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

FARM CASH RECEIPTS, JANUARY - MARCH 1969(1)

Farm cash receipts from farming operations during the first three months of 1969 totalled \$993.0 million. This represents a decrease of 2.9 per cent from the revised value of \$1,023.1 million for the first quarter of 1968. However, as occurred during the first three months of 1968, Canadian Wheat Board payments on previous years' grain crops were only paid in one of the Prairie Provinces. In 1968, payments during the first quarter were only made in Alberta while this year they were limited to Saskatchewan. In effect, this means that comparison of total cash receipts for the first quarter of 1969 with those of the corresponding period of 1968 is not entirely valid either for these two provinces or for the Canada total.

Estimates of farmers' cash receipts from farming operations include income from the sale of farm products, Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops, net cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada, and deficiency payments made by the Agricultural Stabilization Board. No allowance was made for the cost incurred by farmers in the production of the commodities sold. Estimates of expenses incurred by farmers in their farming operations together with total farm income are published annually in the DBS publication "Farm Net Income" (Catalogue No. 21-202).

Apart from the drop in Canadian Wheat Board participation payments mentioned above, the decline in total returns reflects lower total cash receipts from the sale of wheat and barley, together with small decreases in income from hogs, sheep and lambs. Dairy supplementary payments were also below those for the first quarter of 1968.

During the first three months of 1969, important increases in farm cash receipts over those for the same period a year ago were recorded for oats, flaxseed, tobacco, cattle and calves, dairy products, and poultry and eggs. During the same period, farmers received \$28.3 million largely in the form of cash advances on farm-stored grains. This contrasts with the same period of 1968 when farmers repaid slightly more than \$13 million advanced previously.

Cash receipts were higher in all provinces except Alberta. The reduction in total receipts which occurred in this province is due, as mentioned previously, to the Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on wheat being received in the first quarter of 1968 but not until the second quarter of 1969. Similarly, the increase in Saskatchewan is entirely due to a Wheat Board payment being received during the first quarter of this year, compared to 1968, when it was not paid out until the second quarter. The increases in farm cash receipts in the other provinces ranged from 5.3 per cent in Manitoba to 14.6 per cent in British Columbia.

In addition to the above income, Canadian farmers also received supplementary payments amounting to \$7.4 million, slightly below the \$7.6 million received during the same period of 1968. These payments consist of those made under provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act, and for 1969, those made to sugar beet growers in Ontario. When added together, farmers' cash receipts from farming operations and supplementary payments give a value of \$1,000.5 million, almost three per cent below the estimate of \$1,030.7 million for the first quarter of 1968.

<u>Field Crops</u> — Total cash receipts from field crops, including Canadian Wheat Board participation payments and net cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada, amounted to \$374.8 million for the January to March period of 1969. As explained above, due to differences in timing of Canadian Wheat Board payments this is not entirely comparable with the 1968 first-quarter value of \$449.0 million.

The major decline in crop receipts occurred for wheat where total returns to producers at the time of delivery were down by almost \$60 million; falling from \$154.2 million in the first quarter of 1968 to \$94.3 million for the same period of 1969. As a result of larger marketings, cash receipts from oats more than doubled, rising from \$5.1 million in 1968 to \$13.0 million this year. While marketings of barley were similar for both periods, lower average 1969 prices resulted in a decreased income from this source. A very substantial increase occurred in marketings of flaxseed during the first three months of this year compared to the same period of 1968, resulting in returns increasing from \$2.9 million to \$15.7 million. An increase was also reported for the value of sales of tobacco which rose by 7.6 per cent from \$94.1 million in 1968 to \$101.3 million for the first three months of this year.

Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' oat crops declined from \$8.4 million in 1968 to \$4.8 million for the January — March period of 1969. For barley, the decline was even greater and payments for the same period dropped from \$35.9 million in 1968 to \$3.5 million in 1969.

Livestock and Livestock Products — During the first three months of 1969 total cash receipts to farmers from the sale of livestock and livestock products amounted to \$596.9 million, almost 8 per cent above the 1968 first-quarter estimate of \$552.7 million. Higher prices for cattle and calves together with increased marketings provided total cash receipts from this source of \$251.9 million compared with \$232.4 million a year earlier. For dairy products, larger marketings and higher prices led to receipts climbing to \$129.8 million from \$122.0 million in 1968.

Total receipts from the sale of poultry products rose to \$95.3 million this year. For eggs, prices rose in response to a decline in production to give total cash returns of \$47.4 million; a gain of \$9.1 million over the 1968 estimate. Returns to poultry meat producers rose from \$40.8 million in 1968 to \$47.8 million for the first quarter of this year. Although prices received by hog producers for their product were higher than a year earlier, the decline in marketings resulted in income from this source being very similar for both periods. Higher prices for sheep and lambs were more than offset by a decrease in marketings and receipts from this source declined from \$2.1 million to \$1.8 million.

Estimates of cash receipts from farming operations include the returns from all sales of agricultural products except those associated with direct inter-farm transfers. The prices used to value all products sold are prices to farmers at the farm level; they include any subsidies, bonuses and premiums which can be attributed to specific products, but they exclude any storage, transportation, processing and handling charges which are not actually received by farmers.

Many sources of information are used in the preparation of these estimates. These include the Censuses of Agriculture; periodic Bureau surveys of production and disposition of crops, livestock and animal products; farm product marketing agencies; processors of agricultural products; Bureau surveys of prices received by farmers in connection with agricultural activities; agricultural statistics arising out of administrative responsibilities of various government departments, both Federal and Provincial.
