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

## FARM CASH INCOME FROM FARMING OPERATIONS, JANUARY - SEPTEMBER 1963(1)

It is estimated that, during the first nine months of 1963, Canadian farmers received cash income from farming operations (excluding supplementary payments) amounting to 2,319.4 million dollars. This estimate is 4.6 per cent above the record level of 2,218.1 million dollars established for the corresponding period of 1962. These estimates include cash income from the sale of farm products, Canadian Wheat Board Participation Payments on previous years' grain crops, net cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada, and deficiency payments made under the provisions of the Agricultural Stabilization Act, but not supplementary payments mentioned below. No allowance is made in these estimates for costs incurred by farmers in the production of commodities sold.

The more important contributions to the increase in total farm cash income, between the first nine months of 1962 and the first nine months of 1963, were higher receipts from the sale of wheat, coarse grains, poultry meat and larger cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada. Less important increases in income were recorded for potatoes, dairy products, eggs, fruits, vegetables, rapeseed and soybeans. In the case of receipts from the sale of wheat and coarse grains in Western Canada, they represent only the cash income received at time of delivery. Subsequent participation payments on these grain crops are treated separately as Canadian Wheat Board payments and, during the first nine months of 1963, they totalled below the level for the same period in 1962. Reduced returns were also realized from cattle and calves, hogs, rye and flaxseed.

Increases in cash income from farming operations were recorded for all provinces except Alberta where cash income from farming operations was nearly four per cent less than a year ago. Returns to farmers in British Columbia were up only fractionally while in Manitoba they increased by 16.5 per cent. For the remaining provinces, the gains ranged between four and six per cent.

In addition to the above income, farmers received, during the first nine months of 1963, nearly 12 million dollars in the form of supplementary payments, paid out entirely under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act. This was in contrast with the supplementary payments during the first nine months of 1962 of 66.6 million dollars which included, not only payments under the Prairie Farm Assistance Act, but also those made under the Western Grain Producers' Acreage Payment Plan. When added together farmers' cash income from farming operations and supplementary payments totalled 2,331.4 million dollars for the January - September period of 1963, 2 per cent above the 2,284.8 million realized during the corresponding period of a year ago. Payments under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act are financed in part by farmers' contributions to the Prairie Farm Emergency Fund; these contributions are based on a levy of one per cent on farmers' marketings of wheat, oats, barley, rye, flaxseed and rapeseed.

Field Crops - For the first nine months of 1963 it is estimated that farmers received a total of 928.9 million dollars from the sale of field crops, participation payments on previous years' western grain crops, and net cash advance payments on farm-stored grains in Western Canada. This contrasts with the 845.1 million dollars from the same sources during the corresponding period of a year earlier. Cash returns from wheat at time of delivery climbed from 340.8 million dollars in 1962 to 386.7 million, the greatest absolute gain recorded for any single commodity considered in farm income. Income from coarse grains was also up quite substantially, from 58.0 million dollars in 1962 to 91.9 million in 1963. In both cases, the rise in income can be attributed entirely to significantly larger marketings. Deliveries of oats were nearly doubled while those for barley were up by approximately 60 per cent. Net cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada to the end of September 1963 amounted to 12.1 million dollars. This was in contrast with the situation a year ago when cash advances were exceeded by repayments to give a net cash advance of minus 4.1 million dollars. Income to potato growers increased from 23.1 million dollars in 1962 to 29.8 million in 1963, as a result of increases in both marketings and prices.

Set off against these gains were reduced Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops. Total payments for the first nine months of 1963 amounted to 124.0 million dollars as against 152.8 million for the like period of 1962. These payments arise out of the system of grain marketings in Western Canada whereby farmers, at the time they deliver their grain, are given initial payments and certificates stating the quantities and grades delivered. These certificates entitle farmers to share in surpluses accumulated by the Board through subsequent sales of these grains for domestic consumption or export. The share of the surpluses accruing to farmers represents the Canadian Wheat Board payments included in these estimates of farm income.

Cash receipts from marketings of flaxseed declined from 26.8 million dollars in 1962 to 22.4 million in 1963 as a result of lower prices and smaller marketings.

Livestock and livestock products - Total income to farmers from the sale of livestock and livestock products is estimated at 1,366.9 million dollars for the first nine months of 1963, about one per cent above the 1,350.1 million dollars realized from this source during the nine-months period of a year ago. The maintenance of this income at this level can be attributed to increased income from poultry and dairy products, more than offsetting reduced income from hogs, and cattle and calves.

Although returns from cattle to the end of September 1963 were slightly above those of a year ago, they were more than offset by a substantial decline in income from calves. Since average farm prices of both cattle and calves to the end of September were not significantly different between 1962 and 1963, the variation in income from these two items between the two years is attributable to changes in marketings. Altogether, income from cattle and calves amounted to 462.8 million dollars in 1963 as compared with 464.0 million in 1962. Cash receipts from hogs for the nine months of 1963 totalled 234.0 million dollars, down from the 1962 estimate of 242.0 million almost entirely as a result of reduced marketings. Income from dairy products increased by 5 million dollars to a total of 420.8 million dollars in 1963; slight increases were recorded for both prices and sales. Total production of eggs to the end of September has been below the 1962 level but a greater than proportionate increase in farm price has provided for an income from this source of 109.4 million dollars as against 102.2 million a year earlier. Heavier marketings of poultry meat during the first nine months of 1963 are reflected in total cash income from this item of 112.0 million dollars, up by about 13.0 million dollars over the 1962 level.

Estimates of farm cash income from the sale of farm products include the returns from all sales of agricultural products except those associated with direct interfarm transfers. The prices used to value all products sold are prices to farmers at the farm level; they include any subsidies, bonuses and premiums which can be attributed to specific products, but they exclude any storage, transportation, processing and handling charges which are not actually received by farmers.

Many sources of information are used in the preparation of these estimates. These include the Censuses of Agriculture; periodic Bureau surveys of production and disposition of crops, livestock and animal products; farm product marketing agencies; processors of agricultural products; Bureau surveys of prices received by farmers in connection with agricultural activities; agricultural statistics arising out of administrative responsibilities of various government departments, both Federal and Provincial.

In Table I overleaf is summarized the preliminary estimates of cash income from farming operations, by provinces, for the first nine months of 1962 and 1963 and revised estimates for 1961. Tables 2, 3 and 4 present farm cash income by commodity sources for each province in the three years and include supplementary payments. No information is available for Newfoundland.
