

## FARM CASH INCOME, JANUARY - SEPTEMBER 1964(1)

It is estimated that farm cash receipts from farming operations amounted to 2,512.9 million dollars during the first nine months of 1964. This estimate is a record high for this period of the year and exceeds by 10 per cent the previous high of 2,283.1 million dollars realized during the corresponding period of 1963. In comparing these estimates with those for earlier years, it should be remembered that the totals for 1962, 1963 and 1964 have been partially revised in that they contain final revisions for dairy products. Complete revisions for all products will be published sometime in 1965.(2)

Total cash returns include: cash receipts from the sale of farm products; Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops; net cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada; and, deficiency payments made by the Agricultural Stabilization Board. Certain types of government supplementary payments, relatively small in amount and mentioned later, are not included in these totals. No deductions are made for the cost of production of commodities sold.(3)

The gain in farm cash returns between the first nine months of 1963 and the first nine months of 1964 is attributable for the most part to the higher income resulting from a substantial increase in wheat marketings and to the much larger participation payments made by the Canadian Wheat Board. Less important additions were made by rye, flaxseed, potatoes, fruits, vegetables, hogs and dairy products. Partially offsetting these gains were lower returns from rapeseed, soybeans, tobacco, cattle, poultry products and substantial repayments of cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada.

Under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act farmers also received supplementary payments amounting to 6.9 million dollars as against nearly 12.0 million during the like period of a year ago. When added together, farm cash income from farming operations and supplementary payments totalled 2,519.8 million dollars for the 1964 period, also about 10 per cent above the previous record high of 2,295.0 million established in 1963.

Field Crops - During the first nine months of 1964, farmers' cash returns from crops, Canadian Wheat Board participation payments, and cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada, amounted to 1,158.3 million dollars. This estimate is 25 per cent above the estimate of 926.1 million dollars for the same period a year ago and it accounts for about 46 per cent of total cash receipts from farming operations. A year ago this proportion amounted to nearly 41 per cent. As would be expected, most of the increase in these estimates occurred in the Prairie Provinces.

Cash receipts to farmers from wheat at the time of delivery and before adjustment for cash advances, totalled 543.6 million dollars for the 1964 period, 41 per cent above the 385.3 million received during the same period of 1963. For the most part, this gain arises out of unusually heavy marketings by farmers from a record 1963 crop to meet above-normal export commitments. Canadian Wheat Board participation payments totalling nearly 225 million dollars were distributed to farmers during the first nine months of 1964, as against 124 million for the like period of 1963. The 1964 payments represent final payments of 42.5 cents per bushel on wheat delivered to the Board from the 1962 crop and also final payments of 12.4 cents and 18.2 cents per bushel paid respectively on deliveries from the 1962 crops of oats and barley. The payments made in 1963 are made up of final payments of 43.0 cents per bushel on deliveries from the 1961 wheat crop. These payments arise out of the system of grain marketings in Western Canada whereby farmers, at the time they deliver their grain, are given initial payments and certificates stating the quantities and grades delivered. These certificates entitle the producers to share in surpluses accumulated by the Board through subsequent sales of these grains for domestic consumption or export. The share of money accruing to farmers represents the Canadian Wheat Board payments included in these estimates of farm income.

Up to the end of September 1964, farmers had delivered more barley, rye and flaxseed than for the same period of 1963 at prices not greatly different from those of a year ago. Income from barley increased from 50.3 to 54.0 million dollars, rye was up from 5.9 million to 7.1 million and flaxseed rose from 23.0 million to 39.0 million dollars. A combination of slightly higher marketings and a rise in prices is reflected in increased income from potatoes, from 29.9 million dollars in 1963 to 34.7 million in 1964. Higher income was also estimated for fruits and vegetables.

The most important offset to the above gains was caused by repayments of cash advances on farmstored grains in Western Canada. Heavy marketings of grains during the first nine months of 1964 led to repayments which exceeded cash advances by 13.5 million dollars. As a result, the net entry in farm

cash income was minus 13.5 million dollars. This was in contrast with the 1963 period when advances exceeded repayments by 12.1 million dollars. Returns from the sale of tobacco declined from 89.1 million to 64.7 million dollars. Most of this decline occurred in Ontario and, to a large extent, accounted for the reduction in total income for this province. The reduced income from this commodity can be attributed to smaller production in 1963, lower prices and a much larger proportion of the crop sold during the year of production than was the case for the 1962 crop.

Lower marketings accounted for the reduced receipts from the sale of rapeseed and soybeans; in the case of rapeseed the smaller marketings more than offset some increase in prices.

<u>Livestock and Livestock Products</u> - Total cash returns from the sale of livestock and livestock products amounted to 1,334.7 million dollars for the first nine months of 1964, practically unchanged from the returns realized during the corresponding period of a year earlier. Although marketings of cattle and calves in 1964 were above 1963 levels prices were down and total cash returns declined from 455.4 million dollars to 447.1 million. The 1964 prices for hogs were also below those of a year ago, but marketings increased sufficiently to provide total cash receipts of 239.4 million dollars as compared with 235.7 million in 1963.

Returns to poultry producers totalled 212.4 million for the January-September period of 1964, down by approximately 10 million dollars from the 1963 level for the same period. Nearly all of this reduction is attributable to lower prices for eggs. Income from the sale of dairy products rose from 393.0 million dollars in 1963 to 407.7 million in 1964, an increase of 3.7 per cent as a result of both higher prices and greater production.

Estimates of cash income from farming operations include the returns from all sales of agricultural products except those associated with direct interfarm transfers. The prices used to value all products sold are prices to farmers at the farm level; they include any subsidies, bonuses and premiums which can be attributed to specific products, but they exclude any storage, transportation, processing and handling charges which are not actually received by farmers.

Many sources of information are used in the preparation of these estimates. These include the Censuses of Agriculture; periodic Bureau surveys of production and disposition of crops, livestock and animal products; farm product marketing agencies; processors of agricultural products; Bureau surveys of prices received by farmers in connection with agricultural activities; agricultural statistics arising out of administrative responsibilities of various government departments, both Federal and Provincial.

In Table 1 overleaf is summarized the estimates of cash income from farming operations, by provinces, for the first nine months of 1962, 1963 and 1964. Tables 2, 3 and 4 present farm cash income by commodity sources for each province in the three years and include supplementary payments. No information is available for Newfoundland.
