

FARM CASH RECEIPTS

During the first six months of 1965, farmers' total cash receipts from farming operations reached 1,730.2 million dollars, about 5 per cent above the record high figure of 1,648.9 million dollars realized during the corresponding period of 1964. These estimates include cash receipts from the sale of farm products, Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops, net cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada, and deficiency payments made by the Agricultural Stabilization Board. No deductions are made for the cost of production of commodities sold(2).

The increase in the level of farm cash receipts between the first half of 1964 and the first half of 1965 can be attributed in large part to the substantial Canadian Wheat Board participation payments made during the first quarter of this year and higher returns from the sale of potatoes, livestock and dairy products. On the other hand returns from the sales of wheat were well down from the 1964 levels for the first six months as a result of a substantial drop in marketings. Some reduction also occurred in receipts from coarse grains, flaxseed, tobacco, eggs and fruit.

All provinces, except Saskatchewan, shared in the increase with the most significant absolute gains occurring in Ontario and Alberta. In Ontario, the rise in receipts is attributable for the most part to cattle and hogs while in Alberta it stems largely from increased participation payments, cattle and hogs. On a percentage basis the most important increases were recorded in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick where potato prices rose well above the average reached in the first half of 1964. In the case of Saskatchewan, participation payments were well above last year's level and cash receipts from livestock were up, but wheat marketings were sharply lower.

Under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act(3), farmers also received supplementary payments amounting to 10.8 million dollars during the January-June period of 1965 as against 6.9 million for the corresponding 1964 period. When added together, farmers' cash receipts from farming operations and supplementary payments totalled 1,741.0 million dollars for the 1965 period, about 5 per cent above the 1964 level of 1,655.8 million dollars.

Field Crops - Total cash receipts from field crops for Canada, including Canadian Wheat Board participation payments and cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada, amounted to 781.0 million dollars during the first half of 1965, as compared with 776.3 million realized a year earlier. Smaller receipts from wheat, coarse grains, flaxseed, tobacco and fruit were slightly more than offset by increased receipts from potatoes, reduced repayments of cash advances on farm-stored grains and large Canadian Wheat Board participation payments. These participation payments represent final payments on the marketings of the 1963 crops of wheat, oats and barley of 48.2 cents, 9.8 cents and 22.6 cents per bushel respectively. They arose out of the system of grain marketings in Western Canada whereby farmers, at the time they deliver their grain, are given initial payments and certificates stating the quantities and grades delivered. These certificates entitle farmers to share in surpluses accumulated by the Board through subsequent sales of these grains for domestic consumption or export. The share of the surpluses accruing to farmers represents the Canadian Wheat Board payments included in these estimates of farm cash receipts.

Total receipts to farmers from the sale of potatoes increased very substantially from 23.5 million dollars for the first six months of 1964 to 48.6 million for the corresponding period of 1965. Although marketings were slightly above year-ago levels, most of this gain is attributable to a very substantial increase in prices arising out of a short crop in the United States in 1964 and a resultant strong demand in that country for Canadian potatoes. The marked increase in returns from this crop is reflected in the spectacular rise in total cash receipts occurring in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick. Increased marketings of both rapeseed and soybeans at prices above the 1964 level provided total cash receipts from these commodities above those realized during the first half of 1964.

Wheat was the most important field crop item for which a decline in farm cash receipts occurred. Total returns at time of delivery amounted to 266.4 million dollars for the first half of 1965, as against 350.6 million for the same period of 1964. This situation reflects the substantial decline in farmers' marketings between the two periods. Up to the end of June 1965, farmers had also delivered less coarse grains and flaxseed than during the same period of a year ago and total returns were down accordingly. Cash receipts from the sale of tobacco declined from 64.7 million dollars for the 1964 period to 54.0 million dollars in 1965. A smaller crop in 1964 resulting in smaller marketing during the first half of this year more than offset higher prices.

<u>Livestock and Livestock Products</u> - During the first six months of 1965, total cash receipts to farmers from the sale of livestock and livestock products for Canada amounted to 929.4 million dollars, almost 9 per cent above the 854.1 million dollars for the corresponding period of a year ago. This amount represented 53.7 per cent of total receipts from farming. Farmers marketed more cattle and calves during the first half of 1965 than in the same period of 1964 at average prices not greatly different from those of a year ago to give a total return of 337.8 million dollars. This is 15.8 per cent above the estimate of 291.7 million dollars for the 1964 period. Higher prices and increased marketings combined to give total receipts from hogs of 174.4 million dollars for 1965 as against 156.7 million in 1964.

Cash receipts from dairy products reached a total of 260.3 million dollars to the end of June 1965, 3.7 per cent above the 1964 figure of 251.0 million; while the quantities sold remained about the same, prices increased. Increased poultry meat production is reflected in total cash receipts which rose from 64.7 million in 1964 to 69.6 million in 1965. In the case of eggs, the lower prices offset increased output to give total receipts of 65.8 million dollars, 3.8 per cent below year-ago levels.

Estimates of cash receipts from farming operations include the returns from all sales of agricultural products except those associated with direct interfarm transfers. The prices used to value all products sold are prices to farmers at the farm level; they include any subsidies, bonuses and premiums which can be attributed to specific products, but they exclude any storage, transportation, processing and handling charges which are not actually received by farmers.

Many sources of information are used in the preparation of these estimates. These include the Censuses of Agriculture; periodic Bureau surveys of production and disposition of crops, livestock and animal products; farm product marketing agencies; processors of agricultural products; Bureau surveys of prices received by farmers in connection with agricultural activities; agricultural statistics arising out of administrative responsibilities of various government departments, both Federal and Provincial.
