

Employment, earnings and hours

July 2000 (preliminary)

Average weekly earnings for all employees in July rose \$2.29 compared with June. Average earnings were estimated at \$627.49 per week, an increase of 2.7% from July 1999.

While both salaried and hourly rated employees saw increases in average weekly earnings since July 1999, those in the other employees group have lost a bit of ground. Weak earnings for commissioned salespersons in the wholesale trade, business services and finance and insurance industries contributed to a decline of 1.2% in average weekly earnings since July 1999 for other employees.

Average hourly earnings for hourly rated employees rose to \$15.80 in July, an increase of 2.7% from July 1999. Average weekly hours for hourly rated employees were down 0.1 hours to 31.2, and average overtime hours were unchanged.

Payroll employment rose slightly (+13,500) in July. This is the third consecutive month of small payroll employment gains. By industry, the largest employment gain was in business services. Among the provinces, employment gains were concentrated in Ontario and Alberta.

Note: In May 1998 Statistics Canada finished incorporating administrative records into the production of employment, earnings and hours estimates (this was the third phase of the redesign). As a result of this change in methodology, estimates derived from

administrative records may show a different pattern than the previous data. This may affect the historical comparability of employment and earnings series.

Beginning with the January 2001 data, estimates from the Survey on Employment, Payrolls and Hours will be based on the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) instead of the 1980 Standard Industrial Classification. At the same time, the historical series will be revised to reflect the new phase-three levels of employment and earnings derived from administrative records on a NAICS basis. In addition, seasonal factors will be revised, thus improving the historical consistency of seasonally adjusted estimates. Crude oil and natural gas

July 2000 (preliminary)

Crude oil production totalled 10 751 500 cubic metres in July, up 1.8% from July 1999. Saskatchewan and Newfoundland posted increases, but Alberta production declined. The decrease in Alberta was the result of much lower synthetic crude oil production. Imports rose 18.6% over July 1999. Exports advanced 2.4%.

Year-to-date production of crude oil grew 5.7% over the same period of 1999. Exports jumped 14.9%,

owing to higher demand for Canadian crude oil by U.S. refineries.

Marketable natural gas production rose 1.2% over July 1999. Domestic sales climbed 8.8%, reflecting higher demand by the residential, commercial and industrial sectors. Exports of natural gas were up 1.7% from July 1999.

Year-to-date marketable production of natural gas increased by 2.1% over the same period in 1999. Year-to-date exports of natural gas were up 4.4%, while year-to-date Canadian domestic sales rose 5.6%.

Mineral wool including fibrous glass insulation

August 2000

Manufacturers shipped 2 888 470 square metres of R12 factor (RSI 2.1) mineral wool batts in August, 33.3% more than the 2 167 250 square metres shipped in July and 28.6% more than the 2 246 518 square metres shipped in August 1999.

Year-to-date shipments to the end of August totalled 17 616 852 square metres, a 11.2% decrease from the same period in 1999.

Light bulbs and tubes

August 2000

Light bulb and tube manufacturers sold 23.5 million light bulbs and tubes in August, an increase of less than 1% from the 23.4 million sold in August 1999.

Year-to-date sales at the end of August totalled 172 million light bulbs and tubes, the same amount as in the same period of 1999.


