

CASH INCOME FROM THE SALE OF FARM PRODUCTS, JANUARY - JUNE, 1961(1)

Farm cash income from the male of farm products for the first six months of 1961 has been estimated at 1,329.4 million dollars, about 4 per cent above the estimate of 1,276.1 million dollars for the first half of 1960, and nearly one per cent above the previous all-time high of 1,318.6 million dollars established in 1959. These estimates include Canadian Wheat Board participation payments, net advances on farm-stored grain in western Canada and deficiency payments made under the provisions of the Agricultural Stabilization Act. For the most part the increase in farm cash income between 1960 and 1961 was attributable to increased returns from the sale of wheat, flaxseed, tobacco, hogs, and poultry products. Lesser amounts were also contributed by oats, barley and dairy products. Offsetting these gains to some extent were smaller returns from marketings of potatoes and cattle, reduced Canadian Wheat Board participation payments and substantially larger repayments of cash advances on farm-stored grains in western Canada.

All provinces, except Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, shared varying amounts of the increase in farm cash income. In the case of these two Maritime provinces, a substantial reduction in income from the sale of potatoes was almost entirely responsible for the decline in total income of about 25 per cent and 16 per cent respectively. The gains recorded for the remaining provinces ranged from less than one per cent for Alberta to just over nine per cent for Saskatchewan.

In addition to income from the sale of farm products, farmers in western Canada received supplementary payments totalling 7.6 million dollars during the first six months of 1961, as against 29.6 million dollars for the corresponding period a year earlier. Payments for the current year were made up almost entirely of payments made under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act whereas, in 1960, they included 17 million dollars of P.F.A.A. payments and 12 million dollars paid out in connection with the Federal-Provincial Emergency Unthreshed Grain Assistance Act.

When combined, the cash income from the sale of farm products and supplementary payments amounted to 1,337.0 million dollars for the first half of 1961. This was above the estimate of 1,305.7 million dollars realized in 1960, but slightly below the figure of 1,339.5 million dollars for the January June period of 1959.

Field Crops - Total cash income from the sale of field crops amounted to 477.9 million dollars during the first six months of 1961, about 26 million above the revised estimates for the same period a year ago. Contributing most to this gain were increased returns from the sale of wheat, flaxseed and tobacco. Lesser increases were noted for oats and barley. The increase in returns from these commodities was much greater than the combination of the decline in income from potatoes, smaller total participation payments made by the Canadian Wheat Board, and the substantial repayment of loans obtained by western farmers on farm-stored grains; these repayments are reflected in the net cash advance payments of minus 34.9 million dollars.

Total returns from wheat at 234.3 million dollars to the end of June this year were about 30 million dollars above the 1960 estimate for the corresponding period. This came as a result of a combination of larger marketings and higher average prices. The higher prices reflect the increase in the quality of the 1960 crop over the crop of 1959 which had been adversely affected by unfavourable harvesting conditions. Although average prices for flaxseed were down in 1961, marketings more than doubled to give an income from this source of 21.5 million dollars which contrasts with about 11.0 million dollars realized during the first six months of 1960. The sharp increase in income from the sale of tobacco, from about 70.0 million dollars in 1960 to 87.2 million dollars in 1961, was attributable, for the most part, to the record-breaking flue-cured tobacco crop harvested in Ontario last fall. Higher marketings were responsible for the increase in income from oats and barley.

Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on western grain crops totalled about 52 million dollars for the first half of 1961, down about 12 million from the payments made during the like period of the previous year. While potato marketings to the end of June, 1961, were higher than a year earlier, prices were down very substantially to give a total income of 18.4 million dollars as against 28.0 million for the first half of 1960.

Livestock and Animal Products - Total income from the sale of livestock and their products, estimated at 827.4 million dollars for the January - June period of 1961 was nearly four per cent above the 1960 level of 797.5 million dollars for the same period. The largest single contribution to this gain was higher income from hog sales. This was followed by a substantial increase in returns from poultry products, and lesser gains accruing to dairy products.

Total marketings of hogs during the first half of this year were below the level of a year ago but prices averaged very much higher with the result that total returns rose from 137.2 million dollars in 1960 to 156.3 million dollars in 1961. Higher prices for eggs more than offset slightly lower marketings to give total returns from this item of 67.1 million dollars in 1961 as compared with 62.2 million for 1960. Increased marketings of turkey meat and broiler chickens accounted for most of the gain in poultry meat returns, from 45.8 million dollars for the first half of 1960 to 56.1 million dollars for the corresponding period of this year. The slight increase in dairy product returns reflected increased production.

Provincial Comparisons - As has already been indicated, declines in total cash income for Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick were due almost entirely to a significant reduction in returns from potatoes. Several items contributed to the 8.4 per cent gain in total income for Nova Scotia, with the somewhat more important ones being cattle, hogs and eggs. The increase in the Quebec farm returns amounted to nearly 8 per cent with the two most important contributors to this gain being hogs and poultry meat. By far the greatest contribution to the 4 per cent increase in farm cash income in Ontario was that made by the record flue-cured tobacco crop harvested in 1960; returns from hogs were also substantial. Manitoba income was up by about 3 per cent with the most important single contribution being made by flaxseed, followed by cattle and hogs. The largest increase in total cash income estimated for any of the provinces during the first six months of 1961 was recorded for Saskatchewan largely as a result of a sharp increase in returns from the sale of wheat; lesser, but still important, increases were also provided by flaxseed and cattle. It might be noted here that farmers in Saskatchewan increased substantially their repayments of loans made on farm-stored grains. Total income in Alberta was up fractionally with hogs being the most important single contributor. British Columbia farm cash income increased a little more than 3 per cent with no one item making any particularly significant contribution.

Farm Income Estimates, April - June Quarter - Although total farm income from the sale of farm products for the first half of 1961 was above the 1960 level, the estimated income for the second quarter of this year was slightly below the second-quarter level of a year ago. Lower returns from field crops more than offset higher income from the sale of livestock and livestock products. In the case of field crops, income from the sale of the three principal grains, wheat, oats and barley, was higher during the 1961 period as a result of larger marketings and higher wheat prices. Income from flaxseed was practically unchanged but returns from potatoes were down by nearly one half as a result of much lower prices. Participation payments made by the Canadian Wheat Board on western grains were well below the second-quarter payments for 1960, and, at the same time, western farmers made much higher repayments of money advanced by the Federal government on farm-stored grains. Higher returns from livestock and livestock products during the April - June quarter of the current year resulted from an increase in income from the sale of hogs, poultry products and, to a lesser extent, dairy products. Income from cattle and calves was virtually unchanged.

On a provincial basis, reduced income was estimated for all provinces except Nova Scotia, Quebec, Manitoba and Saskatchewan and varied from just under three per cent in British Columbia to 25 per cent in Prince Edward Island. Increased income estimated for the above-noted exceptions ranged from less than one per cent in Manitoba to more than 8 per cent in Nova Scotia.

The estimates contained herein are based on reports of marketings and prices received by farmers for principal farm products and are subject to revision as more complete data become available. The estimates include the amounts paid by the Canadian Wheat Board in the form of participation payments. They also include deficiency payments made under the present farm prices support program and net cash advances on farm-stored grains. Payments made under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act, the Western Grain Producers' Acreage Payment Plan and the Federal-Provincial Emergency Unthreshed Grain Assistance Act are not included with cash income from the sale of farm products but are included in total cash income in the year in which payments are made, under the heading, "Supplementary Payments".

In Table I overleaf is summarized the preliminary estimates of cash income from the sale of farm products, by provinces, for the first six months of 1960 and 1961, and revised estimates for 1959. Tables 2, 3 and 4 present farm cash income by commodity sources for each province in the three years and include supplementary payments. No information is available for Newfoundland.
