

FARM CASH RECEIPTS, JANUARY - JUNE 1967(1)

Preliminary estimates indicate that, during the first six months of 1967, farmers' total cash receipts from farming operations reached an estimated \$2,139.7 million. This is about 10 per cent above the figure of \$1,939.5 million realized during the first half of 1966 and approximately 23 per cent higher than the 1965 estimate of \$1,735.1 million for the corresponding period. These estimates include cash receipts from the sale of farm products, Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops, net cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada, deficiency payments made by the Agricultural Stabilization Board and supplementary payments to dairy producers. These estimates make no allowance for cost of production of commodities sold(2).

The increase in total farm cash receipts between the first half of 1966 and the first half of 1967 is largely attributable to higher total cash returns from the sale of wheat, barley, tobacco, cattle, dairy products and poultry meat, and a substantial increase in Canadian Wheat Board participation payments and dairy support payments. Reduced returns were recorded for several commodities with the most important being flaxseed, potatoes and hogs.

Total cash receipts were up in all provinces except Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick where lower total cash income reflected a substantial reduction in returns from potatoes. The increases in total cash receipts recorded for the remaining provinces ranged from less than two per cent in Nova Scotia, Manitoba and British Columbia to nearly 20 per cent for Saskatchewan.

In addition to the above income, farmers also received supplementary payments amounting to \$2.6 million during the January - June period of 1967. This contrasts with \$30.5 million received during the first half of 1966. These payments consist of those made under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act and those covering other government assistance to farmers who suffered losses as a result of adverse weather conditions. When added together, farm cash receipts from farming operations and supplementary payments totalled \$2,142.3 million, about nine per cent above the estimate of \$1,970.1 million a year earlier.

Field Crops - During the first six months of 1967, it is estimated that Canadian farmers received a total of \$947.1 million dollars from the sale of field crops. This amount is about 20 per cent above the level for the same period of 1966 and accounts for about 44 per cent of total cash receipts from farming operations during this period. This increase reflects, for the most part, higher total receipts from the sale of wheat, barley, tobacco and a substantial gain in Canadian Wheat Board participation payments. Total returns to wheat producers at time of delivery rose from \$305.4 million for the 1966 period to \$336.4 million in 1967 as a result of increased sales and higher average prices arising out of the marketing of higher quality grain. Total returns to barley producers to the end of June 1967 were about \$15 million above the 1966 level for the corresponding period almost entirely as a result of higher marketings. Receipts from the sale of tobacco rose from \$67.7 million in 1966 to \$109.5 million; this reflects a situation in which increased demand in recent years has resulted in higher prices and expanded production.

The greatest gain from any single source of field crop income was recorded for the participation payments paid out by the Canadian Wheat Board. From a total of \$229.2 million for the first half of 1966, they rose to \$311.8 million for the like period of 1967. Nearly all of these payments for 1967 occurred in the first quarter of the year and represent final payments on the 1965 Western crops of wheat, oats and barley of 48.2 cents, 24.8 cents, and 32.9 cents per bushel respectively.

Offsetting these gains to some extent were lower returns from the sale of oats, rye, flaxseed, soybeans and potatoes. In the case of the cereal crops and oilseeds the reduction in cash receipts is attributable almost entirely to smaller marketings. Farmers' marketings of potatoes during the first six months of 1967 were above the levels of a year earlier, but prices were down sharply; as a result total cash receipts from this source declined from \$39.3 million to \$25.4 million. The effect of this decline was particularly evident in the Maritime region.

<u>Livestock and Livestock Products</u> - Total cash returns to producers of livestock and livestock products during the first half of 1967 were nearly two per cent above the level of the corresponding period of the previous year. Estimated at \$1,135.8 million, they accounted for about 53 per cent of total

receipts from farming operations. Total cash returns from cattle and calves were up from \$428.6 million to \$438.1 million with higher prices more than offseting a slight decline in marketings. In the case of hogs, a decline in prices more than offset a substantial increase in marketings and total returns declined from the 1966 level of \$216.4 million to \$210.5 million in 1967.

Returns to dairy producers, exclusive of supplementary support payments, totalled \$288.6 million for the first half of 1967 as against \$274.7 million for the same period of 1966. Although production was slightly below year-ago levels, prices were higher. In addition to these returns, dairy producers also received government subsidy payments amounting to about \$30.0 million(1) for the 1967 period.

Further increases in the production of poultry meat are reflected in the continuing increase in cash returns to producers from \$87.5 million in 1966, to \$93.1 million in 1967. Lower egg prices slightly more than offset increased production to give total cash receipts from this source of \$77.0 million as against \$78.6 million for the first half of 1966.

Estimates of cash receipts from farming operations include the returns from all sales of agricultural products except those associated with direct inter-farm transfers. The prices used to value all products sold are prices to farmers at the farm level; they include any subsidies, bonuses and premiums which can be readily attributed to specific products, but they exclude any storage, transportation, processing and handling charges which are not actually received by farmers.

Many sources of information are used in the preparation of these estimates. These include the Censuses of Agriculture; periodic Bureau surveys of production and disposition of crops, livestock and animal products; farm product marketing agencies; processors of agricultural products; Bureau surveys of prices received by farmers in connection with agricultural activities; agricultural statistics arising out of administrative responsibilities of various government departments, both Federal and Provincial.
