% from June. Americans took 2.2 million similar trips to Canada, up 0.9% from the previous month.

Compared with the same month last year, however, the number of same-day car trips between the two countries decreased on both sides of the border. Americans made 8.0% fewer car trips of less than 24 hours to this country, down from a record high of 2.4 million in July 1999 to 2.2 million in July 2000. During the same period, the number of same-day cross-border car trips by Canadians decreased 1.6% to 2.2 million.

Higher gasoline prices and a cool wet summer might be some of the factors contributing to the decline in the number of same-day trips between Canada and the United States in July.

Canadians made 388,000 overnight trips to overseas destinations in July, down 0.8% from June. Overseas residents travelled for at least one night to Canada on 361,000 occasions, down 1.0% from the previous month.

Among Canada's top 12 overseas overnight markets, travellers from South Korea (+33.7%), Mexico (+14.5%) and Australia (+13.3%) made substantially more trips in July 2000 than they did in July 1999. Travellers from Hong Kong (-14.7%), France (-3.7%) and Italy (-3.5%) were the only ones recording a decline in their number of trips to Canada during that period (unadjusted data).

Postal area profiles

1998

Postal area profiles, a databank profiling more than 5,000 communities across Canada, is now available. Based on 1998 tax records filed in the spring of 1999, these data are ideal for supporting policy analysis as they provide a comprehensive picture of communities.

The profiles consist of five tables, which include information on taxfilers and dependants, selected sources of income of individuals, labour force participation, economic dependency on transfer payments and family characteristics. Data on each community can be compared with provincial and national figures to show how communities fit into the broader picture. These data can also be used to assess trends over the past four years.

High standards of confidentiality ensure that no individual or family can be identified from these profiles.

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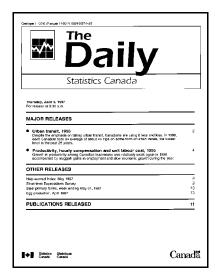
